

# The London Gazette.

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Genova, April 21. N. S.

ON the 18th Instant departed hence a Genoese Ship for *Final*, to take on Board 800 Foot Soldiers, (who come from *Milan*) and carry them to *Barcelona*; and 'tis said that several other Regiments will be sent thither from the State of *Milan*, to reinforce the Spanish Army in *Catalonia*.

*Leghorn*, April 22. We have Advice by a Brigantine arrived in this Port from *Malta*, that a French Man of War of 60 Guns, commanded by the Marquis de *Palas*, having met a Dutch Privateer called the *Valkeren*, they engaged, and after exchanging several Broad-sides, the French boarded the Privateer, and soon after both Ships blew up, and all the Men were lost; There were divers Volontiers, and among these several Knights of *Malta* on Board the French Ship. A Bark is arrived here from *Argiers*, the Master whereof says, that the War continued between that Government and the Emperor of *Morocco*, and that the Dey was preparing to go into the Field with a numerous Army. The Algerines have 15 Sail of all sorts now at Sea; some of which appeared the 17th at the *Gorgona*, a small Island 6 Leagues from hence, where they landed Men, and having committed what Spoil they could, brought away several of the Inhabitants.

*Milan*, April 21. The Marquis de *Leganez*, our Governor, is gone to *Turin*, to confer with the Duke of *Savoy* about the further Measures that are to be taken to oblige the Italian Princes to pay the Arrears of Contributions due to the German Troops that served the last year in *Italy*. The Regiment commanded by the Marquis d'*Ali* is marched to *Final*, where they are to embark for *Catalonia*; and two other Regiments have Orders to follow.

*Venice*, April 26. A Vessel is arrived here who met near *Corfou* the Convoy that went last from hence; another great Convoy is preparing, and several Companies of new raised Soldiers are come to the *Lido*, and more are daily expected, who are to pass with this Opportunity to the *Levant*.

*Vienna*, April 27. The Emperor has appointed Prince *Eugene* of *Savoy*, who was General of his Forces in *Italy*, to command the Imperial Army in *Hungary* this Summer under the Elector of *Saxony*; and he intends to part from hence in few days, to Review the Troops in their Quarters, and to hasten their march to the General Rendezvous between *Buda* and *Esseck*; where they are, to be in a Body by the 20th or 24th of the next month. The Advices from the Frontiers say, the Grand Signior is not expected at *Belgrade* till the beginning of *June*, and that the Turkish Troops will Rendezvous about the same time near that place. The Bishop of *Passaw*, the Emperor's Ambassador to the Dyet of *Poland*, has received his Dispatches, and will set out the 29th Instant on his Journey thither.

*Francfort*, May 5. The Forces on both sides continue to draw together, the Allies near *Hailbronn*, and the French near *Landau*, and by the 20th of this month the Armies may be in a posture to march and enter upon Action. Of the French Troops who have had their Quarters near the *Moselle*, 'tis said, a Body of 12000 are ordered to march towards *Flanders*.

*Cologne*, May 7. Several *Brandenburg* Regiments passed the *Rhine* yesterday, and the day before, at *Orsoy* and *Rhinbergh*; and others have done the like at *Wesel*; They all march to *Brabant*. The Deputies of the Circle of *Westphalia*, who assembled here, separated yesterday, having adjusted the Matters they met about, with mutual Satisfaction.

*Hamburg*, May 7. The Letters from *Dantzick* of the first of this month advise, that the Queen Dowager of *Poland* arrived there the day before from *Warsaw*, and was received by the Burghers in Arms. They write from *Warsaw* of the 24th of *April*, that the Primate had held a great Council, in which, after a very warm Debate, 'twas resolved, that a new Commission should be given to the Crown General to endeavour to disperse the Confederated Forces, and if he found it necessary to make use of Force, and call the Gentry to his assistance. The Abbot de *Chasteauneuf* was arrived at *Warsaw*, being sent by the French King to assist his Ambassador the Abbot de *Polignac*, in promoting the Interests of the Prince of *Conti*. The Provincial Dyets begun to meet to choose their Deputies for the General Dyet, which is to be held at *Warsaw* the 15th of this month to choose a King; and the Gentlemen are putting themselves in readiness to appear on Horseback at the same time.

*Paris*, May 6. The Mareschal de *Villeroi* and Mareschal *Catinat*, are gone for *Flanders*, and are to meet Mareschal *Boufflers* and Monsieur *Vauban* at *Valenciennes*, and confer together about the Affairs of the Campaign. The Mareschal de *Choiseul* is on his Journey to *Germany*, and 'tis said the Army he is to command, will be at their Rendezvous by the 16th of this month. The Mareschals d'*Estree*, *Joyeuse*, and *Tourville*, are gone to their Stations on the Sea Coasts, to command there as they did the last year. The Duke de *Vendosme*, with his Brother the Great Prior, will set out the 8th of this month for *Catalonia*. The Marquis de *Nesmonds* sailed with his Squadron from *Bress* the 29th past; and the Ships under Monsieur *Magnan* are likewise gone to Sea from *Rocheport*; 'Tis not said whether they are bound. The French Court is gone to *Marli*, and at their return from thence will go into Mourning for the Death of the King of *Sueden*. 'Tis certain, that the Ships commanded by the Sieur de *Genes*, which are returned from their Expedition in the *West-Indies*, have lost greatest part of their Men, and many Officers, and did not take one Prize.

