## ORDER OF THE MINISTER OF AGRICULTURE AND FISHERIES. (Dated 29th June, 1926.)

The Minister of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in him under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1925, and of every other power enabling him in this behalf, hereby orders as follows:—

#### Authorisation of Landing of Pedigree Swine from Canada

1. The landing of the swine described in the First Schedule hereto is hereby allowed, subject to the provisions of Part II (Quarantine) of the Third Schedule to the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894, and of the Foreign Animals (Quarantine) Order of 1896, and of this Order.

#### Definition of Quarantine Station.

2. The premises described in the Second Schedule hereto are hereby defined as a Foreign Animals Quarantine Station for the purpose of the landing and detention of the swine under this Order.

# Regulations Applicable to Animals before and on Landing.

3.—(1) The swine shall not be landed in Great Britain unless and until there are delivered to a proper officer of Customs and Excise the certificates and declarations prescribed by this Article, namely :—

(a) a certificate signed by a duly authorised officer of the Dominion of Canada to the effect that at the time of the shipment of the animals the swine showed no evidence of foot-and-mouth disease and swine-fever, and that the whole of the Dominion was free from foot-and-mouth disease and cattle-plague;

(b) a certificate signed by the Secretary of the Canadian Swine Breeders' Association, or by some person authorised to act on his behalf, to the effect that the said swine were at the time of shipment from the Dominion duly registered as pedigree stock in the Canadian Swine Breeders' Record;

(c) a statutory declaration from the shipper that the fodder and litter accompanying the swine are products of the Dominion of Canada;

(d) a statutory declaration from the Master of the Vessel in which the swine are carried to Great Britain that during the whole of the voyage from Canada no cattle, sheep, goats, other ruminating animals or swine have been carried on the vessel from. any port except cattle loaded at a port in Canada for shipment to Great Britain; that the swine have been kept separate from all other animals during the voyage; that no other fodder or litter for the use of any animal on the vessel has been shipped during the voyage to Great Britain at any port or place outside the Dominion of Canada, and that whilst the said swine were on board, the vessel did not enter a port in a prohibited country for the purposes of the Foreign Animals Order of 1910 or any Order amending it.

(2) The swine, before being landed, shall be examined by a Veterinary Inspector of the Ministry, and if found by him to be free from symptoms of contagious disease, shall forthwith be landed and moved under the super-
