## The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the 8th and 9th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 70; of the Act of the 14th and 15th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 97; and of the Act of the 19th and 20th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 55; duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a Representation, bearing date the 10th day of July, 1924, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

say:— "We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the 3th and 9th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 70, of the Act of the 14th and 15th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 97, and of the Act of the 19th and 20th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 55, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following Representation as to the assignment of a Consolidated Chapelry to the consecrated Church of Saint Michael and All Angels, Brighton, situate within the Parish of Brighton, in the County of Sussex and in the Diocese of Chichester:

"Whereas at certain extremities of the said Parish of Brighton, of the New Parish (sometime District Chapelry) of Saint Nicholas, Brighton, and of the New Parish (sometime District Chapelry) of Saint Stephen, Brighton, both in the said County and Diocese, which said extremities lie contiguous one to another, and are described in the Schedule hereunder written, there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such Parish and New Parishes:

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that certain contiguous portions (being the portions containing the population aforesaid) of the said Parish of Brighton, of the said New Parish of Saint Nicholas, Brighton, and of the said New Parish of Saint Stephen, Brighton, should be formed into a Consolidated Ohapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes, and that the same should be assigned to the said Church of Saint Michael and All Angels, Brighton, situate as aforesaid:

situate as aforesaid: "Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Winfrid Oldfield, Bishop of Chichester, as such Bishop, and also as the Patron, in right of his See as well of the Vicarage of the said Parish of Brighton as of the Vicarage of the said New Parish of Saint Nicholas, Brighton, and with the consent of the Reverend Frederick Cyril Nugent Hicks, Clerk in Holy Orders, the Vicar or Incumbent of the said Vicarage of the Parish of Brighton and, as such Vicar or Incumbent, the Patron of the Vicarage of the said New Parish of Saint Stephen, Brighton (in testimony whereof they the said consenting parties have respectively signed and sealed this Representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said Parish of Brighton, of the said New Parish of Saint Nicholas, Brighton, and of the said New Parish of Saint Stephen,

Brighton, which are described in the Schedule hereunder written, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one Consolidated Chapelry for the said Church of Saint Michael and All Angels, Brighton, situate as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Michael and All Angels, Brighton.'

"We, therefore, humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to Your Majesty in Your Royal Wisdom shall seem meet."

"THE SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Michael and All Angels, Brighton, comprising:---

" All those contiguous portions of the Parish of Brighton, of the New Parish (sometime District Chapelry) of Saint Nicholas, Brighton, and of the New Parish (sometime District Chapelry) of Saint Stephen, Brighton, all in the County of Sussex and in the Diocese of Chichester, which are comprised within and are bounded by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said New Parish of St. Nicholas, Brighton, from an isolated portion of the said Parish of Brighton at the junction of the road called Regent Hill and Western Road, and extending thence westward along the middle of Western Road (thereby following in part the boundary which divides the said isolated portion of the Parish of Brighton from the said New Parish of Saint Stephen, Brighton) for a distance of 15 chains or thereabouts to its junction with the road called Hampton Place, and extending thence northward along the middle of Hampton Place for a distance of 7 chains or thereabouts to its junction with the road called Montpelier Terrace upon the boundary which divides the said New Parish of Saint Stephen, Brighton, from another isolated portion of the said Parish of Brighton, and extending thence westward along the last mentioned boundary (thereby following the middle of Montpelier Terrace) for a distance of 61 chains or thereabouts to the junction of Montpelier Terrace with Montpelier Road and the road called Montpelier Place, and extending thence westward along the middle of Montpelier Place for a distance of  $8\frac{3}{4}$  chains or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said New Parish of Saint Stephen, Brighton, from the New Parish of Saint Patrick, Hove, in the said County and Diocese, and extending thence north-eastward along the last mentioned boundary (thereby crossing Victoria Road) for a distance of 19 chains or thereabouts to the point in the middle of Windlesham Avenue where such boundary meets the boundary which divides the New Parish of All Saints. Brighton, in the said County and Diocese, from the said New Parish of Saint Stephen, Brighton, and extending thence south-eastward along the last mentioned boundary (thereby following the middle of Windlesham. Avenue) for a distance of 7 chains or thereabouts to the junction of Windlesham Avenue, Montpelier Road and the road called Clifton Hill where such boundary meets the boundary
