"And whereas the said Benefice of Wilsford is now full, the Reverend Robert George Howard being the Vicar or Incumbent thereof:

" Now, therefore, we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly recommend and propose that as from the day of the date at which the said Benefice of Wilsford shall from whatsoever cause be next voided, or from the date of the cessation of any pension payable out of the income of the said Benefice to the said Robert George Howard in the event of his resigning the said Benefice under the Incumbents' Resignation Acts, the interest or dividends arising in respect of the sum of £2,666 13s. 4d. India £3 per centum Stock (forming part of the aforesaid sum of £3,129 11s. 3d. India £3 per centum Stock) or in respect of any securities or investments from time to time representing the said sum of £2,666 13s. 4d. India £3 per centum Stock shall cease to be held or received by us for the benefit of the Incumbent of the said Benefice of Wilsford and shall be held or received by us for the benefit of our Common Fund to be applied as in the said Acts mentioned.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas Notice of the foregoing Scheme, which is required by the hereinbefore mentioned Acts, has been given by the said Commissioners to the Patrons of the said Benefice of Wilsford and the said Patrons have not made any objection to the said Scheme:

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Lincoln.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the 6th and 7th years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, Chapter 77, of the Act of the 3rd and 4th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 113, and of the Act of the 37th and 38th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 63, duly prepared, and laid before His Majesty in

Council, a Scheme bearing date the 23rd day of June, 1927, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, acting in pursuance of the Act of the 6th and 7th years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, Chapter 77, of the Act of the 3rd and 4th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 113, and of the Act of the 3rth and 38th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 63, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following Scheme with respect to some of the Rural Deaneries within the Archdeaconry of Doncaster and the Archdeaconry of Sheffield, both in the Diocese of Sheffield:

"Whereas it has been represented to us by the Right Reverend Leonard Hedley, Bishop of Sheffield, that the arrangements which are hereinafter recommended and proposed with respect to some of the Rural Deaneries within the said Archdeaconries of Doncaster and Sheffield are desirable and should be carried into effect and we are of opinion that the same may be properly carried into effect:

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the said Leonard Hedley, Bishop of Sheffield (in testimony whereof he has set his hand and Episcopal Seal to this Scheme), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly recommend and propose that as from the day on which any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme shall be published in the London Gazette, and without any assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order, first, a new Rural Deanery shall be formed within the said Archdeaconry of Sheffield and such new Rural Deanery shall be called 'The Rural Deanery of Handsworth ' and shall comprise and consist of the Parishes or Cures of Anston; Aston; Christ Church, Gleadless; Handsworth; Saint James, Handsworth Woodhouse; Harthill; Thorpe Salvin; Todwick; Wales; and Woodsetts; all at present in the Rural Deanery of Rotherham, and the Parishes of Darnall; and Saint Alban, Darnall, both at present in the Rural Deanery of Sheffield, which said Rural Deaneries of Rotherham and Sheffield are at present in the said Archdeaconry of Sheffield; and secondly, the Parish of Hooton Roberts shall be transferred from the Rural Deanery of Wath, in the said Archdeaconry of Doncaster, to the said Rural Deanery of Rotherham, in the said Archdeaconry of Sheffield; and each of the Parishes or Cures hereinbefore referred to shall be subject to the jurisdiction and authority of the Rural Dean of the Rural Deanery and of the Archdeacon of the Archdeaconry to which it is hereby transferred, and shall not belong to or be a part of any other Rural Deanery or Archdeaconry nor be subject to the jurisdiction and authority of any other Rural Dean or of any other Archdeacon.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other matter or thing with respect to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, by virtue of the said Acts, or of any of them, or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas notices of the said Scheme have, in accordance with the provisions of the
