Vicana, June 8. The bad weather has retarded for several days the intended Siege of Bihatz; Three Regiments of German Foot, one of Horse, and two of Dragoons, designed for this Service, Rendevoused the 30th of the last Month near Canlfur, and on the 31th marched thence under the Command of General Aversherg to a Place called Unaswas in Croatia, where the Foot continued the ed and 4th with the Artillery, by reason of the great Rains, but the Horse advanc'd several Miles further to the River Corona, to observe the Enemy; The Forces of Croatia were likewise drawn together, and when joined with the Germans, would make an Army of above 20000 Men; They had taken in the German Camp a French Ingenier, who came thither as a Spy. The Troops that are to compose the Emperor's main Army in Hungary, march to their Rendevous between Baya and Veilmarton; and Prince Eugene of Savoy will leave this place in few days in order to repair thither, having already sent away his Equipage. Envoy of Moscowy prepares for his departure, intending to pass the Campaign in the Imperial Army in Hungary; and three Ambasiadors from the Czar are shortly expected at this Court. Joung Duke of Lorraine is gone to the Confederate Army on the Rhine, and the Emperor has made him Velt-Marshal of his Forces.

Hamburgh, June 18. The Danish Forces opened their Trenches against the Holmer Fort on the 11th Instant; the 12th and 13th they shot several Bombs into the Place, and being ready for an Assault, the Governor desir'd a Parley on the 14th, and agreed to furrender the faid Fort; after which the Danish Forces marched to attack the two other Forts lately built by the Duke of Holftien. The King of Denmark is returned to Copenhagen, and before his departure from Rensburg promised; that these three Forts, being demolished, he will withdraw all his Troops, and send them to

Paris, June 17. An Express is arrived from the French Army in Catalonia, who brings an account that Barcelona was Invested the 9th Instant, and the Trenches were to be opened the 12th; That the Prince of Hesse Darmssade was entred into the Town with 11000 Foot a d 1000 Horse, besides the Militia of the Country, which made up the Garison to about 20000, and the rest of the Spanish Army, being 5000 Foot and 3000 Horse, were resided to the other side of the River Lobregat, to expect a Reinforcement, and to act as opportunity might offer, in order to disturb the French Troops in the Siege, and innercept their Convoys.
