Dantzicke, Septemb. 21. The Elector of Saxony is Crowned King of Poland; and Affairs are within this Fortnight very much changed to his advantage; Several of the Chief of the Nobility, who adhered to the Prince of Conti, have left that fide and submitted to him.

Vienna, Sept. 18. On the 14th Instant Prince Charles of Vaudement arrived here from the Imperial Army in Hungary, to bring the Emperor the good news of an entire and glorious Victory they have obtained over the Turks,
