WHEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Memorial from the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, dated the 8th day of May, 1922, (C.W. 5080/22), in the words following, viz.:—

“Whereas by section 3 of the Naval and Marine Pay and Pensions Act, 1865, it is enacted, *inter alia*, that all pay, pensions, or other allowances in the nature thereof, payable in respect of services in Your Majesty's Naval or Marine Force to a person being or having been an Officer, Seaman, or Marine therein, shall be paid in such manner, and subject to such restrictions, conditions, and provisions as are from time to time directed by Order in Council:

“And whereas Your Majesty was graciously pleased by Your Orders in Council bearing dates the 19th day of July, 1912, and the 21st day of January, 1914, to sanction the institution of the ranks of Mate and Mate (E) respectively in Your Majesty's Naval Service:

“And whereas it is necessary that provision should be made for the retirement of Mates and Mates (E) from Your Majesty's Naval Service:

“We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council, to sanction the following regulations:—

(1) Mates and Mates (E) to be retired at the age of 40 years, or at any age, at the discretion of the Admiralty, if found physically unfit to serve.

(2) Mates and Mates (E) to be retired at any age as soon as two years have elapsed since their last service as Mate or Mate (E).

“The Lords Commissioners of Your Majesty's Treasury have signified their concurrence in this proposal.”

His Majesty, having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

"Whereas by Section 3 of the Naval and Marine Pay and Pensions Act, 1865, it is enacted, inter alia, that all pay, pensions, or other allowances in the nature thereof, payable in respect of services in Your Majesty's Naval or Marine Force to a person being, or having been, an Officer, Seaman or Marine therein, shall be paid in such manner, and subject to such restrictions, conditions, and provisions as are from time to time directed by Order in Council:

"And whereas Your Majesty was graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council bearing the date the 14th day of October, 1913, to sanction the application to the widows and the children of Royal Marine Gunners of the Regulations governing the award of pensions and compassionate allowances to the widows and children of Gunners of Your Majesty's Navy:

"And whereas Your Majesty was also graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council bearing date the 9th day of February, 1920, to approve of Acting Warrant Officers of Your Majesty's Navy being treated as Warrant Officers for the purposes of injury awards, and widows' pensions and compassionate allowances to children:

"And whereas we are of opinion that Acting Royal Marine Gunners should similarly be treated as Royal Marine Gunners for these purposes:

"We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council, to sanction their treatment accordingly, with retrospective effect to cover the cases of Royal Marine Gunners who were promoted to the acting rank of Royal Marine Gunner to meet additional requirements during the war and being supernumerary to requirements at the conclusion of hostilities were retired before being confirmed in rank.

"The Lords Commissioners of Your Majesty's Treasury have signified their concurrence in this proposal."

His Majesty, having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Union of Benefices Act, 1919, duly prepared, and laid before His Majesty in Council,

a Scheme, bearing date the 2nd day of March, 1922, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, acting in pursuance of the Union of Benefices Act, 1919, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following Scheme for effecting the union of two neighbouring Benefices, that is to say, the Benefice (being a Vicarage) of Huddersfield (Saint Peter) and the Benefice (being a Vicarage) of Saint Mark, Huddersfield, both of which Benefices are situate in the County of York and in the Diocese of Wakefield:

"Whereas Commissioners appointed at our request by the Right Reverend George Rodney, Bishop of Wakefield, pursuant to the provisions of the said Union of Benefices Act, 1919, to inquire into and report upon the union of the said two Benefices of Huddersfield (Saint Peter) and Saint Mark, Huddersfield, duly made their Report to the said Bishop of Wakefield, and therein recommended the union of the said two Benefices and the terms for effecting the union, and the said Bishop of Wakefield signified his approval of the said Report:

"And whereas we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, have prepared this Scheme for the union of the said two Benefices which Scheme is based upon the terms recommended in the said Report but with the assent of the said Bishop of Wakefield embodies certain modifications thereof:

"And whereas the Patronage of the said Benefice of Huddersfield (Saint Peter) is vested in the Wakefield Diocesan Church Organisation Society (a Company incorporated under the Companies Acts 1862 to 1893) and the Patronage of the said Benefice of Saint Mark, Huddersfield, is vested in certain trustees namely Sir Edward Hildred Carlile, Baronet, of Ponsbourne Park, in the County of Hertford, the Venerable Richard Charles Musgrave Harvey, Archdeacon of Huddersfield, and the Reverend Canon Albert Darell Tupper Carey, Vicar of Huddersfield (Saint Peter):

"And whereas each of the said Benefices of Huddersfield (Saint Peter) and Saint Mark, Huddersfield, is now full, the said Albert Darell Tupper Carey being the present Incumbent of the said Benefice of Huddersfield (Saint Peter) and the Reverend Jonas Pilling being the present Incumbent of the said Benefice of Saint Mark, Huddersfield:

