At the Court at Buckingham Palace, the 19th day of October, 1924.

### PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

Lord Colebrooke. Lord Thomson. Mr. Secretary Henderson. Mr. C. P. Trevelyan.

WHEREAS by section 18 of the Extradition Act, 1870, it is among other things enacted that if by any law or ordinance made after the passing of the said Act by the Legislature of any British Possession provision is made for carrying into effect within such Possession the surrender of fugitive criminals who are in, or suspected of being in, such British Possession, His Majesty may, by the Order in Council applying the said Act in the case of any Foreign State, or by any subsequent Order, either—

Suspend the operation within any such British Possession of the said Act or any part thereof, so far as it relates to such Foreign State, and so long as such law or ordinance continues in force there and no longer;

Or direct that such law or ordinance or any part thereof shall have effect in such British Possession, with or without modifications and alterations, as if it were part of the Act:

And whereas by an Act enacted by the Legislature of the Colony of Southern Rhodesia, the short title of which is the Extradition Act, 1924, and the provisions of which are fully set

forth in the Schedule appended to this Order, provision has been made for carrying into effect within the Colony the surrender of fugitive criminals who are therein or suspected of being therein:

And whereas it is provided by the said Act that the said Act shall come into operation as soon as an Order of His Majesty in Council directing that the said Act shall have effect within the Colony as if it were part of the Extradition Act, 1870, shall have been duly published in the Government Gazette of the Colony:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, in pursuance of the Extradition Act, 1870, and in exercise of the powers in that behalf in the said Act contained, doth by this present Order, by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, direct as follows:—

The Southern Rhodesia Extradition Act, 1924, shall have effect in the Colony without modification or alteration as if it were part of the Extradition Act, 1870.

#### SCHEDULE.

Whereas by the Imperial Act known as the Extradition Act, 1870, it is enacted that that Act when applied by Order in Council, unless it is otherwise provided by such Order, shall extend to every British Possession, but with the following, among other, modifications, namely:—

No warrant of a Secretary of State shall be required, and all powers vested in or acts
