

At the Court at *Buckingham Palace*, the 31st day of *May*, 1923.

PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by Part II of the Administration of Justice Act, 1920, provision has been made for the reciprocal enforcement of judgments in the United Kingdom and in other parts of His Majesty's Dominions:

And whereas by the said Act it is amongst other things provided that where His Majesty is satisfied that reciprocal provisions have been made by the Legislature of any part of His Majesty's Dominions outside the United Kingdom for the enforcement within that part of His Dominions of judgments obtained in the High Court in England, the Court of Session in Scotland, and the High Court in Ireland, His Majesty may by Order in Council declare that the said part of that Act shall extend to that part of His Dominions and that on any such Order being made the said part of that Act shall extend accordingly:

And whereas by the said Act it is further provided that His Majesty may by Order in Council declare that the said part of that Act shall apply to any territory which is under His Majesty's protection, or in respect of which a Mandate is being exercised by the Government of any part of His Majesty's dominions (hereinafter referred to as a Mandated Territory) as if that Territory were part of His Majesty's Dominions, and that on the making of any such Order the said part of the Act shall, subject to the provisions of the Order, have effect accordingly:

And whereas on the 6th day of December, 1922, the Irish Free State was established under the provisions of an Act of Parliament shortly entitled the Irish Free State Constitution Act, 1922 (Session 2):

And whereas His Majesty is satisfied that the Legislature of the territory hereinafter mentioned has made reciprocal provisions for the enforcement within that territory of judgments obtained in the High Court in England, the Court of Session in Scotland and the High Court in Ireland:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue and in exercise of the powers by the above-recited Act in His Majesty vested, is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1. Part II of the Administration of Justice Act, 1920, shall extend to the Mandated Territory hereunder mentioned:—

Palastine.

2. Nothing in this Order shall affect the registration or enforcement in the Irish Free State of any judgment in pursuance of Part II of the said Act.

And the Most Noble the Duke of Devonshire, K.G., G.C.M.G., G.C.V.O., one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, is to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Union of Benefices Act, 1919, duly prepared, and laid before His Majesty in Council, a Scheme, bearing date the 22nd day of February, 1923, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, acting in pursuance of the Union of Benefices Act, 1919, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following Scheme for effecting the union of three neighbouring Benefices that is to say the Benefice of the Holy Rood, Southampton, the Benefice of Saint Laurence with Saint John, Southampton, and the Benefice of Saint Michael, Southampton, all which Benefices are situate in the Town and County of Southampton and in the Diocese of Winchester:

"Whereas Commissioners appointed at our request by the Right Reverend Edward, Bishop of Winchester, pursuant to the provisions of the said Union of Benefices Act, 1919, to inquire into and report upon the union of the said three Benefices of the Holy Rood, Southampton, Saint Laurence with Saint John, Southampton, and Saint Michael, Southampton, duly made their Report to the said Bishop of Winchester, and therein recommended the union of the said three Benefices, and the terms for effecting the union, and the said Bishop of Winchester signified in writing his approval of the said Report:

"And whereas we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, have prepared this Scheme for effecting the union of Benefices so recommended as aforesaid which Scheme is based upon the terms recommended in the said Report but with the assent of the said Bishop of Winchester embodies certain modifications thereof:

"And whereas the said Benefices of the Holy Rood, Southampton, Saint Laurence with Saint John, Southampton, and Saint Michael, Southampton, are all now full, the Reverend John Parmiter being the present Incumbent of the said Benefice of the Holy Rood, Southampton, and also of the said Benefice of Saint Laurence with Saint John, Southampton, and the Reverend John William Stephen James Danbury being the present Incumbent of the said Benefice of Saint Michael, Southampton:

"And whereas the Church of Saint Laurence, Southampton, is situate within a city or municipal borough, that is to say, within the Municipal Borough of Southampton:

"And whereas the Advowson or perpetual right of Patronage of and presentation to each of the said Benefices of Saint Laurence with Saint John, Southampton, and Saint Michael, Southampton, is vested in Your Majesty, Your Heirs and Successors, and is exercised on behalf of Your Majesty by the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain for the time being:

"And whereas the Advowson or perpetual right of Patronage of and presentation to the said Benefice of the Holy Rood, Southampton, is vested in the Bishop of Winchester for the time being:
