SECTION III.—In cases where a worker is employed on Piece-Work, each Piece-Rate paid must be such as would yield, in the circumstances of the case, not less than the appropriate Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate to an ORDINARY WORKER, i.e., a worker of ordinary skill and experience in the class of work in question.

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PART III.

PROPOSED VARIATION OF OVERTIME RATES FOR MALE AND FEMALE WORKERS (ALL AGES).

Overtime Rates calculated on the proposed minimum rates of wages set out in Parts I and II of this Schedule in the manner specified in Section II of Part III of the Schedule to the Trade Board's Notice M.T. (3), dated 3rd February, 1922, shall apply in substitution for the proposed minimum rates in respect of all hours worked in excess of the number declared by the Trade Board in Section I of Part III of their Notice M.T. (3) to be the normal number of hours of work in the trade.

PART IV.

For the purpose of the application of the minimum rates of wages set out in this Schedule: A LEARNER IS A WORKER WHO:—

- (a) Is employed during the whole or a substantial part of his or her time in learning one of the following operations:—
 - (a) Machining,

B.—All OTHER FEMALE WORKERS

- (b) Cutting,
- (c) Awl and needle stitching,
- (d) Operations performed by Palm and Needle Hands (including the Roping of Tents and Coal Sacks),
