Cadiz, Dec. 30. N. S. On the 30th of the
last month, and first Instant, arrived here 13
Sail of English Merchant Ships, laden with
Fish, in 30 days from St. John's in Newfoundland;
They came from thence about 30 Sail, un-
der Convoy of the *Soldados-Prize*, Lieutenant
Clifton Commander, who having seen them safe
in Port, proceeded for the *Streights* with 5 Mer-
chantmen, and a Prize he has taken; The rest of
the Ships of his Convoy put into several Ports of
Portugal. The 3d came in the *Romney* Galley, and
on the 8th the *Martin* Galley, both from *England*.
The 11th arrived the *Pembroke* Frigate, Captain
Studley, being separated from the Fleet under the
Command of Vice-Admiral *Nevill* on the 27th
past. The 12th came in the *Oxford*, Capt. *Step-
ney*, (who was bound with the *Dreadnought* to *New-
foundland*, but parted from her the 28th of *No-
vember* in a Storm) having been 3 months
and a day from *Plymouth*, by reason of con-
trary Winds. The 19th arrived here Vice-
Admiral *Nevill*, with Five English and Four
Dutch Men of War, and divers Merchant Ships;
Three English Ships, the *Sarah*, *John Ward* Ma-
ster; the *Mary*, *Henry Valet*; and a small Pink
called the *Anna* and *Elizabeth*, sunk at Sea in bad
Weather, but all the Men were saved by the other
Ships of the Fleet, except 5 belonging to the
Vessel last mentioned; The *Leon Despierto*, a Dutch
Ship, was cast away on the Coast of *Chipona*.
The 27th arrived the rest of the Fleet, with
the Dutch Vice-Admiral, and 4 Men of War;
The other Dutch Man of War, with several
Merchant Ships, being put into the River of
Lisbon. Vice Admiral *Nevill* will go to Sea again
in few days with a Squadron of Men of War.

Madrid, Jan. 9. The King and Queen of Spain
are perfectly recovered of their late Illness. On
Sunday last they went to visit the Convent of the
Lady of *Atocha*; and were abroad again this day
to take the Air. New Levies are making both of
Horse and Foot to augment the Spanish Army in
Catalonia, which will consist this next Campaign,
of 20000 Foot and 5000 Horse; and the Council
of State have resolved on several Taxes to raise
Money for the War. Don *Onorato Papachino*,
Vice-Admiral of Spain, died the 9th Instant at
Port-Royal. They write from *Malaga*, that on
the 30th of December passed by that place the *Ox-
ford*, with 10 English Merchant Ships, bound to
Alicant and *Barcelona*.

Corunna, Jan. 22. The 17th Instant sailed the
Spanish-Expedition Pacquet-Boat, having been de-
tained here some time by bad Weather and con-
trary Winds. The 19th a *Flashing* Privateer cal-
led the *Grand-Courteen*, brought into this Port a
French Vessel from *Bayenne*, laden with Iron, Bran-
dy, and other Goods, and bound to *Lisbon*. The
Spanish-Alliance Pacquet Boat arrived here yester-
day in 5 days from *Falmouth*.

Genoa, Jan. 27. Two Vessels are arrived here this week from *Messina*, the Masters who report, that they are firing out 10 Men of War at *Toulon*, which 'tis believed are designed for *Catalonia*.

Lisbon, Jan. 28. On the 24th Instant arrived here the *Bridget*, Capt. *Hevern*, from *Toulon*; and the 26th the *Bilboa* Galley, Capt. *Leonard Mocher*, from *Alexandria*; The latter brings advice, that Capt. *Kent*, Commander of the *Slaughter*, to kill lately a French Ship of above 200 Tons laden with Corn from the *Moraea*, and sold her for 20000 Dollars. The *Tuscany*, Capt. *Bary*, sailed this week for *Seaton*. The homeward-bound *Turkey* Convoy departed from *Troy* the 31st of the last month, under command of Commodore *Moody*. The Great Prince and Princess are come to pass the Carnival in this place.

Venice, Febr. 2. The Senate continue to give out Commissions for new Levies; part of which are to be employed in *Dalmatia*; and the rest in the *Moraea*. They work with great diligence in the Arsenal here on several new Men of War and Gallies, which are intended for the Service of the next Campaign.

Vienna, Febr. 2. Prince *Lewis* of *Baden* is arrived here from *Germany*. Count *Harach* is gone for *Italy*, and after having dispatched the Business he is charged with at *Milan*, will embark at *Genova*, in order to his passing to the Court of *Spain*, where he is to reside on the part of the Emperor. The Baron *Seyler*, whom his Imperial Majesty has appointed his Third Plenipotentiary for the Treaty of Peace, prepares for his departure; the other two, the Count *de Gaurits*, and the Count *de Straetman*, being already at the *Hague*.

Frankfort, Febr. 10. This City raises Men in order to furnish their Quota of the Troops the several Circles have resolved to bring into the Field this Summer. A great Magazine is provided at *Hailbron* for the use of the Confederate Forces.

Hamburg, Febr. 12. Letters from *Warsaw* of the 28th past give an account, that the French Ambassador, and those of his Party, did all they could to hinder the good success of the Commission of *Lemberg*, but by all appearance they will miss of their aim. Prince *James* was gone to *Silesia*, and 'tis discoursed, that he intends to make a Visit to the Court of *Vienna*. Here passes nothing at present in the Business of *Holstein*.

Paris, Febr. 11. A Council of War was held at *Ver-sailles* two days ago, where the French King named the Generals that are to command his Armies this Summer, viz. the *Marschals de Villeroi* and *Boufflers* in *Flanders*; *de Choiseul* on the *Upper-Rhine*; *de Camille* on the *Lower-Rhine*; and the Duke *de Vendosme* in *Catalonia*; and they have all received Orders to hasten the preparations for their departure. The French King has named the Count *de Briole* to go his Ambassador to the Duke of *Savoy*. They continue to fit out about 20 Men of War at *Brest*; and 10 or 12 at *Rochefort*. We have had no News of Monsieur *Pointi* since he sailed from *Brest*. The two young Princes of *Poland* are going home again; 'Tis said, that the Abbot *Polignac*, the French Ambassador in *Poland*, will be recalled, not being acceptable to the Chief Ministers at that Court; but no body is yet named to succeed him. The French Plenipotentiaries for the Treaty of Peace are ready to depart; and stay only for their Passports.

Brussels, Febr. 13. On Friday last above 100 Wagons were sent from *Mannes* towards *Maastricht*; 'Tis believed they are to carry Provisions to *Namur*; where Lieutenant General *Cochorne* lies very ill; and the Elector of *Bavaria* has sent him his first Physician. The French Officers meet with great difficulty, to get Horses for recruiting their Cavalry.

Hague, Febr. 15. N. S. The Letters from *Namur* come in this day, 13y, a great Convoy of all sorts of Provisions was safely arrived there from *Maastricht* and *Mannes*. The Centurion and *Essex-Prize*, are still at *Hallowes-says*, being detained by the Ice.

Falmouth, Febr. 6. On the first Instant came into this Port two Ships, the *St. Joseph de Gonzales* of *Lisbon*, and the *Conception of Genoa*, both from *Lisbon*, and bound to *Amsterdam*. The 3d Instant came in the *Spanish Alliance*, and *Spanish Expedition*, Packet-Boats, with several Mails from the *Groyne*; and the latter is now under Sail, to return thither, with Two Mails.

Plimouth, Febr. 7. This day came in from the Eastward His Majesty's Ship *Pendennis*, with several Merchant Ships under her Convoy.

Bristol, Febr. 6. On the 3d Instant arrived here the *Maria* Brigantine, in 9 weeks from *Sever*; and yesterday the *Nestra Signora* from *Bilboa*.

Ceester, Febr. 8. On the 5th Instant arrived in this Port a small French Prize called the *Nestra Dame de Grace*, which was taken by a Dutch Privateer in the Bay of *Spain*, laden with Orange and Lemon from *Lisbon*.

There have been lately apprehended and committed to Newgate these Persons following, viz. Thomas Gazeroy, George Penn, John Spillett, William Day, George Martin, John Ayres, Evan Evans, and Evan Thomas, who are accused of several Robberies and Burglaries, viz. some of them Robbed several Passengers in November last upon Stamford-Hill near Newington, and at the same time Robbed 3 Passengers of their Horses; and in December last some of them Robbed a Gentleman's Coach near Hackney, and took away a Diamond Ring, a plain Gold Ring, and other things; from the Gentleman and a Gentlewoman that were in the Coach; and in December some of them Robbed several Horse-men, Footmen, and Wagons, near Hyde-Park-Corner, and at the same time took a blackish Horse from a Gentleman; and about the same time some of them Robbed 2 Coaches, several Wagons and Horsemen upon rinceley Common; and upon New-years-day at night some of them broke open a House about a mile from the City of Canterbury; and about the middle of May last some of them Robbed the House of Mr. Martin at Osweil in the County of Surry; and in the same month some of them broke open a Dye-house at Bow; and in December last Robbed a Man going from Biamford Market to Harrow on the Hill. Any Persons that have been Robbed as aforesaid, may repair to Newgate, and have a fight of the said Persons, and prosecute them for the same.
