WORKMEN'S COMPENSATION ACT, 1906

The Home Secretary gives notice, that in pursuance of Section 2 (1) of the Employment of Women, Young Persons and Children Act, 1920, he has made an order authorising the employment on two day shifts of women of 18 and young persons of 16 years of age and over in the Wireless Valve Department, at the works of The Cosmos Lamp Works Limited, Brimsdown, Middlesex, subject to the conditions that a worker shall not be employed in the afternoon shift in consecutive weeks; that suitable cloakroom and messroom accommodation and washing facilities shall be provided; that arrangements shall be made for the effective and regular supervision of the women and young persons employed by a responsible forewoman during the whole time the shifts are at work; and that the Secretary of State may at any time require the occupiers to make such special arrangements for the conveyance of workers living at a distance or otherwise for the welfare of such workers as may be necessary to prevent hardship.
