

Persons holding situations in the Civil Service and Apprentices in H.M. Dockyards must obtain the permission of the authorities of their Department to attend the examination before the commencement of the competition.

Persons upon whose training for the occupation of teacher public money has been spent cannot be appointed until the consent of the appropriate education authority has been notified to the Civil Service Commissioners.

No person will be eligible who obtained from any tribunal established under the Military Service Acts, 1916 to 1918, exemption from service in His Majesty's Forces under those Acts on the ground of a conscientious objection to the undertaking of military service, or, although not so exempted, declined to comply with obligations imposed upon him by those Acts.

6. *Subjects*.—The examination will be in the following subjects:—

1. Mathematics.
2. Electro-Technology.
3. Materials.
4. Theory of Machines.
5. One of the following four subjects:—
 - (a) Alternating Currents.
 - (b) Electrical Machines.
 - (c) Telegraphy and Telephony.
 - (d) Heat Engines.

6. Personal Qualities.

No candidate will be eligible who does not pass to the satisfaction of the Civil Service Commissioners in each of the subjects 1, 2, 3, 4, 6.

The examination may be held in one part or in two parts, at the discretion of the Civil Service Commissioners. In the latter case the first part of the examination will be used to reduce the number of competitors to be admitted to the second part. Of those who pass and obtain the highest aggregate marks on the first part a certain number, to be determined by the Civil Service Commissioners, will be admitted to the second part of the examination. The successful list will consist of those candidates who pass and obtain the highest aggregate marks in the whole examination.

7. *Applications* for permission to attend an examination must be made at such time and in such manner as the Civil Service Commissioners may appoint.

8. *Fee*.—A fee of £5 will be required from every Candidate attending an examination.

The Civil Service Commissioners further give notice that an Open Competitive Examination will be held in London and, provided in each case candidates present themselves in sufficient number, in Belfast, Edinburgh and Manchester, under the foregoing Regulations, commencing on the 5th October, 1926.

Not fewer than 6 Candidates will be declared successful on the result of this Examination, if so many should be found qualified.

No person will be admitted to Examination from whom the Secretary of the Civil Service Commission has not received, on or before the 19th August, an application, in the Candidate's own handwriting, on a prescribed form, which may be obtained from the Secretary at once.

THE LONDON TRAFFIC (RESTRICTED STREETS) (No. 3) REGULATIONS, 1925.

Whereas by Notice dated the 17th day of June, 1926, published in the London Gazette dated the 18th day of June, 1926, the Minister of Transport, by virtue and in exercise of the powers given to him by Section 7 of the London Traffic Act, 1924, and the London Traffic (Restricted Streets) Regulations, 1925, the London Traffic (Restricted Streets) (No. 2) Regulations, 1925, and the London Traffic (Restricted Streets) (No. 3) Regulations, 1925, after consulting the London and Home Counties Traffic Advisory Committee, relaxed the restrictions and limitations imposed by Regulation 2 of each of the said Regulations upon the occasion of the All England Lawn Tennis Championships to be held at Wimbledon Park on each week-day from Monday the 21st day of June to Saturday the 3rd of July, 1926, and such additional days as may be necessary.

And whereas the Minister proposes further to relax the said restrictions and limitations in respect of Thursday, the 24th day of June, 1926.

Now, therefore, notice is hereby given that the Minister of Transport, by virtue and in exercise of the above-mentioned powers, has further relaxed the restrictions and limitations referred to in the above-mentioned Notices so that nothing in the said Regulations shall prevent any person who is maintaining at the date of this Notice a regular service in accordance with Section 6 of the London Traffic Act, 1924, upon any of the approved routes numbered 32, 39, 51A and 177 from using on that day in any of the streets or parts thereof declared to be "restricted streets" by the London Traffic (Restricted Streets) Order, 1925, the London Traffic (Restricted Streets) (No. 2) Order, 1925,
