N Monday last happened a violent florm, in which was forced on shoar at Deal the Delight of swanfey, having first spent her Mass. She was laden from Rochelle with Wine and Salt, the Wines are most of them preferved, but the Salt all of it loft.

**Pendennis**, Jan. 11. Here is now in this Harbour one great Dutch Merchant thip, which in the extraordinary from the last week elcaped the danger with the loss of two of her Cables and Anchors, one French thip from Earbadoes and St. Christophers, another from Bourdeaux laden with Wi es for Bri, ol, one more from Bristol with a lading of Pitch and Tarre, with feveral other finall Veffels. Yesterday arrived one thip from St. Malo's bound for Weymouth, and another from the fame place intended for Durtmouth.

Ratisbonne, Fan. 7. Several Conferences and Debates have here paffed about the proportions with which the feveral parts of the Empire are to be charged for the rayfing an Army of thirty two thouland men, which are to be ready upon all occations for the defence of the Publique feace of the Empire, but the refult of them is not yet knowne.

From Bavaria we are told, ffiat the 2 inftant the States of that Countrey met in a full Affembly in the Electors Palace, to confider of fome proposals he was then pleased to make to them, out of which number are to be chosen 30. perfonsof the Nobility, 15. of the Deputies from the Cle.gy, and as many of those from the Cities, who are to continue there to confider of affaires of that Country, but as yet the Elector has not dibanded any-of his forces.

Mambourgh, Jan. 8. The 5th inftant Proclamation was made in this City by found of Trumpers and best of Drums, prohibiting any levies to be made in this City or its Dependencies, either for the Prince Elector Palatine or the Duke of Lorrain, and four tharp Inhibitory Mandates are fent our from the Emperour, to enjoyn them to put a flop to their hoftilities, and to refer the differences between them to Arbitration; but the levies are faid to be ftill on foot for the Duke of Sazen Lawenbourgh.

From Warfam we are adviled, that the Mulcovite has offered to the Poles the Refti ution of Kiom, but upon leveral conditions; one whereof is that they elect his Son to fucceed to the Crown of Poland.

That the Nobility and Grandees of the Kingdom are retired juto their respective Provinces, where they improve their intereffs in gaining voices for the Candidates, whole party they have espouled; but were before their departure visited by the Prince of Lorrain's Confistor, who was not wanting in producing his most effectual arguments in favour of the Prince; who has also employed his Agents to the Officers of the Army, endeavoring by large promises to gain them to his party.

Bruffells, Jan. 47. On Saturday last the Constable of Cafille arrived privately and unexpectedly, without any Ceremony, passing streight on to his Pallace; which was some time before prepared for his Reception. The rext day, being Stunday, at 4 in the Asternoon he went folemnly to the Great Church; accompanied in his Coach by Count Marsia his Camp-Master-General, the P.ince de Ligne General of the Horse, and the Count 'alagar General of the Artillery : fol owed by a great number of Coaches with fix Horses, amongst which were the cosh his own, with his Guards of Halberds and Archers, and a great Train of hi , Domesticks.

Yetherday the City, according to theis Cultom upon the Entry of anew Governour, attended him with their Prefent of Wines. This Morning he gave publick Audience, having first been present at a Gouncil of War; to which were fummoned all the General Officers; to confider what was fittelt to be done for the fecuring of the Peace of those Countries: effectially fince the French Forces are upon their march, who to ongh pretending for *Lorrain*, yet the neighbouring Countries find it convenient to confult for their own fafeties, and to put themfelves upon their Guards, whatfoever accidents may fall out.

Several parts of these Countries are endeavoring to compound for the quartering of foldiers, the quarter about *Aniwerp* having offered a confiderable sum to be excused from ti e burthen; whole example 'tis believed will be suddenly followed by the Countrey hereabouts.

Several Perfons are lately made choice of for a Council, to confider of what has been proposed and discussed by the Commissioners of both parties in their Affembly at *Lille*; the Perfons taken into it being the Chief Prefident, the Treasurer General of the Finances, the Dean of the frivy Council, the Sieur Hierfcamp a Commissioner in the Finances, and the Sieur Kinschot.

On Wedneiday laft at Noon arrived here a Courrier Extraordinary in 12 dayes from Spain, bringing with him leveral dispatches, and advice that all things are amicably compoled in the affairs relating to Don Juan of Aufiria; and that Father Nithard has undertaken an Employment into Germany as Ambasiladout Extraordinary; with a Commission which will be fuddenly dispatch, and he in readiness for his journey.

Yesterday the Magistrates of this place ralled an Astembly of the Comminalty, where a Proposal was made to them what Present should be given, according to their Ast= tient Custom, to their new Governour; b t they not agreeing at the Detting, are this day again astembled upon the same account.

Bruffells, Fan. 18. About 300 of the beft Officers a é lately ma e choice of to be tent into Eurgondy, wrete they are to command 8000 Horie and Hoor first thicher from Milan and oil et pa is of the Spanish Dominions for the fecority of that Country!

Bruges, fan. 12. The 24 Lords of the Free of this City have lately received an Order from the Conftable of *cafiille*, requiring the Eldeft 20 of them to pay in 1000 Patacoons apiece, and to take out new Patents for their places from the King, the other four having it feemes already paid fo their employments ; it being likewife ordered for the future that both the Lords of the Free and thole of the City, fhall pay the like fumme to the King, upon their admiftion ; which was formerly divided amongft themfelves : and that none of upen fhall ablent them felves above a week from their Charge without leave from the Lords of Flanders.

Upon information given that one of the foldiers who communited the vi lence upon the Minister and Congregation at Oudeman, is lately leifed at Mons, his Comrade eleapings one of the Burgomasters of the Free of this City, with a Griffier Criminal, are to be fent; to take care for his conveyance, in order to his farther Examination and Triale,
