He 30th paft, the Proferous of London, laden thence with Pitch and Tair, and bound for Brifol, was by the violence of the winds forced on thoat in the night to the Eaflwards of this Key, but fuch care has been taken for her affiftance, that all the Goods have been fafely landed, and 'its hoped,

the veffel may be gotten off tie next Spring-Tide. Hull, Fan. 1 Yefterday arrived here two Swedes from Stackhelm laden with Tarre and Iron, and one Londoner with fome quantity of Tarre from Holland, intending to take in here fome lading for Venice. The Peregrin of this place of 130 Tans which failed hence the 12th paft, laden with Lead, Bully, and Cloth, intended for Retterdam, has been unfor tunately caft away neer Bremers-haven, onely three of the men elcaping in the boat.

Dantzig, Dec. 22. From Warfaw we are informed that Dorofensko the late General of the Rebel Coffacks, being depoted from his charge, but continuing ftill mafter of fome of the moft confiderable pofts of the Countrey, with fome small forces which feem refolved to follow his fortune, is grown very troublefome to the adjacent Countreys, continuing ftill in the field, and for their fublistance, falling upon feveral Towns, from which they dually return with confiderable prize, and 'the faid, has offered his fervice to the Poles.

From Bialacierke they write, that all the Tartars which ate able to bear orms, have taken the field and are drawn together upon the Datper, with whom are joyned a confiderable boly of the Coffacks, with intention to oppofe the pregrels of the Mulcovites, who have well fortified Kiouis, whither the Collonel Piras, one of their Officers has lately fent a large proportion of Corn, and great fums of Money for the fupply and payment of their Army, for which they, in t flimony of their fatisfaction difcharged all their Artillery, and has reinforced allo the Caffle of Offer zee, himfelf with 80000 men under his Command taking the field, fell lately upon Araki, a confiderable Town, which he furprized and wholly ruined.

The Coflacks are lately affembled at *Tarlie*, with intentions to make choice of fome able perfon to fucceed in the Command of them as their General. The plague is lately broken out in the chief City of Tartary, of which they much fear a great increase.

Several of the Foreign Ministers have lately ma le their address to the Archbishop of Gnesse Primare of Poland, defiring to know when they may be again admitted to make their se-entry into Poland. The Bishop of Bessers is at present at a Countrey House near the Cloister of Oliva, somewhat surpriz d with the news of the resolution so defer the Biestion of a Successor to the Crown of Poland ill May, and that the resolution of the Nobility fill holds firm to continue their ancient Custom of appearing infarms. The Archbishop of Gnesse 'tis faid has resuled him leave to continue there during the Inter-regnum, which he earnessity defared by a particular Messenger's so that 'tis believed he may in few dayes depart, but whether on his return for France', is yet uncertain.

They talke now more then ever of the great probability of the election of the young Prince of Lor ain to the Crown, for which the Jefuits appear very folicitous, and that for the fatisfaction of the Mulcovite a match may be promoted between that Prince and a daughter. of Aufcour, but thele reports are supposed to be only railed upon conjecture.

Vienna, Dec, 29. As yet no time is prefixt for the Alfembly of the States-General of Hungary, but Order is taken in the mean time to cafe the Countrey of a great part of their grievances the better to oblige them to continue in obedience and to reject the offers made to them by the Turksruppara

The Government of this City was fome days fince conferred upon the Count de souches, wto is accordingly entred upon his charge, having first taken the oath of fuelity as is usual upon the like occasion.

His Imperial Majesty is come to a refolution upon the points lately Ventilated and debated in the Aslembly of the three Colledges.

And First, as to that for the fecurity of the publick peace of the Empire, the Emperour concurs with them, that within the space of one moneth, each Circle shall by their Deputy be defired to declare how much they will be contented to contribute towards the maintenance of a joynt force to be employed only upon the publick account as occasion may offer.

A fecond point was the confideration of the dammages and lottes fultained by the Princes of Simmeran de Deuxpoats, and Veldentz, by the late war between the Prince Elector Palatine and the Duke of Lorrain, of which, an Effimate is to be brought in, and some expedient to be found out for their reparation.

A Third Point was the Concernment of the Empire, in the protection of the ten Cities of Alfatia; He being plezed to order that the whole Empire, with other Crowns and States which are any way interefied in that affair, be exhorted not only to contribute to their protection; but to take into confideration the Grievances particularly of the Lower Alfatia, and the condition of the Nobility who are interefied in the Fiels of the Bifhopricks of Toul, Metz, and Verdun; that fome fit courfe be taken for the fettlement of all those affairs, before the feparation of the Diet.

Letters from Comorra inform us, that a party of 150 Huffars making an incurtion upon the Frontiers, had furprized a Turkilh Lady newly married, and passing with a Guard from Offen towards Neuhausel, killing the Aga which commanded them, and about 20 of his party, with about the lots of 11 of their own 3 but that a stronger party of the Turks coming in, had abliged them to quit the Lady, and to provide for their own fastery.

The Brince Elector has in conformity hereunto, nominated the Count de Coningjmark for his Planipotentiary ; and has dispatch to him all Orders and Instructions necessary for that purpole ; the Negotiation is like to be held at Wormes, where allo the faid Count may propole to the confideration of the Mediators the Count his Brothers pretentions to Konigficin