"And whereas only one Parsonage House will be left standing or remaining within or belonging to the United Benefice when the union which is hereinafter recommended and proposed shall take effect, namely the Parsonage House belonging to the said Benefice of Huddersfield (Saint Peter), and such house will accordingly be the Parsonage House of the United Benefice:

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the said George Rodney, Bishop of Wakefield (in testimony whereof he has hereunto set his hand), and with the consent of the said Wakefield Diocesan Church Organisation Society (in testimony whereof they have hereunto set their Common Seal), and with the consent of the said Edward Hildred Carlile, Richard Charles Musgrave Harvey and Albert Darell Tupper Carey (in testimony whereof they have hereunto set their hands and seals), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly recom-

mend and propose to Your Majesty as follows, that is to say:—

“ 1. That the said Benefice of Huddersfield (Saint Peter) and the said Benefice of Saint Mark, Huddersfield, shall be permanently united together and form one Benefice with cure of souls under the style of ‘The United Benefice of Huddersfield’ and that the Parishes of the said Benefice shall also be united into one Parish for ecclesiastical purposes and for such other purposes as in the said Act provided.

“ 2. That the Church of the Parish of Huddersfield (Saint Peter) shall be the Parish Church of the United Benefice and that the Table of Fees for the said Parish of Huddersfield (Saint Peter) shall (until revised or altered by proper authority) be the Table of Fees for the United Parish.

“ 3. That if upon the day when an Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme shall be published in the London Gazette both of the said two Benefices shall be vacant the union of the same two Benefices shall take effect forthwith, and if the said Benefice of Saint Mark, Huddersfield, only shall be then vacant the said union shall also take effect forthwith if the Incumbent of the other of the said two Benefices shall consent to become the first Incumbent of the United Benefice, but if he shall not so consent, then the said union shall take effect upon the then next avoidance of the said Benefice of Huddersfield (Saint Peter) and the then Incumbent of Saint Mark, Huddersfield, shall be the first Incumbent of the United Benefice; and if the said Benefice of Huddersfield (Saint Peter) only shall be then vacant the said union shall take effect upon the next avoidance of the said Benefice of Saint Mark, Huddersfield; and if neither of the said two Benefices be then vacant, then the said union shall take effect on the next avoidance of the said Benefice of Saint Mark, Huddersfield, if the Incumbent at that time of the said Benefice of Huddersfield (Saint Peter) shall have been instituted to Huddersfield (Saint Peter) subsequently to the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme or if instituted before that date shall consent to become the Incumbent of the United Benefice; but if he shall have been instituted to Huddersfield (Saint Peter) before that date and shall not so consent, then the said union shall take effect immediately upon the next vacancy of the Benefice of Huddersfield (Saint Peter) following such avoidance of the Benefice of Saint Mark, Huddersfield, and the then Incumbent of Saint Mark, Huddersfield, shall become the first Incumbent of the United Benefice.

“ 4. That a Curate be appointed to assist in performing the duties of the United Benefice.

“ 5. That after the said union has taken effect the whole right of Patronage of and presentation to the United Benefice shall belong to and be exercised by the Patrons of the said Benefice of Huddersfield (Saint Peter) their successors and assigns for ever.

“ 6. That upon the union taking effect a portion of the endowments at present belonging to the said Benefice of Saint Mark, Huddersfield, and held by us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England that is to say a sum of £5,314 Great Northern Railway £3 per cent. per annum Debenture Stock, shall be held by us upon trust for the United Benefice and the income arising therefrom shall be

paid by us from time to time as it shall accrue to the Incumbent of the United Benefice to be applied to or towards the provision of the stipend of the Curate to be appointed as aforesaid to assist in performing the duties of the United Benefice, and all the other endowments belonging to the said Benefice of Saint Mark, Huddersfield, (all of which are held by us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England) shall be held by us, for and towards the endowment of a new District proposed to be constituted within the Rural Deanery of Huddersfield and until such new District shall have been constituted the income arising from such last mentioned endowments shall be accumulated by us towards the endowment of such new District.

“ Provided always that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, or of any other Act of Parliament.”

And whereas drafts of the said Scheme have been published locally in the manner prescribed in the Statutory Rules made under the said Act and also transmitted in the manner so prescribed to the Patrons affected, together with a Notice in each case requiring any objections to such draft Scheme to be stated or transmitted in writing to the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners within the time prescribed in the same Rules:

And whereas certain objections have been so stated or transmitted to the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners within the time prescribed in the same Rules:

And whereas the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners after giving full consideration to such objections have deemed right to make no alterations in such draft Scheme:

And whereas public notice of the certification to His Majesty in Council of the said Scheme and the consent thereto in writing of the Bishop of Wakefield has been duly given in the manner and within the time prescribed in the Statutory Rules aforesaid:

And whereas no appeal has been made to His Majesty in Council within the period of one month after the date of the said public notice in accordance with the provisions of the said Act against the said Scheme or any part thereof by any person who has made objection as aforesaid to the said draft Scheme:

And whereas the two Benefices affected by the said Scheme are both situate in a City or Municipal Borough:

And whereas the said Scheme has been laid before both Houses of Parliament for the space of two calendar months:

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to affirm the said Scheme and to order that the two Benefices therein recommended to be united shall be united to the extent and for the purposes recommended in the said Scheme and further to order and direct that the said Scheme and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Act.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this

Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Wakefield.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, acting in pursuance of the Union of Benefices Act, 1919, and of the Act of the 37th and 38th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 63, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following Scheme for effecting the union of two neighbouring Benefices, that is to say, the Benefice (being a Vicarage) of Elmstone Hardwicke with Uckington and the Benefice (being a Rectory) of Swindon, both of which Benefices are situate in the County of Gloucester and in the Diocese of Gloucester:

"Whereas Commissioners appointed at our request by the Right Reverend Edgar Charles Sumner, Bishop of Gloucester, pursuant to the provisions of the said Union of Benefices Act, 1919, to inquire into and report upon the union of the said two Benefices of Elmstone Hardwicke with Uckington and Swindon duly made their Report to the said Bishop of Gloucester and therein recommended the union of the said two Benefices and the terms for effecting the union, and the said Bishop of Gloucester signified in writing his approval of the said Report:

"And whereas we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, have prepared this Scheme for the union of the said two Benefices based upon the terms recommended in the said Report:

"And whereas the said Benefice of Swindon is now full, the Reverend Hubert Alfred Corke being the present Incumbent thereof, and the said Benefice of Elmstone Hardwicke with Uckington is at present vacant:

"And whereas the said Hubert Alfred Corke has consented to become the first Incumbent of the United Benefice, if and when the union which is hereinafter recommended and proposed shall take effect:

"Now, therefore, we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, with the consent of the said Edgar Charles Sumner, Bishop of Gloucester (in testimony whereof he has signed this Scheme and sealed the same with his Episcopal Seal), do humbly recommend and propose to Your Majesty as follows, that is to say:—

"1. That the said Benefice of Elmstone Hardwicke with Uckington and the said Benefice of Swindon shall be permanently united together and form one Benefice with cure of souls under the style of 'The United Benefice of Swindon with Uckington and Elmstone

Hardwicke' and that such United Benefice shall be included in and form part of the Archdeaconry of Cheltenham and the Rural Deanery of Cheltenham but the Parishes of the said Benefices shall continue distinct in all respects.

"2. That upon the day when any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme shall be published in the London Gazette the union shall forthwith take effect, and the said Hubert Alfred Corke if he is then Incumbent of the said Benefice of Swindon shall be the first Incumbent of the United Benefice.

"3. That upon the said union taking effect the Parsonage House at present belonging to the said Benefice of Swindon shall become and be the house of residence for the Incumbent of the United Benefice and so soon as conveniently may be the Parsonage House at present belonging to the said Benefice of Elmstone Hardwicke with Uckington and the site and appurtenances thereof and the grounds heretofore usually occupied and enjoyed therewith shall be sold and disposed of by us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners at such time or times and in such manner in all respects as to us shall seem expedient and that the net proceeds of such sale shall constitute and form part of the fund created by the 13th Section of the said Union of Benefices Act, 1919.

"4. That after the said union has taken effect the course and succession in which the respective Patrons shall present or nominate to the United Benefice from time to time as the same shall become vacant shall be as follows, that is to say, the right of presentation shall be exercised by the Patrons of the said two Benefices alternately, the Patrons of the said Benefice of Elmstone Hardwicke with Uckington having the right upon the first presentation to the United Benefice to be made after the union and every alternate right of presentation and the Patron of the said Benefice of Swindon having the right of presentation upon the second presentation to the United Benefice to be made after the union and every alternate turn thereafter.

"Provided always that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas drafts of the said Scheme have been published locally in the manner prescribed in the Statutory Rules made under the said Act and also transmitted in the manner so prescribed to the Patrons affected together with a Notice in each case requiring any objections to such draft Scheme to be stated or transmitted in writing to the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners within the time prescribed in the same Rules:

And whereas certain objections have been so stated or transmitted to the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners within the time prescribed in the same Rules:

And whereas the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners after giving full consideration to such objections have deemed right to make no alterations in such draft Scheme:

And whereas public Notice of the certification to His Majesty in Council of the said Scheme and the consent thereto in writing of the Bishop of Gloucester has been duly given in the manner and within the time prescribed in the Statutory Rules aforesaid:

And whereas no appeal has been made to His Majesty in Council within the period of one month after the date of the said public notice in accordance with the provisions of the said Act against the said Scheme or any part thereof by any person who has made objection as aforesaid to the said draft Scheme:

And whereas neither of the two Benefices affected by the said Scheme is situate in a City or Municipal Borough:

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to affirm the said Scheme and to order that the two Benefices therein recommended to be united shall be united to the extent and for the purposes recommended in the said Scheme and further to order and direct that the said Scheme and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts.

