The Civil Service Commissioners hereby give notice that the following Regulations are published with the approval of the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, viz. :—

REGULATIONS RESPECTING OPEN COMPETITIVE EXAMINATIONS FOR THE SITUATION OF MALE CARTOGRAPHER IN THE HYDROGRAPHIC DEPARTMENT OF THE ADMIRALTY.

These Regulations are liable to alteration from time to time.

1. The limits of age for this situation are 19 and 25; candidates must be of the prescribed age on the first day of the examination. A candidate who attained the age of 19 on the first day of the examination would be admitted, but a candidate who attained the age of 25 on that day would not be admitted.

In reckoning age for competition the following allowances will be made :—

(i) Persons who have served or are serving in the Army, Navy or Air Force may deduct from their actual age any time during which they have so served.

(ii) Persons who have served for two full consecutive years in the Royal Irish Constabulary may deduct from their actual age any time not exceeding five years which they may have spent in such service.

(iii) Persons who have served in any established civil situation to which they were admitted with the certificate of the Civil Service Commissioners may deduct from their actual age any time not exceeding two years which they may have spent in such service.

2. Candidates must be natural-born British subjects and the sons of fathers also natural-born British subjects; provided that exception may be made in the case of candidates serving in a civil situation to which they were admitted with the certificate of the Civil Service Commissioners, and provided that exception to the latter condition of the rule may be made in the case of candidates who have served in His Majesty's Armed Forces during the Great War between the 4th August, 1914, and the 11th November, 1918.

3. No person actually serving in the Army, Navy or Air Force will be eligible for admission to the examination unless he produces to the Civil Service Commissioners, when called upon to do so, the permission of his Commanding Officer to attend the examination, dated before the commencement of the competition, and given in accordance with such orders as may from time to time be issued.

Persons upon whose training for the occupation of teacher public money has been spent cannot be appointed until the consent of the appropriate education authority has been notified to the Civil Service Commissioners.

Persons holding situations in the Civil Service must obtain the permission of the authorities of their Department to attend the examination before the commencement of the competition.

4. No person will be eligible who obtained from any tribunal established under the Military Service Acts, 1916 to 1918, exemption from service in His Majesty's Forces under those Acts on the ground of a conscientious objection to the undertaking of military service, or, although not so exempted, declined to comply with obligations imposed upon him by those Acts.

5. Candidates must satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners as to their health and character.

6. The subjects of examination and the marks they will carry are as follows :—

(1) English	100
(2) Mathematics	300
(3) Map and Chart Projection...	300
(4) Hydrographical Plan Drawing	300
(5) French	100
(6) Physical Geography	100
(7) Chemistry or Physics	100

Candidates must obtain such an aggregate number of marks in the examination as a whole as to satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners.

7. Application for permission to attend an examination must be made in the writing of the Candidate, at such time and in such manner as may be fixed by the Civil Service Commissioners.

8. A fee of £6 will be required from each candidate attending an examination.

The Civil Service Commissioners further give notice that a Competitive Examination will be held under the foregoing Regulations in London, commencing on the 12th August, 1924.

Not fewer than 3 candidates will be appointed on the result of this examination, if so many should be found to be duly qualified.

No person will be admitted to examination from whom the Secretary of the Civil Service Commission has not received, on or before the 10th July, 1924, an application, in the Candidate's own handwriting, on a prescribed form, which may be obtained from the Secretary at once.

THE POOR LAW OFFICERS (QUALIFICATION) ORDER, 1924.

Notice is hereby given, under Section 3 (3) of the Rules Publication Act, 1893, that the above named Order dated the 9th day of May, 1924, has been made by the Minister of Health, and is published as Statutory Rules and Orders, 1924, No. 550.

The Order provides that no person shall be appointed or be eligible for appointment to any paid office under a Board of Guardians who is or has within twelve months been the Chairman or a member of that Board of Guardians.
