

representing the proceeds of the sale redemption or other conversion of the whole or any part of such Tithe Rent Charge shall be severed from the said Benefice of Holdgate and shall be transferred and annexed to the United Benefice of Diddlebury with Bouldon, and all other the endowments and property belonging to the said Benefice of Holdgate shall belong to the United Benefice of Holdgate with Tugford.

“ Provided always that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Measure, or of any other Measure of the National Assembly of the Church of England, or of any Act of Parliament.”

And whereas drafts of the said Scheme have been duly published in accordance with the provisions of the said Union of Benefices Measure, 1923, and Notices have been transmitted to the persons or bodies entitled under the same Measure to receive Notice requiring any objections to such draft Scheme to be stated or transmitted in writing to the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners within the time prescribed in the Statutory Rules applicable to proceedings under the said Union of Benefices Measure, 1923:

And whereas the prescribed time has elapsed and no such objections have been so stated or transmitted to the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners:

And whereas public notice of the certification to His Majesty in Council of the said Scheme and the consent thereto in writing of the Bishop of Hereford has been duly given in the manner and within the time prescribed in the Statutory Rules aforesaid:

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to affirm the said Scheme and to order that the Benefices therein recommended to be united shall be united to the extent and for the purposes recommended in the said Scheme, and further to order and direct that the said Scheme and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the date when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Measure.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Hereford.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the 19th and 20th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 104, duly prepared, and laid before His Majesty in Council, a Scheme, bearing date the 15th

day of April, 1926, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

“ We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, acting in pursuance of the Act of the 19th and 20th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 104, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following Scheme for dividing the Parish of Radipole, in the County of Dorset and in the Diocese of Salisbury, into two distinct and separate parishes:

“ Whereas the said Parish of Radipole comprises two distinct areas separated from one another by other parishes and by the Backwater of Weymouth Harbour, the more southerly area being thickly populated and including the Church of Saint Mary, Weymouth, which is the Parish Church of the said Parish of Radipole and the more northerly area being largely rural and including the Church of Saint Ann, Radipole, which is a Chapel of Ease to the said Parish Church of Saint Mary, Weymouth:

“ And whereas the said Church of Saint Ann, Radipole, is situate at a distance of more than two miles by road from the said Parish Church of Saint Mary, Weymouth, and there has been a considerable increase of population in the neighbourhood of the said Church of Saint Ann, Radipole:

“ And whereas we are satisfied that the existing arrangement by which the said Church of Saint Ann, Radipole, is served as a Chapel of Ease by the Incumbent of the said Parish Church of Saint Mary, Weymouth, as Rector of Radipole, is inconvenient and it appears to us to be desirable that the said Parish of Radipole should be divided into two separate and distinct parishes in the manner which is hereinafter set forth:

“ And whereas we have agreed, subject to the division of the said Parish of Radipole in the manner hereinafter set forth, to make out of the Common Fund created by the Act of the 3rd and 4th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 113, a grant of £275 per annum to the Rector or Incumbent of the proposed Parish of Saint Mary, Weymouth, and a grant of £50 per annum to the Rector or Incumbent of the proposed Parish of Radipole:

“ And whereas the said grants of the said yearly sums of £275 and £50 respectively will, after the publication in the London Gazette of an Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme, be made and secured by an Instrument or Instruments to be executed by us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, under our Common Seal, in accordance with the provisions of the Act of the 29th and 30th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 111:

“ Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend St. Clair George Alfred, Bishop of Salisbury (in testimony whereof he has signed this Scheme and affixed his Episcopal Seal thereto), with the consents of the Reverend Ernest Augustus Eardley-Wilmot, of The Vicarage, Broxbourne, in the County of Hertford, Clerk in Holy Orders and a Prebendary of the Cathedral Church of Wells, the Reverend Arthur Evelyn Barnes-Lawrence, of Number 4, Upperton Gardens, Eastbourne, Clerk in Holy Orders and an
