

tion 54, each Statute being passed by the votes of not less than two-thirds of the number of persons present and voting at a General Meeting of the Governing Body of the said College, specially summoned for the purpose, and held on the 7th day of October, 1921.

I.

"The College may grant a pension out of the Corporate Revenues to any person who at the time of the approval of this Statute by the King in Council has served as Tutor or Lecturer for not less than thirty years and who is not entitled to a pension payable out of the Pension Fund, subject to the following conditions:—

"(1) Not more than one person shall be in receipt of such a pension at any one time, and no pension shall exceed £300 a year;

"(2) No pension shall be granted except by a Resolution of which not less than four weeks' notice has been given and which is carried by the votes of two-thirds of the Warden and Fellows present and voting at a Stated College Meeting;

"(3) So long as any pension is being paid under the provisions of this Statute, the maximum amount of £1,500 a year which may be contributed out of the Corporate Revenues into the Pension Fund under clause 8 of the amended Statute VIII. shall be reduced by the amount of such pension, and clause 8 aforesaid shall be read accordingly."

II.

"The College may pay an additional sum of £100 a year out of the Corporate Revenues to any person who at the time of the approval of this Statute by the King in Council is in receipt of a pension under the provisions of the Commissioners' Statutes relating to pensions."

PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the 3rd and 4th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 113, of the Act of the 6th and 7th years of Her said late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 37, and of the Act of the 19th and 20th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 104, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a Scheme, bearing date the 28th day of July, 1921, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the 3rd

and 4th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 113, of the Act of the 6th and 7th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 37, and of the Act of the 19th and 20th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 104, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following Scheme for constituting a Separate District for spiritual purposes out of the Parish of Southchurch, in the County of Essex and in the Diocese of Chelmsford:

"Whereas we are satisfied that the said Parish of Southchurch is a Parish wherein or in parts whereof the provision for public worship and for pastoral superintendence is insufficient for the spiritual wants of the inhabitants thereof and it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular part of the said Parish of Southchurch which is hereinafter mentioned and described should be constituted a separate District in the manner which is hereinafter set forth:

"And whereas there is not at present within the limits of the said proposed Separate District any consecrated Church or Chapel in use for the purpose of Divine Worship:

"And whereas by a certain Indenture bearing date on or about the 28th day of July, 1921, and made or expressed to be made under the authority of the 'New Parishes Acts, 1843, 1844, and 1856,' or some or one of them, between the Reverend Edward Ashurst Welch, Rector or Incumbent of the Rectory of the said Parish of Southchurch, of the first part, the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Randall Thomas, Archbishop of Canterbury, as the Patron in right of his See of the said Rectory of Southchurch, of the second part, the Right Reverend John Edwin, Bishop of Chelmsford, the Ordinary of the said Rectory of Southchurch, of the third part, and us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, of the fourth part (which Indenture is intended to be enrolled in the Chancery Division of the High Court of Justice), the said Edward Ashurst Welch did, with the consents of the said Randall Thomas, Archbishop of Canterbury, as such Patron as aforesaid, and of the said John Edwin, Bishop of Chelmsford, as such Bishop as aforesaid, grant and confirm unto the Minister of the District hereinafter recommended to be constituted and to his successors, and when such District shall have become a New Parish then to the Vicar or Incumbent of such New Parish and to his successors for the time being, a clear yearly rentcharge or net annual sum of £100 to be payable quarterly on the usual quarter days in every year free from and clear of all charges for First Fruits and Tenths and of all deductions, taxes, charges, rates, assessments and outgoings whatsoever (except on account of the tax on income or property, if any), the first of such quarterly payments to be made on such of the said quarter days as shall happen next after the date of the licence of the first Minister of the said proposed District, and to be a proportionate part of the said quarterly payment calculated from the date of the said licence to the said quarter day, such yearly rent charge to be for ever issuing and payable out of and charged upon the said Rectory of Southchurch, and the tithes or tithe commutation rentcharges, glebe lands, hereditaments, and all