"Whereas Commissioners appointed at our request by the Right Reverend George Wyndham, late Bishop of Bath and Wells, pursuant to the provisions of the said Union of Benefices Act, 1919, to inquire into and report upon the union of the said two Benefices of Ashwick and All Saints, Oakhill, duly made their Report to the said George Wyndham, Bishop of Bath and Wells, and therein recommended the union of the said two Benefices and the terms for effecting the union, and the said George Wyndham, Bishop of Bath and Wells, signified in writing his approval of the said Report:

"And whereas both of the said Benefices of All Saints, Oakhill, and Ashwick are now full, the Reverend Charles Shipley Cockbill being the present Incumbent of the said Benefice of All Saints, Oakhill, and the Reverend Matthew Joseph Stent being the present Incumbent of the said Benefice of Ashwick:

"Now, therefore, we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, with the consent of the said St. John Basil Wynne, Bishop of Bath and Wells, (in testimony whereof he has hereunto set his hand), do humbly recommend and propose to Your Majesty as follows, that is to say:—

"1. That the said Benefice of Ashwick and the said Benefice of All Saints, Oakhill, shall be permanently united together and form one Benefice with cure of souls under the style of 'The United Benefice of Ashwick with Oakhill' but the Parishes of the said Benefices shall continue distinct in all respects.

"2. That if upon the day when any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme shall be published in the London Gazette both of the said two Benefices shall be vacant, the union of the same two Benefices shall take effect forthwith; and if the said Benefice of All Saints, Oakhill, only shall be then vacant the said union shall also take effect forthwith if the Incumbent of the other of the said two Benefices shall consent to become the first Incumbent of the United Benefice, but if he shall not so consent, then the said union shall take effect upon the then next avoidance of the said Benefice of Ashwick and the then Incumbent of All Saints, Oakhill, shall be the first Incumbent of the United Benefice; and if the said Benefice of Ashwick only shall be then vacant the said union shall take effect upon the next avoidance of the said Benefice of All Saints, Oakhill, and if neither of the said two Benefices be then vacant, then the said union shall take effect on the next avoidance of the said Benefice of All Saints, Oakhill, if the Incumbent at that time of the said Benefice of Ashwick shall have been instituted to Ashwick subsequently to the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme or if instituted before that date shall consent to become the Incumbent of the United Benefice: but if he shall have been instituted to Ashwick before that date and shall not so consent then the said union shall take effect immediately upon the next vacancy of the Benefice of All Saints, Ashwick, following such avoidance of the Benefice of All Saints, Oakhill, and the then Incumbent of All Saints, Oakhill, shall become the first Incumbent of the United Benefice.

"3. That upon the said union taking effect the Parsonage House at present belonging to the said Benefice of Ashwick shall become and be the house of residence for the Incumbent of the United Benefice.

That after the said union has taken effect the course and succession in which the respective Patrons shall present and nominate to the United Benefice from time to time as the same shall become vacant shall be as follows, that is to say, the right of presentation shall be exercised by the Patrons of the said two Benefices alternately, the Patron of the said Benefice of All Saints, Oakhill, having the right upon the first presentation to the United Benefice to

be made after the union and every alternate right of presentation and the Patron of the said Benefice of Ashwick having the right upon the second presentation to the United Benefice to be made after the union and every alternate turn thereafter.

"Whereas Commissioners appointed at our request by the Right Reverend Henry Luke, Bishop of Chester, pursuant to the provisions of the said Union of Benefices Act, 1919, to inquire into and report upon the union of the said two Benefices of Guilden Sutton and Plemstall duly made their Report to the said Bishop of Chester, and therein recommended the union of the said two Benefices and the terms for effecting the union, and the said Bishop of Chester signified in writing his approval of the said Report:

"And whereas we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, have prepared this Scheme for the union of the said two Benefices which Scheme is based upon the terms recommended in the said Report, but with the assent of the said Bishop of Chester embodies certain modifications thereof:

"And whereas each of the said Benefices of Guilden Sutton and Plemstall is now full, the Reverend Bernard Norman Atkinson being the present Incumbent of the said Benefice of Guilden Sutton, and the Reverend Joseph Hooker Toogood being the present Incumbent of the said Benefice of Plemstall:

"And whereas the Advowson or perpetual right of Patronage of and presentation to each of the said Benefices of Guilden Sutton and Plemstall now belongs to one and the same Patron or Patrons:

"Now, therefore, we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, with the consent of the said Henry Luke, Bishop of Chester (in testimony whereof he has hereunto set his hand), do humbly recommend and propose to Your Majesty as follows, that is to say:—

"1. That the said Benefice of Guilden Sutton and the said Benefice of Plemstall shall be permanently united together and form one Benefice with cure of souls under the style of 'The United Benefice of Plemstall with Guilden Sutton,' but the Parishes of the said Benefices shall continue distinct in all respects.

"2. That if upon the day when any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme shall be published in the London Gazette both of the said two Benefices shall be vacant, the union of the same two Benefices shall take effect forthwith; and if one only of the said two Benefices shall be then vacant the said union shall take effect upon the next avoidance of the other of the said two Benefices; and if neither of the said two Benefices be then vacant the said union shall take effect upon the next avoidance of that one of the said two Benefices which shall last be avoided after the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme.

