In accordance with the general policy of His Majesty's Government to abolish obsolete Treaty instruments, steps have been taken to notify to the Governments concerned the decision of His Majesty's Government to terminate certain Treaties with Foreign Powers for the abolition of the Slave Trade.

2. Notice of denunciation of the Slave Trade Treaties with Ecuador, the Netherlands, Norway and Sweden, having been given to the Governments of those States and accepted by them, the Treaties ceased to have effect from the respective dates of acceptance of denunciation, viz.:—

Ecuador.—Treaty of May 24th, 1841, and Additional Articles of May 24th, 1841, and January 15th, 1846: April 17th, 1922.

Netherlands.—Treaty of May 4th, 1818, and Additional Articles of December 31st, 1822, January 25th, 1823, February 7th, 1837, and August 31st, 1848: May 9th, 1922.

Norway.—Treaty of November 6th, 1824, and Additional Article of June 15th, 1835: April 25th, 1922.

Sweden.—Treaty of November 6th, 1824, and Additional Article of June 15th, 1835: May 4th, 1922.
