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Warsaw, December 6. N. S.

**T**WO days ago arrived here an Express from Prince *Sapiba*, Great General of *Lithuania*, and brought an account, That after having Treated with some of the Great Men, who took part with the Confederated Troops in that Dutchy, and having prevailed with them to come over to his side, in order to restore the Peace and Quiet of the Country, the said Confederated Troops had likewise submitted, upon Conditions mutually agreed on, to wit, That there should be a general Amnesty of all that is past; That the Confederacy should be dissolved; That none of those that were concerned in it, should on that account be molested for the future; That they should forthwith be paid half of their Arrears; That they should not enter into any Confederacy hereafter; and should obey the Orders of the Great General; This Agreement being signed on both sides, it was put in execution the 27th of the last month, when the Chief Officers of the Confederated Troops waited on Prince *Sapiba*, and made their submission to him at the head of the Forces he had caused to be drawn together for this Occasion. Matters being thus accommodated in *Lithuania*, the Example will in all likelihood be quickly followed by the Confederated Troops in *Poland*, who meet with great difficulties in providing themselves with Winter Quarters, and begin to be made uneasy by the Disagreement of some of their Principal Commanders. The Queen, since her reconciliation with Prince *James*, her Son, does not only endeavour all she can to support his Interests, but has shewed a publick Resentment of the Proceedings of the French Ambassador, who labours to promote the Election of the Prince of *Conti*, and she has written to the French King, to complain of the little regard that is now had to the many Promises and Assurances of Friendship and Assistance which the late King

and his Family received from the Court of *France*. The Tartars that made the last incursion into the Country about *Lemberg*, and continued afterwards for some time in the Neighbourhood of *Caminiec*, are since retired to *Budzias*.

*Vienna*, Dec. 15. The Officers of the Imperial Troops are commanded to have their Companies and Regiments compleat by the end of *March* at farthest; Great provision is made of Bombes and Ammunition for the Service of the next Campaign; and Commissaries are sent to replenish the Magazines in *Hungary*. The Envoy from *Moscovy* assures this Court, that the Czar, his Master, is resolved to prosecute the War against the Turks and Tartars the next year, with all the Force he can draw together; and that he has ordered a great number of Vessels to be built, with which he designs to enter into the *Black Sea*, and annoy the Turks, who lie very open on that side; and the Letters we receive from *Turkey* say, these Preparations of the Moscovites do very much allarm the People at *Constantinople*. The last Letters from the Frontiers of *Hungary* brought nothing material, besides an account of some Excursions made by small Parties on both sides. The Turks have a very strong Garison at *Belgrade*, and seem still to have an Eye upon *Titul*; but at the same time care is taken to fortifie the place; and the German Troops in those parts do carefully watch the Enemies Motions. They work on the new Fortifications of *Peter-Waradin* as fast as the Weather will permit; and Count *Guido* of *Staremberg*, who commands all the Emperor's Forces on that Frontier, and has his Residence at *Essecke*, has fortified several small Places between the Rivers *Save* and *Drave*, for the security of the Country against the Enemies Excursions. Prince *Lewis* of *Baden* is expected here after the *Christmas* Holydays.

*Frankfort*, Dec. 23. The French, by the Preparations they make at *Philippsburg*, *Landau*, and other Places near the *Rhine*, seem to have a design of passing that River, and making an Incursion into the Country of *Wirtemberg*; and upon these Advices Orders are given to post several German Regiments in such places, as are most proper for disappointing any attempt they may make of this kind. Ten of the Imperial Regiments, which return from *Italy*, are, it's said, to have their Winter Quarters in or near the Empire, that they may be ready for the next Campaign there.

*Cologne*, Dec. 25. A Party of the *Brandenburg* Troops quartered in this Diocess made some few days ago an Excursion into the Country of *Lomburgh*, and brought back with them several Prisoners. Prince *Lewis* of *Baden* has writ to the States of *Franconia*, to acquaint them with the approach

proach of the Forces under the command of the Lord *Galway*, and to desire they will assign them Quarters, they being to serve on the *Rhine* the next Summer; and the said States have given Directions accordingly. All possible care is taken to hinder the supplying the French with Horses out of *Germany*.

*Hamburgk*, Dec. 25. They write from *Dresden* of the 20th Instant, that the Elector of *Saxony* since his return from *Vienna*, had declared to his Council, that he intends to return the next year to *Hungary*, to command again the Imperial Army, and that he has promised the Emperor to send thither several thousand Men more, to reinforce his Troops already in that Service. The Elector of *Brandenburgh* is gone to make a Visit to the Elector of *Saxony*; and there is a Discourse, that he has thoughts of going in the Spring to his Territories in *Prussia*, that he may be nearer to *Poland* at the time of the Election; His Electoral Highness has in the mean time given out Commissions for making new Levies, in order to augment his Forces; of which a considerable Body will be employed on the *Rhine* the next Campaign. The *Holstein* Troops, which returned lately from the *Rhine*, and have since been lodged in the Country hereabouts, intend to march to-morrow, to their Winter Quarters in the Dutchy of *Holstein*, according to what is agreed on with the Danish Ministers. We are assured, that the King of *Denmark* is to assist the Allies with a good Body of his Troops against the next Summer.

*Liege*, Dec. 26. N. S. The French Troops are moving between the *Sambre* and the *Meuse*, and the Troops of the Allies in these parts put themselves in a posture to observe the Enemy. The Elector of *Cologne* intends to reside here the whole Winter.

*Falmouth*, Dec. 21. The Fleet commanded by Sir *Cloudesty Shovell* passed by this place to the Westward yesterday in the Evening.

*Plimcuth*, Dec. 22. The old Charter of this Corporation, which was surrendered in the Reign of King *Charles II.* and now graciously restored by His present Majesty, was brought hither this day by Sir *Francis Drake* Bar. Recorder of this Borough, accompanied by divers Justices of Peace and many Gentlemen of the County, and was met several miles from the Town by about 300 of the Chief Inhabitants on Horseback. At the Town Gate it was received by Mr. *John Munyon*, named in the said Charter to be the first Mayor, with the Magistrates and Common Council therein likewise mentioned, in their Formalities, and were Guarded by the Trained-bands of the Town to the *Guildhall*, where the Charter being immediately read, and the Recorder, Mayor, and Magistrates Sworn; The Mayor made a very Loyal Speech, advising the Inhabitants to a fixed and constant Loy-

alty, and to make all suitable returns to His Majesty for His Grace and Favour to this Corporation. After which the Mayor gave the Company a Noble Entertainment at his House.

The Mail from Holland of Tuesday last is not yet come in.