*Brussels*, May 8. The Elector of *Bavaria* is recovered of the Indisposition which occasioned his going the last week from the Army to *Ghent*.

and intends to return in 2 or 5 days to the Camp at *Deyse*. The Forces commanded by the Prince de *Vaudemont* marched yesterday from *Waterlo*, and the other Places where they were posted, to *Bois Seigneur Isaac*, and they are now encamped together, with their Right towards *Nivelle*, and their Left towards *Gnap*, the General's Quarters being at *Brains le Châz*. The French assemble their Troops in 3 Bodies, one near *Courray*, an other near *Mons*, and the third between the *Sambre* and the *Meuse*, which will be commanded by the *Mareschals de Villeroi, Boufflers, and Carinai*. The two Princes of Poland went hence this morning on their return home.

*Hague, May 10.* Monsieur *Lilienroet* the Mediator, having with the Consent of the Ambassadors of the Allies on one side, and the French Ambassadors on the other, appointed the first meeting to be at *Ryswicke* yesterday at 4 in the afternoon, to open the Treaty; They accordingly went thither in their Coaches with 6 Horses each at the time appointed. The Allies met together in the Apartments on one side the House; the French had their Apartments on the other; and the Mediator in the middle between both. The Allies and the French shewed their Powers to the Mediator, and gave him Copies thereof; and the Mediator communicated to the respective Ministers the said Powers, and left the Copies with them; This and the settling of the Ceremonials in order to further Proceedings, took up about 3 hours, and then the Conference was adjourned till Saturday next at 10 a Clock. After the Congress Monsieur *Calliere*, one of the French Ambassadors, came hither, and made a Visit to Monsieur *Dickwels*, one of the Dutch Plenipotentiaries. The King was present this morning in the Assembly of the Council of State. His Majesty intends to go on Monday to *Zulestein*, and from thence in a day or two to *Loe*.

*Hague, May 11.* N. S. The King was somewhat indisposed yesterday in the evening, and this morning the Physicians thought it necessary His Majesty should be Let Blood, which was done; His Majesty found himself much better afterwards; and continues his Resolution of going to *Zulestein* on Monday next.

*Falmouth, May 1.* On the 29th of the last month, at night, passed by this Port the home-ward-bound *Canary Fleet*, being 35 Sail, under Convoy of several Men of War, having been 6 weeks in their Voyage. The Merchant Ships bound to the *West-Indies* are now sailing out of this Port.

*Plymouth, May 2.* Yesterday came in here the *Prudence* of *Topsham* from the *Canaries*, who left the Fleet two days before, being 35 Sail, with their Convoys.

*Weymouth, May 3.* This day the *Canary Fleet* appeared off this place, plying to the Eastward.

The Persons Authorised under His Majesties Royal Sign Manual, will attend every Wednesday and Friday, from 7 to 12 in the morning, in the Dutchy Court in the Exchequer, to receive in all Wrought Silver Plate, and will then and there pay for the same present Money at 5 s. 4 d. per Ounce, according to the late Act of Parliament.

The Duty of 4 s. a Quarter on Malt, is by Act of Parliament made a Fund for giving out 140000 Tickets, at 10 l. a Ticket, for which New Money, Hammered Silver Money, Plate with the Hall Mark, or otherwise Sterling, is to be taken at 6 s. an Ounce, till the 24th of June 1697. with a Rebate of 34 l. per Cent. per Annum, for so many days as such Money or Plate shall be payed in before that time. 56000 l. is divided into 3500 Prizes; Every 10 l. Blank will have One Farthing a day Interest till payed; Chance is to determine the Priority of Payment. The Drawing is to begin on the 10th of Aug. 1697. and the Act provides against any Deficiency that may happen. Goldsmiths Receivers are, Sir John Johnson, Mr. Hoare, Mr. Smith, Mr. Shale, Mr. Mumpston, Mr. Wharton, Mr. Shepherd, and Mr. Cogg.

Whereas by an Act passed in the last Session of Parliament certain Duties are laid upon Leather, and whereas it is thereby Enacted, That all Tanners, Baxil Tanners, Curriers, Tawers of Leather, Spanish Leather Dressers, and all other Makers or Dressers of Leather in Waze, Mill, Oyl, Sait, Alum, or other Materials whatsoever, shall before the 20th of May, 1697, give notice in Writing to some one or more of the Commissioners, Surveyors, or other Officers to be appointed for the next Market, to the place where any Tann-house, Work-house, or other place shall be made use of for the Tanning, Tawing, Dressing, or Making of Leather by them respectively used, and of their Number of Pits or Fats therein, and the Penalty of 50 l. These are to give notice to all Persons concerned, that they giving notice as in Writing at the Excise-Office for the next Market-Town, to the place where any Tann-house, Work-house, or other place shall be made use of for the Tanning, Tawing, Dressing, or Making of Leather by them respectively used, and of their Number of Pits or Fats therein, before the said 20th of May, 1697, will thereby avoid the said Penalty.

The Commissioners for Transportation being by an Act of the last Session of Parliament appointed for the Licensing Hawkers, Pedlars, and Petty Chapmans: do hereby give notice, That the said Hawkers, Pedlars, and Petty Chapmans, and other Trading Persons going from Town to Town, or to other Mens Houses, are according to the said Act upon several Penalties therein mentioned, before the 24th of June 1697, to deliver to the Commissioners for Transportation a Note in Writing under his or her Hand, or under the Hand of some Person authorised in that behalf, How or in what manner he or she will travel, Whether on Foot, or with one or more Horse or Horses, &c. And also are at the same time to pay, or secure to be payed to the Commissioners for Transportation the Duties by the said Act payable for the same: And thereupon are to receive a License for him or her so to Travel or Trade. And they do further give notice, That for receiving of the said Notes, and granting of Licenses pursuant to the said Act, there will from and after the 17th of May, be due Attendance given at their Office in Great Tower-Hill, London.
