Warsaw, May 18. N. S.

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HE Dyet for the Election of a King was opened the 15th Instant, and the first meeting was in the open Field, in the usual manner; But they have not yet made choice of their Marshal or Speaker; There are many Pretenders, each Party labouring to put into this Station one of their own side; and in all probability the choice will be deferred till all the Nobility, who are to appear on Horseback, are arrived; Those of the Provinces of Cracaw and Sendomir are come within a mile of this City; but the rest will not be here till the next week; so great a number cannot continue long together, so that the Election will be soon over. Twenty Regiments have already quitted the Consederacy, and returned under the Obedience of the Crown General; Which has been chiefly effected by the Money which the Queen Dowager has surnished for this purpose.

Vienna, May 18. The Emperor's Troops are marching from all sides to their Rendezvous: And the Forces designed for the Siege of Bibats in Croatia are gathering together about Carelfiat; We hear of no motion of the Turks. An Ambassador trom Moscowy is on his way hither with a Train of 200 Persens. We have Advice from Hungary, that the Imperial Magazine of Segedin, consisting of Meal and other Provisions, took fire some days ago and was burnt, whether by Accident or Treachery is not known, but a great quantity of Powder that lay very near happily cleaped.

Francfort. May 26. The Forces on both fides, that are to act on the Upper-Rhine, march to the places appointed for their Rendezvous, and in tew days may be joined together.

Cologne, May 28. The Forces of Zell, Hanouer, and Wolfenbuttell, were to pass the River Laen as this day at a place called Limbu gh; The Cavalry being to pass the Rhine at Cobleniz, Newits, at this place, and Kejferwaters, in this march towards Flanders, and the foot comes down by Water.

Paris, May 29. They write from Marfeilles, that 6 Galleys parted from thence the 16th Innant, and that 20 more were to follow the 25th, with Men, Ammunition, and Provisions for Catalonia, being intended, as they give out here, for the Siege of Barcelona. The Sieur d'Andennes, who failed from Brest fome time ago with 4 Men of War to cruise, meeting with some English Ships bound to the West-Indies, took a small Frigat, a Fire-

ship, and 2 Merchantmen; The first they burnt, and have sent the other 3 to Port-Louis; The French Ships afterwards engaged the 3 other English Men of War, but were forced to leave them. 'Tis said, that the Marquis de Nesmond is bound to the Streights. They ralk here very much of a Peace.

Brussels, May 29. The III Weather has hindred the March of our Army; it has rained 24 hours together. We hear from Ath, that the French began to batter the Town the 27th Instant; and have carried on their Trenches to the Counterscarp. The Lunchburgh Forces continue their march towards this Country. The Earl of Porland is come hither, being indisposed, from the Camp.

Hague, May 31. The last Letters from Flanders say, that our Armies continued encamped near St. Quintin Linnock, having had a great deal of Rain and Tempestuous Weather. The Enemy were to begin to throw Bombs into Ath on Wednesday last; Their Armies lie so near one another that they can join them at any time on occasion. The Ambassadors had another meeting at Ryswicke on Wednesday last. They write from Stockholme of the 18th, that the day before a great Fire happened there in the Kings Palace, which was burnt down in sew hours, and great part of the Town.

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From His Majesty's Camp at Heringhe, May 38. The ill Weather has obliged the King to continue in his Camp, where we were joined yesterday by the Troop of Grenadier Guards, and this day by the 3 Troops of English Guards: His Grace the Duke of Ormond, the Earl of Rivers, and Sir Henry Bellasts, are likewise arrived here from England.

The Enemies Loss in the Rencounter on Monday last with Brigadier Lumley, whom the King has now pleased to make a Major General, was greater than it was first understood to be, there were near 50 Prisoners brought in, and among them 6 or 7 Officers, with at least 50 Horses; Sir William Russell, a Captain in Col. Coy's Regiment. Commanded the Advance Party which acceded the Enemy, and took the Colonel with most of the Prisoners.

We have no certain Intelligence from Ath, but it is faid the Enemy possessed themselves last night of the Counterscarp, and that they were builted to day in changing their Batteries; We have heard no firing from thence to day, as we did for 2 or 3 days pass, which makes it seem the more probable. The Army marches to morrow towards Hall.

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
