

A STATUTE to alter a Statute made by the Commissioners appointed under The Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877 (40 and 41 Victoria, Chapter 48), in relation to The King's College of Our Lady and Saint Nicholas in Cambridge duly made at a General Meeting of the Governing Body of the said College specially summoned for this purpose held on the 28th day of November, 1922, and passed at such Meeting by the votes of not less than two-thirds of the number of persons present and voting and submitted for the approval of His Majesty the King in Council.

Whereas by Statute M, Chapter I, made by the Commissioners under the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877 (40 and 41 Victoria, Chapter 48), in relation to the King's College of Our Lady and Saint Nicholas in Cambridge it is enacted as follows:

CHAPTER I.

The Common Seal.

1. The Common Seal of the College shall be kept in some secure place, in a chest fastened with three different locks, the keys of which shall be severally kept by the Provost, the Vice-Provost, and the Senior Bursar residing in College; and when any one of them is absent from College he shall deposit his key with some Fellow as a deputy; provided that no person shall have two keys in his keeping at the same time.

2. The Common Seal shall not be affixed to any deed or instrument, except in the presence of the Provost, or, in his absence, the Vice-Provost, and four of the Fellows, and in pursuance of a resolution of the Governing Body.

And whereas it appears to us the Provost and Scholars of the said College (being the Governing Body thereof) that it is expedient to alter the said Statute M, Chapter I, in manner hereinafter appearing: Now therefore we the Provost and Scholars of the said College do hereby in exercise of the powers given us by the 54th section of the said Act alter and amend Chapter I of the said Statute M hereinbefore set out by substituting therefor the following (that is to say):

M.—MISCELLANEOUS.

CHAPTER I.

1. The Common Seal of the College shall be kept in some secure place in a chest fastened with two different locks, one of the keys of which shall be kept by the Provost or Vice-Provost, and the other by one of the Bursars; and when either holder of a key is absent from Cambridge he shall deposit his key with some Fellow as deputy; provided that no person shall have the two keys in his keeping at the same time.

2. The Common Seal shall not be affixed to any deed or other instrument except in the presence of two persons, one of whom shall be either the Provost, or Vice-Provost or one of the Bursars, and the other of whom shall be one of the Fellows, and in pursuance of a resolution of the Governing Body. Such resolution, in lieu of referring to a specific deed or instrument, may in general terms authorize the sealing and delivery of any class of deed or instrument.

TENDERS FOR TREASURY BILLS AND TREASURY BONDS.

1. The Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury hereby give notice, that Tenders will be received at the Chief Cashier's Office, at the Bank of England, on Friday, the 26th January, 1923, at 1 o'clock, for

(a) Treasury Bills to be issued under the Treasury Bills Act, 1877; the National Debt Act, 1889; and the War Loan Acts, 1914-1919; and

(b) £4 10s. per cent. Treasury Bonds, repayable at par on the 15th April, 1932.

2. The maximum amount of Treasury Bills and Treasury Bonds to be issued will be £40,000,000. The amount of Treasury Bonds issued will not exceed £5,000,000, but subject to that limit the total amount issued will be divided between Bills and Bonds in such proportions as Their Lordships may determine.

TREASURY BILLS.

3. The Bills will be in amounts of £5,000 or £10,000. They will be dated at the option of the Tenderer on any business day from Monday, the 29th January, 1923, to Saturday, the 3rd February, 1923, inclusive, and will be payable at three months after date.

4. The Bills will be issued and paid at the Bank of England.

5. Each Tender must be for an amount not less than £50,000, and must specify the date on which the Bills required are to be dated, and the net amount per cent. (being an even multiple of one penny) which will be given for the amount applied for. Separate Tenders must be lodged for Bills of different dates.