"3. That upon the said union taking effect the Parsonage House at present belonging to the said Benefice of Plemstall shall become and

be the house of residence for the Incumbent of the United Benefice.

"Provided always that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas drafts of the said Scheme have been published locally in the manner prescribed in the Statutory Rules made under the said Act and also transmitted in the manner so prescribed to the Patron affected, together with a Notice in each case requiring any objections to such draft Scheme to be stated or transmitted in writing to the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners within the time prescribed in the same Rules:

And whereas certain objections have been so stated or transmitted to the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners within the time prescribed in the same Rules:

And whereas the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners after giving full consideration to such objections have deemed right to make no alterations in such draft Scheme:

And whereas public notice of the certification to His Majesty in Council of the said Scheme and the consent thereto in writing of the Bishop of Chester has been duly given in the manner and within the time prescribed in the Statutory Rules aforesaid:

And whereas no appeal has been made to His Majesty in Council within the period of one month after the date of the said public notice in accordance with the provisions of the said Act against the said Scheme or any part thereof by any person who has made objection as aforesaid to the said draft Scheme:

And whereas neither of the two Benefices affected by the said Scheme is situate in a City or Municipal Borough:

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to affirm the said Scheme and to order that the two Benefices therein recommended to be united shall be united to the extent and for the purposes recommended in the said Scheme, and further to order and direct that the said Scheme and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Act.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Chester.

"Whereas Commissioners appointed at our request by the Right Reverend William, Bishop of Exeter, pursuant to the provisions of the said Union of Benefices Act, 1919, to inquire into and report upon the union of the said Benefice of Coryton with a portion of the said Benefice of Marystowe with Thrushelton and further to inquire into and report upon an union of the said Benefice of Lew Trenchard with the remaining portion of the said Benefice of Marystowe with Thrushelton duly made their Report to the said Bishop of Exeter and therein recommended the severance from the remaining portion of Marystowe with Thrushelton of so much of the Benefice and Parish of Marystowe with Thrushelton as is included in the ancient Chapelry of Thrushelton together with parts of the Hamlet known as Lew Down and the farmsteads known as Middle Raddon and East Raddon, and the union of the portion so severed to the contiguous Benefice and Parish of Lew Trenchard and therein further recommended the union of the remaining portion of the said Benefice of Marystowe with Thrushelton to the neighbouring Benefice of Coryton and the terms for effecting the said two unions and the said Bishop of Exeter signified in writing his approval of the said Report:

"And whereas we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, have prepared this Scheme for effecting the two unions of Benefices so recommended as aforesaid which Scheme is based upon the terms recommended in the said Report, but, with the assent of the said Bishop of Exeter, embodies certain modifications thereof:

"And whereas each of the said Benefices of Coryton, Marystowe with Thrushelton and Lew Trenchard, is now full, the Reverend Walter Geary Knocker being the present Incumbent of the Benefice of Coryton, the Venerable Ernest Frederick Newman being the present Incumbent of the said Benefice of Marystowe with Thrushelton, and the Reverend Sabine Baring-Gould being the present Incumbent of Lew Trenchard:

"Now, therefore, we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, with the consent of the said William, Bishop of Exeter (in testimony whereof he has hereunto set his hand), do humbly recommend and propose to Your Majesty as follows, that is to say:—

"1. That a portion of the said Benefice of Marystowe with Thrushelton, that is to say, so much of the said Parish of Marystowe with Thrushelton as is still included in and forms part of the ancient Chapelry of Thrushelton together with parts of the hamlet known as Lew Down and the farmsteads known as Middle Raddon and East Raddon (all of which territory is more particularly indicated upon the

annexed Map or Plan and thereon coloured Blue) shall be severed from the remaining portion of the same Parish of Marystowe with Thrushelton and for the purposes of the union of such severed portion with the Benefice and Parish of Lew Trenchard as hereinafter recommended and for the purpose of the union of the remaining portion of the said Benefice of Marystowe with Thrushelton with the Benefice of Coryton as hereinafter recommended such severed portion of the Benefice of Marystowe with Thrushelton shall be deemed to be a separate Benefice and Parish.

" 2. That the said Benefice of Marystowe with Thrushelton after the severance of such portion as aforesaid and the said Benefice of Coryton shall be permanently united together and form one Benefice with cure of souls under the style of 'The United Benefice of Marystowe with Coryton,' but the Parishes of the said Benefices shall continue distinct in all respects.

" 3. That the severed portion of the said Benefice of Marystowe with Thrushelton and the said Benefice of Lew Trenchard shall be permanently united together and form one Benefice with cure of souls and one Parish under the style of 'The United Benefice of Lew Trenchard with Thrushelton.'

