

gazetted Order the boundaries of the said New Parish of Saint John, Ashley Lane, Moston, and of the said New Parish of Saint Luke, Lightbowne, shall be altered so that all that portion of the said New Parish of Saint John, Ashley Lane, Moston, which is described in the Schedule hereunder written and is delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto annexed and is thereon coloured pink shall be dissevered from such New Parish and shall be annexed to and shall in future form part of the said New Parish of Saint Luke, Lightbowne.

“ And we further represent, recommend, and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from representing, recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore mentioned Acts, or of any of them, or of any other Act of Parliament.

“ THE SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme or Representation has reference.

“ The territory to be dissevered from the New Parish of Saint John, Ashley Lane, Moston, in the County of Lancaster and in the Diocese of Manchester, and to be annexed to the New Parish of Saint Luke, Lightbowne, in the same County and Diocese, being:—

“ All that portion of the said New Parish of Saint John, Ashley Lane, Moston, which is bounded upon the east by the said New Parish of Saint Luke, Lightbowne, and upon the remaining sides, that is to say, upon the north, upon the west and upon the south by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said New Parish of Saint Luke, Lightbowne, from the said New Parish of Saint John, Ashley Lane, Moston, at the junction of Kenyon Lane with Penn Street, and extending thence westward along the middle of Penn Street for a distance of 3 chains or thereabouts to its junction with Elizabeth Street, and extending thence southward along the middle of Elizabeth Street for a distance of 5 chains or thereabouts to its junction with Whittaker Street, and extending thence eastward along the middle of Whittaker Street for a distance of 3 chains or thereabouts to its junction with Kenyon Lane upon the boundary which divides the said New Parish of Saint John, Ashley Lane, Moston, from the said New Parish of Saint Luke, Lightbowne.”

And whereas drafts of the said Scheme or Representation have been transmitted to the Patrons and to the Incumbents of the Cures affected by the arrangements which are contemplated by such Scheme or Representation and such Patrons and Incumbents have respectively signified their assent thereto:

And whereas the said Scheme or Representation has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme or Representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Manchester.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the 6th and 7th years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, Chapter 77, and of the Act of the 5th and 6th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 26, duly prepared, and laid before His Majesty in Council, a Scheme, bearing date the 13th day of November, 1924, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

“ We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the 6th and 7th years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, Chapter 77, and of the Act of the 5th and 6th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 26, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following Scheme for authorizing certain works of improvement at Farnham Castle, the Episcopal House of Residence belonging to the See of Winchester:

“ Whereas the Right Reverend Frank Theodore, now Bishop of the Diocese of Winchester, is desirous that certain works should be carried out for the preservation of the ancient boundary walls of Farnham Castle, and has submitted to us the particulars of such works and we have specified our general approval of the same:

“ And whereas the said Bishop is also desirous and it appears to us to be expedient that towards the cost of effecting the aforesaid works of improvement a sum of £200 (being a sum which together with the outstanding balance of the sums already borrowed upon the same security under the authority of the Statutes hereinbefore mentioned does not exceed two years' income of the See) should be provided by his borrowing the same by way of mortgage upon the security of all and every part of the lands, tenements, and hereditaments, endowments or emoluments, which now belong or may hereafter belong to the Bishopric of Winchester:

“ Now, therefore, with the consent of the said Frank Theodore, Bishop of the said Diocese of Winchester (testified by his having affixed his signature and Episcopal Seal to this Scheme), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly recommend and propose that the said Bishop be authorized to borrow from the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne, and that the said Governors be empowered to lend under the provisions of the above mentioned Acts any sum not exceeding £200 and that as a security for the same the said Bishop do mortgage all and every part of the lands, tenements, and hereditaments, and endowments or emoluments, which now belong or may hereafter belong to his said See to the
