Venice, July 13. N. S.

THE Senate have mide Choice of the Chevalier Pietro Vinier, at prefent Ambifficor from this Republick at Madrid, to go to the Grurt at Vienna with the same Character. A Vessel is arrived here, who despired from Napoli di Romania the 26th of May, and brings advice, That the Convoy which failed hence under the Commind of Signior Bouvicino, was arrived there, and that the Captain-General intended in few days to put to Sea with the Venetian Fleet. Vitma, July 17. About three weeks ago we had the fift account that a great many Hungirians were afternished together in Arms, and had surprized and out in Fieres the German Soldiers that were in Garison at Tockay, and two other small places in Upper-Hungary; We understood afterwards that they had published a kind of a Declaration in the Name of Count Tecksley, to encourage whers to follow their Example, and join with them; Haupon some of the Emparor's Forces quartered in that. Two days afterwards Colonel Dyacks having with him 1000 Heydukes, met and defeated another Body of the Hungarian Rebels, and cut off 400 of them; tince which their other Parties (for in all they are said to have been about 10000, the many of them without Arms) are dispersed; and it's believed Tockay will submit to the first of the Emperor's Troops that appear before the Place; However several Germ in Regiments are marching towards Upper-Hungary, to secure the Quiet of those Parts; and the Emperor has caused a Reward of 1000 Crowns to be offered for each of the Principal Rebels, that shall be put into the Hands of any of his Officers. It being resolved to raise the Siege of Bihatz, the Count a Avarrherg sent away the Artillery on the 4th and 5th Instant, and on the 7th all the Forces may ched from theace to join the Imperial Army near Baya. We do not yet hear that the Turkish Forces are drawn together in any considerable Body on our Frorsties; or that the Grand Signior is come farther than Philippoli.

Paris, July 26. On the 22th Instant arrived here an Express from the Duke de Vendosme, giving an account of his having Suprized the Spanish Troops in their Camps not far from Bartelona; The Farticulars, as the French relate them, are as follow; The Marquis de Grigny lay with 2500 Spanish Horse at Cerneille, a Village about a League from the Right of our Camp; Don Michel d'Otazo was pisted on the Hills behind our Camp with 600 Horse, 1000 Foot, and 3 or 4000 Sommetans; The Horse under the Marquis de Grigny had by means of the Fort called the Montjoye, a free Communication with the Town, and facilitated the Passage of the Convoys sent this ther with Ammunicion and Provisions; The Enemy had resolved that on the 14th at night the Garison should make a general Sally on our Trenches, and at the same time time the Marquis de Grigny, and Don Otazo should attack our Camp; The Duke de Vindosme having notice hereof, detached 2200 Horse and 3000 soot, and marched with the mathet 13th before day towards Corneille, and at the same time commanded Lieutenant-General d'Usson with 2000 stussiers and Grenadiers, and 1000 Horse towards the Hills, Lieutenant-General Barbezieres remaining in the Camp with the rest of the Forces, to maintain the Guard of the Trenches, and observe the Garison; Monsieur de Liegal, who commanded the Vanguard of the Troops that were with the Duke de Vendosme, being come near to the Village of Corneille, met 4 or 5 Toops of the Encmies Horse, who being forced to retire, the French followed them so close, that they entred with them into the Spanish Camp, and the rest of our forces immediately after them; The Enemy had not time to desend themselves, and the French Soldiers seil to Plut dering, and among other things took a Box wherein were 2000 Pistoles; in the mean time the Spanish Horse rallied, and 3 or 4 Squadrons came