" 4. That the church of the Parish of Lew Trenchard shall be the Parish Church of the United Benefice of Lew Trenchard with Thrushelton and that the Table of Fees for the said Parish of Lew Trenchard shall (until revised or altered by proper authority) be the Table of Fees for the United Parish.

" 5. That with the consent of the said Ernest Frederick Newman and the said Sabine Baring-Gould (testified by their signing this Scheme), (1) the severance of the portion of the Benefice of Marystowe with Thrushelton and the union of the severed portion with the Benefice of Lew Trenchard and (2) the union of the said two Benefices of Coryton and Marystowe with Thrushelton (after the severance from the last-mentioned Benefice of the portion thereof hereinbefore described) shall take effect upon the day when any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme shall be published in the London Gazette if the Benefice of Coryton be then vacant, or if the Benefice of Coryton be not then vacant the said unions shall take effect upon the next following vacation of the said Benefice of Coryton.

" 6. That upon the said unions taking effect the Parsonage House at present belonging to the said Benefice of Marystowe with Thrushelton shall become and be the house of residence for the Incumbent of the United Benefice of Marystowe with Coryton and the Parsonage House at present belonging to the said Benefice of Lew Trenchard shall become and be the house of residence for the Incumbent of the United Benefice of Lew Trenchard with Thrushelton, and, so soon as conveniently may be, the Parsonage House at present belonging to the said Benefice of Coryton and the site and appurtenances thereof and the grounds heretofore usually occupied and enjoyed therewith shall be sold and disposed of by us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners at such time or times and in such manner in all respects as to us shall seem expedient and that the net proceeds of such sale shall be applied by us firstly for the purpose of augmenting the United Benefice of Lew Trenchard with Thrushelton to a net annual income

as computed by us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners of £550 and that the remaining part (if any) of such proceeds shall constitute and form part of the fund created by the 13th section of the said Union of Benefices Act, 1919.

" 7. That after the said unions have taken effect (a) the course and succession in which the respective Patrons shall present or nominate to the United Benefice of Marystowe with Coryton from time to time as the same shall become vacant shall be as follows, that is to say, the right of presentation shall be exercised by the Patrons of the said two Benefices alternately, the Patron of the said Benefice of Coryton having the right upon the first presentation to the United Benefices to be made after the union and every alternate turn of presentation and the Patron of the said Benefice of Marystowe with Thrushelton having the right upon the second presentation to the United Benefice to be made after the union and every alternate turn thereafter and (b) the whole right of Patronage of and presentation to the United Benefice of Lew Trenchard with Thrushelton shall belong to the present Patron of the said Benefice of Lew Trenchard.

" 8. That upon the said unions taking effect the endowments of the said Benefice of Marystowe with Thrushelton shall be divided as follows, that is to say, there shall be transferred and annexed to the United Benefice of Lew Trenchard with Thrushelton the whole of the Tithe Rent Charges commuted at £109 arising within the Parish of Thrushelton and awarded in lieu of all the Vicarial or small tithes of Thrushelton and hitherto payable to the Incumbent of the said Benefice of Marystowe with Thrushelton; and all the remaining endowments of the said Benefice of Marystowe with Thrushelton shall be transferred and annexed to the United Benefice of Marystowe with Coryton.

" Provided always that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas drafts of the said Scheme have been published locally in the manner prescribed in the Statutory Rules made under the said Act and also transmitted in the manner so prescribed to the Patrons affected, together with a Notice in each case requiring any objections to such draft Scheme to be stated or transmitted in writing to the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners within the time prescribed in the same Rules:

**W**HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the 3rd and 4th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 113, of the Act of the 5th and 6th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 108, and of the Act of the 21st and 22nd years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 57, duly prepared, and laid before His Majesty in Council, a Scheme, bearing date the 11th day of May, 1922, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the 3rd and 4th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 113, of the Act of the 5th

and 6th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 108, and of the Act of the 21st and 22nd years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 57, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following Scheme relating to the Rectory and Parish of Standish, in the County of Lancaster and in the Diocese of Manchester:

"Whereas by an Order of Her said late Majesty in Council bearing date the 9th day of August, 1872, and published in the London Gazette on the 13th day of the same month, the annual interest or dividends arising from certain sums of Stocks held by us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, in respect of the sale under the provisions of the said Ecclesiastical Leasing Acts for the two sums of £30,000 and £10,000 mentioned in the said Order of the mines, minerals and beds of coal lying and being under a portion of the glebe belonging to the said Rectory of Standish directed to be paid over and have accordingly been paid over to our Common Fund to be applied to and for the purposes of such fund, and particularly in aid of augmentations of the incomes or endowments of certain existing or intended Cures within the ancient Parish of Standish as in the said Order mentioned:

"And whereas in accordance with the provisions of the said Order in Council there have been placed upon the said Common Fund for the purpose of effecting some of such augmentations and endowments perpetual annual charges of £217 in favour of the Benefice of Adlington, £144 in favour of the Benefice of Coppull, £158 in favour of the Benefice of Charnock Richard and £300 in favour of the Benefice of Shevington:

