

Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 37, duly prepared, and laid before His Majesty in Council, a Scheme, bearing date the 2nd day of February, 1922, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

“ We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the 6th and 7th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 37, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following Scheme for authorizing the sale and disposal of certain property situate in the County of Southampton now vested in us:

“ Whereas the property, particulars whereof are set forth in the Schedule hereunder written, is now vested in us not subject to any outstanding beneficial lease or grant but in possession, and we are desirous of selling the same or some portion thereof for the improvement of our Common Fund:

“ Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose to Your Majesty that we may be authorized and empowered to sell or dispose of and duly to transfer or convey from time to time all or part of the said property described in the said Schedule for such consideration as shall appear to us to be just and reasonable.

“ The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Act.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the Diocese of Winchester.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the 33rd and 34th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 39, and of the Acts therein mentioned, that is to

say, the Act of the 3rd and 4th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 113, the Act of the 4th and 5th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 39, and the Act of the 31st and 32nd years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 114, duly prepared, and laid before His Majesty in Council, a Scheme, bearing date the 19th day of January, 1922, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

“ We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the 33rd and 34th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 39, and of the Acts therein mentioned, that is to say, the Act of the 3rd and 4th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 113, the Act of the 4th and 5th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 39, and the Act of the 31st and 32nd years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 114, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following Scheme for effecting a transfer of the ownership of the Advowson or perpetual right of Patronage of and presentation to the Church and Cure (hereinafter called ‘ the said Benefice ’) of Saint Stephen, Westminster, in the City of Westminster, and in the Diocese of London:

“ Whereas the Advowson or perpetual right of Patronage of and presentation to the said Benefice of Saint Stephen, Westminster, is vested for an estate in fee simple without incumbrances, in the Honourable George Peel, of Mancetter Manor, Atherstone, in the County of Warwick, and Thomas Lawrence Kesteven, of Number 6, New Square, Lincoln's Inn, London, W.C., Esquire:

“ And whereas the said (George Peel and Thomas Lawrence Kesteven are desirous that the whole Advowson or perpetual right of Patronage of and presentation to the said Benefice of Saint Stephen, Westminster, now vested in them as aforesaid should be transferred to and be vested in the Bishop of London for the time being:

“ And whereas the Right Honourable and Right Reverend Arthur Foley, now Bishop of London, is willing to accept such transfer, and in token of such his willingness and also in token that the same transfer has that consent of the Bishop of the Diocese which by the Acts in the hereinbefore mentioned Act recited or by some or one of them is made necessary he, the said Arthur Foley, Bishop of London, has executed this Scheme as herein-after mentioned:

“ And whereas the transfer of the Patronage of the said Benefice of Saint Stephen, Westminster, which is hereinbefore mentioned and hereinafter recommended and proposed will in our opinion tend to make better provision for the cure of souls in the Parish or District in or in respect of which the right of Patronage or Advowson so recommended and proposed to be transferred as aforesaid arises or exists, that is to say, in the New Parish of Saint Stephen, Westminster:

“ Now, therefore, with the consent of the said George Peel and Thomas Lawrence Kesteven (in testimony whereof they have signed and sealed this Scheme), and with the consent of the said Arthur Foley, Bishop of London, (in testimony whereof he has signed this Scheme and sealed the same with his Episcopal Seal), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly recommend
