

tioned fence and then along the fence forming the western boundary of the close numbered 2179 upon the same maps for a distance in all of 8 chains or thereabouts to the point where the last-mentioned fence reaches the northern bank of the River Stour, and extending thence first southward in a straight line across the said river and then eastward along the southern bank of such river for a distance in all of 8 chains or thereabouts to the point where it is joined by the stream known as Small Waters upon the boundary which divides the said Parish of Wimborne Minster from the said Parish of Canford Magna."

And whereas the said Representation has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Salisbury.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the 59th year of His late Majesty King George the Third, Chapter 134, of the Act of the 2nd and 3rd years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 49, and of the Act of the 19th and 20th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 55, duly prepared, and laid before His Majesty in Council, a Representation, bearing date the 19th day of January, 1922, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the 59th year of His late Majesty King George the Third, Chapter 134, of the Act of the 2nd and 3rd years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 49, and of the Act of the 19th and 20th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 55, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following Representation as to the assignment of a District Chapelry to the consecrated Church of Saint Mark, Birkenhead, situate in the New Parish (sometime Particular District) of Saint John, Birkenhead, in the County of Chester and in the Diocese of Chester:

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a District Chapelry should be assigned to the said Church of Saint Mark, Birkenhead, situate as aforesaid:

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Henry Luke, Bishop of Chester (testified by his having signed and sealed this Representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said New Parish of Saint John, Birkenhead, which is described in the Schedule hereunder written, all

which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a District Chapelry to the said Church of Saint Mark, Birkenhead, situate as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Mark, Birkenhead.'

"And with the like consent of the said Henry Luke, Bishop of Chester (testified as aforesaid), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed at the said Church of Saint Mark, Birkenhead, situate as aforesaid, and that the fees or dues to be received in respect of the publication of banns and of the solemnization or performance of marriages, churchings, and burials should be paid and belong to the Minister of the same church for the time being.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration and to make such Order with respect thereto as to Your Majesty, in Your Royal Wisdom, shall seem meet.

"THE SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Saint Mark, Birkenhead, being:—

"All that part of the New Parish (sometime Particular District) of Saint John, Birkenhead, in the County of Chester and in the Diocese of Chester, which is bounded upon the south-east by the New Parish of Tranmere, upon the south and upon the west by the New Parish of Christ Church, Claughton-cum-Grange, upon the north partly by the New Parish of Saint Anne, Birkenhead, and partly by the New Parish of Saint Matthew, Birkenhead, all in the said County and Diocese, and upon the remaining side, that is to say, upon the east by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said New Parish of Saint Matthew, Birkenhead, from the said New Parish of Saint John, Birkenhead, at the junction of Claughton Road with Bentinck Street and Eastbourne Road, and extending thence south-westward along the middle of Eastbourne Road for a distance of 6½ chains or thereabouts to its junction with Grange Road West and Westbourne Road, and extending thence south-westward along the middle of Westbourne Road for a distance of 2 chains or thereabouts to its junction with Windsor Street, and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of Windsor Street for a distance of 7 chains or thereabouts to its junction with Oxtan Road, and extending thence south-westward along the middle of Oxtan Road for a distance of 1½ chains or thereabouts to its junction with Quarry Street, and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of Quarry Street for a distance of 5 chains or thereabouts to its junction with Borough Road where the boundaries of the said New Parish of Saint John, Birkenhead, the New Parish of Saint Paul, Birkenhead, in the said County and Diocese, and the said New Parish of Tranmere, all meet."