"And whereas in addition to the augmentations and endowments so effected it was contemplated by the said Order in Council that a New District should be constituted wholly or partly out of the New Parish of Adlington and that in respect of the annual interest or dividends so transferred to the Ecclesiastical Commissioners as aforesaid such New District when constituted should be endowed with £300 per annum by means of a charge upon the Common Fund and provided with a Parsonage House out of the said Common Fund:

"And whereas we are satisfied that the constitution of such proposed District at present is neither necessary nor desirable and that the needs of the said Parish of Adlington would be better met by the provisions hereinafter in this Scheme recommended and proposed:

"And whereas the sums of Stock held by us subject to the provisions of the said Order in Council now consist of £41,401 5s. 9d. India £3 per cent. Stock:

"And whereas the Reverend Charles William Newton Hutton, Clerk in Holy Orders, as Rector or Incumbent of the said Rectory of Standish and also as the Patron of the same Rectory and the Right Reverend William, Bishop of the said Diocese of Manchester, as such Bishop, consent to the arrangements which are hereinafter recommended and proposed:

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the said Charles William Newton Hutton (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this Scheme), and with the consent of the said William, Bishop of Manchester, (in testimony whereof he has signed this Scheme and sealed



the same with his Episcopal Seal), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme all the provisions in the said Order in Council of the 9th day of August, 1872, in relation to the constitution, endowment and provision of a Parsonage House for a New District to be formed wholly or partly out of the Benefice and cure of Adlington be abrogated and annulled and that (1) the said annual charges upon our Common Fund of £217 in favour of the said Benefice of Adlington, £144 in favour of the said Benefice of Coppull, £158 in favour of the said Benefice of Charnock Richard, and £300 in favour of the said Benefice of Shevington shall cease to be payable by us and in lieu of and in full substitution for such charges there shall be paid to the Incumbent of the said Benefice of Adlington the interest or dividends arising from a sum of £7,833 11s. 1d. India £3 per cent. Stock, to the Incumbent of the said Benefice of Coppull the interest or dividends arising from a sum of £5,223 11s. 0d. India £3 per cent. Stock, to the Incumbent of the said Benefice of Charnock Richard the interest or dividends arising from a sum of £5,766 17s. 7d. India £3 per cent. Stock, and to the Incumbent of the said Benefice of Shevington the interest or dividends arising from a sum of £10,900 4s. 5d. India £3 per cent. Stock, (2) there shall also be paid to the Incumbent of the said Benefice of Adlington the interest or dividends arising from a sum of £3,333 10s. 10d. India £3 per cent. Stock with a view to providing a further annual sum of £100 in augmentation of the income of such Benefice, (3) the interest or dividends arising from a sum of £8,333 10s. 10d. India £3 per cent. Stock shall be paid by us to the Incumbent for the time being of the said Benefice of Adlington, upon the production to us at the time when such payments become due of a certificate under the hand of the Bishop of the said Diocese of Manchester that an assistant curate, duly licensed by such Bishop, has been employed within the Parish of Adlington during the period in respect of which such interest or dividends have accrued, and that such assistant curate has been in receipt during such period of a salary at a rate of not less than £250 per annum, and (4) a capital sum of £750 representing the accumulated interest or dividends in respect of the said sums of Stock which were paid over to our Common Fund shall be applied by us towards the cost of the improvement of the Parsonage House belonging to the said Benefice of Adlington.

“ And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament.”

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts.

UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE ACTS,

REFERENCES TO THE HIGH COURT OF JUSTICE  
UNDER SECTION 10 (1) OF THE UNEMPLOYMENT  
INSURANCE ACT, 1920.

Pursuant to paragraph 6 of the Unemployment Insurance (Determination of Questions) Regulations, 1920, the Minister of Labour hereby gives notice of his intention to refer to the High Court for decision the following questions that have arisen in applications made to him for his decision under Section 10 of the Unemployment Insurance Act, 1920, namely, whether the employment of a person as a

Pea picker and sorter in the seed warehouse of a firm of nurserymen and seed growers and merchants;

Cleaner, inside and outside business hours, to clean generally, and also to clean windows in departments, offices or workrooms forming part of the business premises of a West End store;

Cleaner, outside and during business hours, to dust, clean mirrors, remove waste-paper, etc., in departments, offices or work-

rooms, forming part of the business premises of a West End store;

Cleaner, mainly outside business hours, to sweep, dust and scrub departments, offices or workrooms, also to take turn in cleaning floors of the restaurant department forming part of the business premises of a West End store;

Golf caddy at a members' golf club;

Chauffeur to a practising physician, driving exclusively for professional purposes, is or is not employment within the meaning of the Unemployment Insurance Act, 1920.

Under Rules 5 and 18 of the Rules of the Supreme Court for regulating appeals and references to the High Court under the Unemployment Insurance Act, 1920, Section 10, any person who claims to be affected by the decisions to be given in the above-mentioned cases may apply to the Judge for leave to intervene.

