**T**HE Advices from the *Levant* inform us, that the Venetian Fleet were the 18th of the last month in the Port of *Andros*, repairing the damage they had received in their late Engagement with the Turks, and so soon as this was done, and that the Convoy they expected from hence, was arrived, to furnish them with the Provisions and Stores they wanted, they would put to Sea again, and return to the *Archipelago*.

*Warsaw, Aug. 30.* The Dyet summoned by the Primate, or rather the French Faction, have, after several Meetings, taken upon them to declare all those that join with the Elector of *Saxony*, Enemies of their Country, and that their Estates shall be seized and Confiscated; To this effect they have agreed upon, and signed an Instrument of Confederacy, solemnly engaging to stand by each other, and to maintain the Authority of the Primate; in which they have acted with so much heat and animosity, that several of the Deputies who opposed this Proceeding, were in great danger of being cut in pieces, and forced to retire for their security; But the Elector of *Saxony's* Party have met together in the Monastery of the *Bernardines*, and made a Protestation against whatever shall be done in this pretended Dyet, and caused it to be attested by two Publick Notaries; At the same time there seems to be a Third Party forming, who, to avoid a Civil War, which they apprehend will otherwise be occasioned by the present Dispute, propose a new Election, and to send a Deputation to the Elector of *Saxony*, to desire he will leave the Kingdom till the Matter be determined; and this design is thought to be promoted by Prince *James*, Son of the last King, who hopes to find his Account in it; But the Friends of the Elector of *Saxony*, are resolved to go on with his Coronation, and the Preparations are continued at *Cracow* for that purpose.

*From the Imperial Camp near Cobila, Aug. 21.* The Grand Signior and Visier arrived at *Belgrade* the 9th of this month, and we have since had different Reports concerning their design; at first 'twas given out, that they would march directly to *Peter-Waradin*, and attack that place, and several Preparations for passing the *Save* were purposely made by the Turks to confirm that Opinion. This made us use the necessary Precautions, in reinforcing the Garrison of *Peter-Waradin*, and posting our Fleet near that place; We put our selves likewise in a posture to meet the Enemy; being very desirous to have a good op-

portunity of coming to a Battle with them; But some days after we received Advice, that the whole Turkish Army had passed the *Danube*, and marched towards *Temeswar*; Hereupon the necessary Dispositions were made, and Orders given, to follow the Enemy; An Express was sent to General *Rabutin*, who is with a Body of the Imperial Forces on the Frontiers of *Transilvania*, to give him notice of the Enemies march, and of the Resolution taken by our Generals; Directions were likewise sent to Prince *Charles* of *Vaudemont* to make all the haste he could, with the Troops under him, to join us; and this day we received an account, that he is come within two days march of us. 'Tis believed we shall decamp to morrow.

*Vienna, Aug. 31.* All the Advices from *Hungary* say, the Grand Signior has passed the *Danube* with his whole Army, between *Belgrade* and *Widin*; and that he has sent Count *Tockley* to the Frontiers of *Upper-Hungary*, to Head the Rebels that remain still together. The Imperial Army would decamp from *Cobila* the 22th of this month, to follow the Sultan, who seem'd to bend his march towards *Transilvania*, and in the mean time Directions had been given, to make the necessary provision at *Segedin*, for the Subsistence of our Forces, in their march that way; Count *d'Aversberg* is building a Fort near the place where the River *Theysse* falls into the *Danube*, which will be of great use to secure our Barks and other Vessels that are sent with Stores for the use of the Army. *Francis Tockay*, the Chief of the Rebels, who was taken in one of the late Rencontres, was brought hither Prisoner two days ago.

*Mentz, Sept. 7.* The German Army commanded by Prince *Lewis* of *Baden*, after having lain several days in their Camp at *Genzingen*, marched the 3d Instant to *Creutznach*; where they are still encamped; and they have laid several Bridges over the River *Nobe*; The Forces that lay on the other side of the *Rhine*, commanded by the Marsgrave *de Bareith*, are on their march to join Prince *Lewis*; and part of them, being about 6000 Foot, who came by Water from *Gernsheim*, landed here this day; and 10 Squadrons of Horse are to pass the River *Mein* at *Costheim*, from whence they will continue their march hither. Several Pieces of Cannon for Battery and Mortars, with Bombs, and Ammunition, have been provided here, and were this day put on Board of small Vessels; These Preparations make it thought, that the Germans intend to attack the Forts of *Ebernburg*. The French Army, which lately repassed the *Rhine* at *Strasbourg*, hasten in the mean time their march this way; They were two days ago encamp'd
