And whereas by an Order in Council of the 16th December, 1925, Notice of such Representation was given, and it was ordered that the same should be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Privy Council on the 30th January next, and such Order has been published in the London Gazette, and copies thereof have been affixed, as required by the said Act:

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, as it is hereby ordered, that no new burial ground shall be opened in the said Urban District of Ely save with the previous approval of the Minister of Health, and that burials shall be discontinued therein as follows, viz.:—

STUNTNEY.—Forthwith and entirely in the Church of Stuntney, in the Civil Parish of Ely Trinity within the said Urban District of Ely, and in the Churchyard attached thereto.

10 days' previous notice of his intention in that behalf, has, under the provisions of the Burial Act, 1853, as amended by subsequent enactments, made a Representation to His Majesty in Council that for the protection of the Public Health, the opening of any new burial ground in the Borough of Tenterden in the said County of Kent, save with the previous approval of the Minister of Health, should be prohibited, and that burials should be discontinued therein as hereinafter directed:

And whereas by an Order in Council of the 16th December, 1925, Notice of such Representation was given, and it was ordered that the same should be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Privy Council on the 30th day of January, 1926, and such Order has been published in the London Gazette and copies thereof have been affixed, as required by the said Act:

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, as it is hereby ordered, that no new Burial Ground shall be opened in the said Borough of Tenterden, in the County of Kent, save with the previous approval of the Minister of Health, and that except as hereinafter provided burials shall be discontinued therein as follows, viz.:—

SMALL HYTHE.—Forthwith and entirely in the Church of Saint John the Baptist, Small Hythe, in the Borough of Tenterden, and in the Churchyard attached thereto, as it existed prior to 1910: Provided that in the under mentioned earthen graves now existing in the said Churchyard, the burial may be allowed of the bodies of the following persons at their decease, viz.:—

- (1) Fred Austen, in the grave of his wife.
- (2) Frederick Martin, in the grave of his wife.
- (3) Charles Sharp, in the grave of his wife.

Subject in each case to the condition that no part of the coffin containing the body shall be a depth less than three feet below the level of the surface of the ground adjoining the grave.
