

“ And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that certain contiguous portions (being the portions containing the population aforesaid) of the said Parish of Greystoke, of the said Parish of Caldbeck, and of the said New Parish of Matterdale should be formed into a Consolidated Chapelry for all Ecclesiastical purposes, and that the same should be assigned to the said Church situate at Mungrisdale as aforesaid :

“ Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Henry Herbert, Bishop of Carlisle, as such Bishop and also as the Patron in right of his See, of the Rectory of the said Parish of Caldbeck, with the consent of Mary Grace Senhouse-Ryder, of Bishopsbourne, Cannes, France, Married Woman, as the Patron of the Rectory of the said Parish of Greystoke, and with the consent of the Reverend Richard Field Smyth, Rector or Incumbent of the said Rectory of Greystoke, and as such Rector or Incumbent, the Patron of the Vicarage of the said New Parish of Matterdale (in testimony whereof they the said consenting parties have respectively signed and sealed this Representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said Parish of Greystoke, of the said Parish of Caldbeck and of the said New Parish of Matterdale, which are described in the Schedule hereunder written, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one Consolidated Chapelry for the said Church situate at Mungrisdale as aforesaid, and that the same should be named ‘ The Consolidated Chapelry of Mungrisdale.’

“ We, therefore, humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to Your Majesty in Your Royal Wisdom shall seem meet.

“ THE SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

“ The Consolidated Chapelry of Mungrisdale comprising :—

“ I. All that portion of the Parish of Greystoke, in the County of Cumberland and in the Diocese of Carlisle, which comprises the Civil Parishes of Mungrisdale and Bowscale and portions of the Civil Parishes of Hutton Roof, Berrier and Murrah, and Hutton Soil, and which is bounded upon the south partly by the New Parish (sometime District Chapelry) of Matterdale, in the said County and Diocese, and partly by the Chapelry of Threlkeld, in the said Parish of Greystoke, upon the west by the Extra Parochial Place called Skiddaw Forest, upon the north west and upon part of the north by the Parish of Caldbeck, both in the said County and Diocese, and upon the remaining sides, that is to say, upon the remaining part of the north and upon the east, by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said Parish of Caldbeck from the said Parish of Greystoke at the centre of the ford in the River Calder of Caldew where the road leading

from Mosedale to Hutton Roof crosses such river, and extending thence first north eastward, then eastward and then again north eastward along the middle of the said road for a distance of 22 chains or thereabouts to its junction with the road leading from Hutton Roof to Mungrisdale, and extending thence first south eastward and then southward along the middle of the last mentioned road for a distance of 1 mile or thereabouts to its junction with the road leading from Mungrisdale towards Castle Sowerby, and extending thence north eastward along the last mentioned road for a distance of 39 chains or thereabouts to a point opposite to the northern end of the fence forming the western boundary of Howgill Wood, and extending thence south eastward to and along such fence and along the fence forming the western boundary of the close lying between Howgill Wood and Cow Snout Wood and the fence forming the western boundary of Cow Snout Wood for a distance in all of 74 chains or thereabouts to the southern end of the last mentioned fence, and extending thence in a straight line due west for a distance of 16 chains or thereabouts to a point in the middle of the road leading from Murrah to Berrier, and extending thence south eastward along the middle of the last mentioned road for a distance of 25 chains or thereabouts to its junction with the footpath leading across the northern end of Little Eycott Hill, and extending thence first south westward, then southward and then again south westward along the middle of the said footpath for a distance of 35 chains or thereabouts to the point where it is crossed by the fence forming the western boundary of Little Eycott Hill, and extending thence southward along the last mentioned fence for a distance of 18 chains or thereabouts to the point where it meets the boundary which divides the Civil Parish of Berrier and Murrah from the Civil Parish of Mungrisdale, and extending thence first southward and then in various directions along the last mentioned boundary for a distance of 1 mile and 7 chains or thereabouts to the point where such boundary meets the boundary which divides the said Civil Parish of Berrier and Murrah from the Civil Parish of Hutton Soil, and extending thence first north eastward and then in various directions along the last mentioned boundary for a distance of 33 chains or thereabouts to the point where it meets the fence forming the eastern boundary of the close numbered 678 upon the Ordnance Survey Map of the said Civil Parish of Hutton Soil published in the year 1899 upon the scale of 25 inches to a mile and also upon the map or plan annexed to this Representation, and extending thence south eastward along the last mentioned fence and along the fences forming the eastern boundaries of the closes numbered 677, 690, 689, 691, and 693 upon the same maps for a distance of 63 chains or thereabouts to the point where the fence forming the eastern boundary of the said close numbered 693 meets the northern side of the road leading from Penrith to Keswick, and extending thence south eastward in a straight line across the last mentioned road for a distance of 17 yards or thereabouts to the northern end of the fence forming the eastern boundary of the close numbered 707 upon the said maps, and
