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Rome, Sep. 15. N. S.

THE Abbot *Palucci*, who now resides here on the part of the Elector of *Saxony*, King of *Poland*, does very much press the Pope, to declare himself in favour of his Master, which would be of great advantage to his affairs in that Kingdom; The Bishop of *Cujavia* and several other Bishops of *Poland*, have writ to the Pope on the same Subject; but hitherto He avoids returning any answer in Writing, being desirous first to see how things are like to go there upon the Prince of *Cony's* arrival; and in the mean time Cardinal *Spazza*, the Chief Minister, feeds both sides with fair words and promises.

Leghorn, Sep. 16. On the 11th Instant came into this Road a French Man of War with 4 Merchant Ships from *Toulon*, bound for *Smirna* and *Constantinople*, and the 14th arrived here 2 other French Figars with one Merchant Ship, the latter bound likewise to the *Levant*. We have advice from *Sardinia* that 2 small Spanish Privateers have lately taken near that Island a French Ship richly laden from *Alexandria*.

Venice, Sep. 21. Here has been great Rejoycing for the Victory which the Imperialists have obtained over the Turks in *Hungary*, and yesterday *Te Deum* was sung in the Chapel of *St. Marks*, at which the *Doge* and whole Senate assisted. By the last Letters from the *Levant* the Venetian Fleet was in the Port of *Andros*, and that of the Turks at *Stra*. They are fitting out here another Convoy for the *Mores*, which may be ready to depart in a fortnight; and 'tis said the Senate intend to appoint a new Captain General to Command their Forces against the Turks.

Warsaw, Sep. 21. The King of *Poland's* Coronation, and his resolution to march immediately thither with the Forces he has with him at *Cracow*, has very much broke the measures of the Primate and those that adhere to him, who seeing no safety for them here, are retired to *Lowitz*, a place of good strength, where they intend to expect the Prince of *Cony*, and in the mean time have sent out Circular Letters, by which they desire all the Gentlemen of their Party, to meet together on the 10th of *October*, and have assigned them 3 places of Rendezvous; This seems to be their last effort; And we shall quickly see the success; tho' according to the present disposition of things, they have but little reason to believe 'twill be to their advantage.

Dantzick, Sep. 25. This City, who is desirous to maintain a Neutrality, during the present dispute in *Poland*, is brought under some difficulty by the Prince of *Cony's* arrival this morning with *de Barr's* Squadron, near this place; He writ a Letter to our Magistrates to acquaint them with it; and after much consultation, they have sent an Answer, by which they express much Respect for his Person, and offer him and some few Attendants, a passage through this City, tho' they desire he will not bring any Soldiers with

him; and at the same time they have sent a Party of Horse to *Termunde*, to hinder their Landing, in case they should attempt it; we are now expecting to hear what resolution the Prince of *Cony* will take; 'Tis very likely he will come ashore here, but whether the posture of affairs in *Poland* will invite him to go further, is what must be left to our next Letters.

Vienna, Sep. 21. The late Victory over the Turks in *Hungary* is at present the great Subject that entertains every body here; You have already been told all the material Circumstances of it; The Conduct of Prince *Eugene* of *Saroy* is highly commended on this occasion, as well as the bravery of the whole Army; The last Letters make the Enemies loss much greater then what we heard before; 'Tis certain very few of their Foot, that were encamped on this side the *Thyffe* escaped, and after the Fight, many of the Turks who fled from their Second Camp, were overtaken by our Hussars, and destroyed; And such was the Disorder and Precipitation, with which the Sultan abandoned it, that he left every thing behind him; 120 pieces of Brass Cannon were found in the 2 Camps, with a great number of Camels, Horses, and Oxen, which served for the use of the Artillery, Baggage, and Provisions; Few Prisoners were taken; And 'tis confirmed by all hands, that the Grand Vizzer and Aga of the Janizaries are among the slain; The Sultan's own Tent is brought hither, with a great many Standards; The Imperial Army after having Refreshed themselves 2 or 3 days, were, when the last Letters came away, going to de-camp and to march towards *Temeswar*, with a resolution to attack that place; and several Ingenieurs are gone from hence, to serve in the Siege. The Emperor has received a Letter from the King of *Poland*, acquainting him with his Coronation, and the good condition of his affairs in that Kingdom; and from other hands we are told, that He intends to be at *Warsaw* about the end of this Month.

Cologne, Sep. 30. Prince *Lewis* of *Baden* having ordered a Body of his Forces to attack *Ebernburg*, he encamped with the rest of the Army near *Cressnach*, to observe the *Marschal de Choiseul*, who lay between *Alzey* and *Obernheim*; On the 19th in the Evening the Germans made themselves Masters of the Town of *Ebernburg*, the French after some resistance abandoning it and retiring into the Castle, which the Germans began to batter the next day, and continued to do so till the 27th in the Afternoon, when having made a large Breaches, and having every thing in a readiness for an Assault, the Garrison capitulated, and pursuant to what was agreed on, marched out the 28th, and were conducted to *Montroyal*. On the 19th, Prince *Lewis* caused all the Artillery in his Army to be discharged, with 3 Salvoes of small Shot for the Signal Victory obtained by the Imperialist in *Hungary*.
