The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Memorial from the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiratty, dated the 2nd day of February, 1923 (G.H.), in the words following, viz.:—

"Whereas by Section 20 of the Greenwich Hospital Act, 1865, it is enacted, inter alia, that the Admiralty shall from time to time continue or appoint such officers, clerks, and servants for the purposes of the Hospital and Schools as seem fit, and may (subject to the approval of Your Majesty in Council) fix the salaries of such officers and clerks:

"And whereas by Section 8 of the Greenwich Hospital Act, 1872, it is enacted that the provisions of Section 20 of the Greenwich Hospital Act, 1865, so far as the same relate to salaries, shall extend to pensions and pecuniary benefits of any kind:

"And whereas Mr. Edward Smith and Mr. E. T. Parkinson, former Assistant Masters in the Royal Hospital School, Greenwich, retired from the service of Greenwich Hospital on account of age on the 30th September, 1921, and the 31st May, 1922, respectively:

"We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council, to authorize the grant from the funds of Greenwich Hospital to Mr. Smith of a pension at the rate of Thirty-two pounds thirteen shillings and eleven pence (£32 13s. 11d.) a year, as from the date of his retirement, and a gratuity of Ninety-six pounds seventeen shillings and four pence (£96 17s. 4d.); and to Mr. Parkinson of a pension at the rate of Forty pounds and ten
