

Burton Fleming with Fordon shall be transferred from the said Rural Deanery of Scarborough to the said Rural Deanery of Bridlington; and each of the Parishes or Cures hereinbefore referred to shall be subject to the jurisdiction and authority of the Rural Dean of the Rural Deanery to which it is hereby transferred, and shall not belong to or be a part of any other Rural Deanery, nor be subject to the jurisdiction and authority of any other Rural Dean.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other matter or thing with respect to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, by virtue of the said Acts, or of any of them, or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas notices of the said Scheme have, in accordance with the provisions of the secondly hereinbefore mentioned Act, been transmitted to the Archdeacons affected by the Scheme, that is to say, to the Archdeacon of York or the West Riding, and to the Archdeacon of the East Riding, and they have expressed their approval of the same:

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of York.

**WHEREAS** the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the 33rd and 34th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 39, and of the Acts therein mentioned, that is to say, the Act of the 3rd and 4th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 113, the Act of the 4th and 5th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 39, and the Act of the 31st and 32nd years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 114, duly prepared, and laid before His Majesty in Council, a Scheme, bearing date the 16th day of March, 1922, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the 33rd and 34th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 39, and of the Acts therein mentioned, that is to say, the Act of the 3rd and 4th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 113, the Act of the 4th and 5th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 39, and the Act of the 31st and 32nd years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 114, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council,

the following Scheme for effecting a transfer of the ownership of the Advowson or perpetual right of Patronage of and presentation to the Church and Cure (hereinafter called 'the said Benefice') of Saint John, Treslothan, in the County of Cornwall and in the Diocese of Truro:

"Whereas the Advowson or perpetual right of Patronage of and presentation to the said Benefice of Saint John, Treslothan, is vested for an estate in fee simple without incumbrances in John Stackhouse Pendarves, of Ingleside, Wantage, in the County of Berks, Esquire, subject only to the life interest of William Cole Pendarves, of Pendarves, Camborne, in the said County of Cornwall, Esquire:

"And whereas the said John Stackhouse Pendarves and the said William Cole Pendarves are desirous that the whole Advowson or perpetual right of Patronage of and presentation to the said Benefice of Saint John, Treslothan, now vested in them as aforesaid should be transferred to and be vested in the Bishop of Truro for the time being:

"And whereas the Right Reverend Frederic Sumpter Guy, now Bishop of Truro, is willing to accept such transfer, and in token of such his willingness and also in token that the same transfer has that consent of the Bishop of the Diocese which by the Acts in the hereinbefore mentioned Act recited or by some or one of them is made necessary, he, the said Frederic Sumpter Guy, Bishop of Truro, has executed this Scheme as hereinafter mentioned:

"And whereas the transfer of the Patronage of the said Benefice of Saint John, Treslothan, which is hereinbefore mentioned and hereinafter recommended and proposed will in our opinion tend to make better provision for the cure of souls in the Parish or District in or in respect of which the right of Patronage or Advowson so recommended and proposed to be transferred as aforesaid arises or exists, that is to say, in the New Parish of Saint John, Treslothan:

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the said John Stackhouse Pendarves and the said William Cole Pendarves (in testimony whereof they have respectively signed and sealed this Scheme), and with the consent of the said Frederic Sumpter Guy, Bishop of Truro (in testimony whereof he has signed this Scheme and sealed the same with his Episcopal Seal), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the whole Advowson or perpetual right of Patronage of and presentation to the said Benefice of Saint John, Treslothan, now vested in them the said John Stackhouse Pendarves and the said William Cole Pendarves as aforesaid, shall be transferred to the said Frederic Sumpter Guy, Bishop of Truro, and his successors in the same Bishopric and shall thereupon and thenceforth become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said Frederic Sumpter Guy, Bishop of Truro, and by his successors in the same Bishopric for ever.
