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HE Letters from Malta inform us, That the Galleys of that Order are fitting out, being 7 in number, and that the new Great Master had order'd 1200 Land Soldiers, to be in a readiness to Embark on such Vessels, as will be provided for that purpose, which are to sail at the same time with the said Galleys for the Assistance of the Venetians in the Levant. We have an account from Barbary, that the Grand Signior has writ to the Governments of Argiers, Tunis, and Tripoly, to find each a Squadron of their Ships to join his Fleet the next Summer, which they have promiled to comply with as far as they are able.

Turin, March 20. The Duke of Savoy intends to go the next week to visit the Places in Savoy, which have been restored by the French. The Fortifications of Pignerol are now quite demolished; and the Inhabitants have not yet obtained leave to cast up a slight Wall about the Town, for their fecurity.

Florence, March 27. The Great Duke is now with the Court at Pifa; but is expected here in a fortnight; and foon after Prince John Gasson will be going for Germany, to celebrate his Marriage with the Princefsof Saxe-Lawenburgh; after which

they will have their Residence at Prague.
Venice, March 29. The contrary Winds, which at present hinder the departure of the Convoy bound to the Levant, give an opportunity to fend with it a greater number of Soldiers, than was at first intended; Yesterday came to the Lido several new raised Companies, which are now going on Board, and the rest that are expected will Embark as fast as they arrive here, from the Places where these Levies have been made. Several Men of War are fitting out, and divers Merchant-men are taken up for another Convoy, which may be ready to fail by the middle of the next month; Several Noble Venetians are going to make the next Campaign in the Army of this State; and the great Preparations of War that are made, give ground to believe, That the Forces of the Republick will undertake some Enterprize of moment, and with the more probability of Success, seeing the Turks employ their principal Care for carrying on the War in Hungary, and for affifting the Tartars against the Mescovites, and by that means will have but a small Army on the Frontiers of the Morea. The last advices from Napoli di Romania say, the Captain General was fending out another Squadron to cruize in the Archipelago, with Orders that they should particularly endeavour to intercept the Turkish Ships that are bound from Alexandria with Provisions to Constantinople; and that the whole Venetian Fleet would be ready to go to Sea in the beginning of May.

Vicama, April 2. Prince Lewis of Baden having

the Profecution of the War on the Rhine, he parted from hence this day, intending to make all possible Diligence in his Journey to Hailbron, near which place the Confederate Forces will have their first Rendezvous; and in the mean time Orders have been fent them, to be in a readiness to draw together upon the first notice. The Elector of Saxony has frequent Conferences with the Imperial Ministers about the Affairs of Hungary; Great quantities of Ammunition and Provisions are fent thither by Water; a great Train of Artillery is providing here, and will in few days be put on board the Vessels that are to carry the fame to Buda, where they are to expect further Orders; All the Officers that were here are returned to their feveral Commands, and every thing is provided for an early Campaign. The Letters from Transilvania say, That several Persons who came from Valachia reported, that the Tartars were so taken up with providing for the Defence of their own Country against the Moscowites, that they were not at leafure to make use of the Opportunity which the present State of Affairs in Poland gave them, of annoying the Frontiers of that Kingdom; and that the same reason would hinder them from fending any confiderable number of their Troops to the Ottoman Army in Hungary this Summer. The Bishop of Passaw, the Emperor's Ambassador to Poland, has Orders to hasten his Journey thither, by reason of the advices that come from thence, that the feveral Parties begin to appear with great warmth; That many of the Great Men do shew the little Inclination they have to Prince James, and that his Interest seems rather to decline than encrease; so that the Presence of the Emperor's Ambassador will be of great use to him.

Hamburgh, April 9. N.S. The Treaty about the Holstein Affairs is at a stand, the Ministers of several Princes who assisted at it being at present absent. The Troops of the Circle of the Lower Saxony continue in the City of Gu-fraw; The Deputies of the Duke of Swerin have Protested against the Proceedings of the said Directors in this Affair; and they are expecting the Emperor's Resolutions upon it. The Elector of Brandenburgh is at Coningsbergh in Prussia; he will stay there till the Election in Poland is over which is appointed to be the next Month.

Newcastle, April 10. Yesterday morning came to our Bar 8 Colliers from London; one of them belonging to this Town, Charles Newton Master, laden with Merchant Goods, and carrying 12 Guns, was in her Voyage hither attack'd by a French Privateer of 14 Guns and 4 Patereroes Capt.