The cases have been set down in the High Court, and will be heard in the near future.

In accordance with Regulations made under Section 18 of the Trade Boards Act, 1909, by the Minister of Labour, and dated 31st October, 1918, the Trade Board established under the Trade Boards Acts, 1909 and 1918, for the branches of trade specified in the Trade Boards (Stamped or Pressed Metal Wares) Order, 1919, HEREBY GIVE NOTICE, as required by Section 3 (5) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, that they PROPOSE TO VARY the General Minimum Time-Rates, Piece-Work Basis Time-Rates and Overtime Rates for Male Workers, other than Workers who are employed as Braziers, Burnishers, Drop-Stampers, Dippers, Dippers who are also Bronzers, or as Annealers or Polishers, at present effective and set out in the Schedule to the Notice Q. (14) issued by the Trade Board and dated 16th May, 1922, the proposed Minimum Rates being as set out in the Schedule below.

## SECTION II.

## PROPOSED PIECE-WORK BASIS TIME-RATES.

In lieu of the Piece-Work Basis Time-Rates at present fixed, the proposed Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate for each class of Male Workers above specified shall be 15 per cent. above the appropriate proposed General Minimum Time-Rate for such class as set out in Section I. of this Schedule.

## SECTION III.

## PROPOSED OVERTIME RATES.

In lieu of the Overtime Rates as at present fixed, Overtime Rates calculated on the Proposed Minimum Rates specified in Sections I. and II. of this Schedule in the manner set out in Part III. of the Notice Q. (14) issued by the Trade Board, dated 16th May, 1922, shall apply in substitution for the proposed Minimum Rates otherwise applicable, as set out in Sections I. and II. of this Schedule, in respect of all hours worked in excess of the number of hours declared by the Trade Board in the above-mentioned Notice Q. (14) to be the normal number of hours of work in the Trade.

## SECTION IV.

## APPLICABILITY OF PROPOSED MINIMUM RATES.

The above proposed minimum rates of wages shall apply to all MALE WORKERS other than Workers who are employed as Braziers, Burnishers, Drop-Stampers, Dippers, Dippers who are also Bronzers, or as Annealers or Polishers, in respect of all time during which they are employed in Great Britain in any branch of the trade specified in the Trade Boards (Stamped or Pressed Metal Wares) Order, 1919, as set out in Part IV. of the above-mentioned Notice Q. (14)

The Trade Board will consider any OBJECTIONS to the above Proposal to Vary which may be lodged with them within two months from the 27th day of May, 1922. Such Objections should be in writing and signed by the person making the same (adding his or her full name and address), and should be sent to the Secretary of the Stamped or Pressed Metal Wares Trade Board (Great Britain), 7-11, Old Bailey, London, E.C. 4.

It is desirable that the Objections should state precisely, and so far as possible with reasons, what is objected to.

REGULATIONS RESPECTING OPEN COMPETITIVE EXAMINATIONS FOR THE SITUATION OF ASSISTANT ENGINEER IN THE ENGINEER-IN-CHIEF'S DEPARTMENT OF THE GENERAL POST OFFICE.

N.B.—*These Regulations are liable to alteration from time to time.*

1. *Age.*—The limits of age for this situation are 20 and 23, with the proviso that in the case of examinations held within two years of the date of the first examination under this scheme the upper limit shall be 25. Candidates must be of the prescribed age on the 1st March or the 1st September of the year in which they are examined, according as the examination is held in the first or second half of the year.

In reckoning age for this purpose a candidate may deduct any time, up to a maximum of two years, which he has spent since graduation in an approved engineering works, and any time, up to a maximum of two years, which he has spent in His Majesty's Forces between the 4th August, 1914, and the 31st December, 1919.

The successful list will consist of those candidates who pass and obtain the highest aggregate marks in the whole examination.

ANIMALS (LANDING FROM IRELAND)  
ORDER OF 1922 (No. 5).

The Minister of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in him under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1914, and of every other power

enabling him in this behalf, hereby orders as follows:—

1. Article 9 of the Animals (Landing from Ireland) Order of 1922 is hereby revoked and the following Article substituted therefor:—

“9. Animals while being moved with a licence under this Order shall, so far as is practicable, be moved by rail and be kept separate from all animals which are not being so moved. When being moved by road the animals shall be moved without unnecessary delay to the place of destination and by the route specified in the licence.

“In the case of animals moved by rail the animals shall not be untrucked for any purpose until they reach the destination station from which they are to be moved to the premises specified in the licence, except that animals may be untrucked for the purpose of feeding or watering within the railway station premises only, at any station not situated within a district which is for the time being a Scheduled District for the purposes of the Foot-and-Mouth Disease (Control of Movement) Order of 1920, and provided that any dock, pen or other part of the railway premises used for this purpose is disinfected in the manner prescribed in Article 12 of this Order both immediately before and after each occasion of such use.”

2. This Order may be cited as the ANIMALS (LANDING FROM IRELAND) ORDER OF 1922 (No. 5).
