PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by the Consular Salaries and Fees Act, 1891, His Majesty the King is authorised by Order in Council to fix the fees to be taken in respect of any matter or thing done by a Consular Officer in the execution of his office, and to vary such fees by way of increase or decrease, and to abolish fees, and to create new fees:

And whereas by certain Orders in Council fees to be taken by Consular Officers have been fixed:

And whereas it is expedient to make certain provisions respecting the amounts of fees fixed by Orders in Council made or which may hereafter be made under the before mentioned Act:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, in pursuance of the before mentioned Act, is pleased by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

I. This Order may be cited as the Consular Fees (Amendment) Order in Council, 1926.

II. Whenever any fee is leviable under the Consular Salaries and Fees Act, 1891, and the amount of such fee, if computed in accordance with the provisions in force of any Order in Council made thereunder, would either be less than sixpence or, if greater, would not be a multiple of sixpence, then in every such case the fee, which shall be taken, shall be sixpence or such sum, being a multiple of sixpence and

greater than the amount so computed, as is nearest thereto.

III. This Order shall come into operation forthwith.

And the Right Honourable Sir Austen Chamberlain, K.G., one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, is to give the necessary directions herein.
