and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Martin, Croydon.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to Your Majesty in Your Royal Wisdom shall seem meet.

"THE SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Martin, Croydon, comprising :----

"I. All that portion of the New Parish (sometime District Chapelry) of Saint James, Croydon Common, in the County of Surrey and in the Diocese of Canterbury, which is bounded upon the north west by the New Parish of the Holy Trinity, Croydon, upon the north east by the New Parish (sometime District Chapelry) of Saint Luke, Woodside, Croydon, upon the south east and upon the south by the New Parish of Saint Mary Magdalene, Addiscombe, upon the south west by the New Parish of Saint Matthew, Croydon, and upon the remaining side, that is to say, upon the west, by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said New Parish of Saint Matthew, Croydon, from the said New Parish of Saint James, Croydon Common, at the centre of Windmill Bridge which carries Lower Addiscombe Road across the main line of the Central Section of the Southern Railway, and extending thence north eastward along the middle of the said line of railway for a distance of 15 chains or thereabouts to its junction with the Croydon and Balham Line of the same railway, and extending thence first north eastward and then northward along the middle of the last mentioned line of railway for a distance of $17\frac{3}{4}$ chains or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said New Parish of Saint James, Croydon Common, from the said New Parish of the Holy Trinity, Croydon.

" II. And also all that contiguous portion of the said New Parish of Saint Luke, Woodside, Croydon, which is bounded upon the north west by the New Parish of Saint Mark, South Norwood, in the said County and Diocese, upon the south west by the above described portion of the said New Parish of Saint James, Croydon Common, upon the south east by the said New Parish of Saint Mary Magdalene, Addis combe, and upon the remaining sides, that is to say, upon the east and upon the north east by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said New Parish of Saint Mary Magdalene, Addiscombe, from the said New Parish of Saint Luke, Woodside, Croydon, at a point in the middle of the Mid Kent Line of the Eastern Section of the said Southern Railway opposite to the southern end of the fence forming the eastern boundary of the premises belonging to the Morland Engineering Works and known as Number 196, Morland Road, and extending thence northward to and along the said fence and along the fence forming the eastern boundary of the house and premises known as Number 218, Morland Road, for a distance in all of 5 chains or thereabouts to the point where the last men-tioned fence meets the southern side of Morland Road, and extending thence first northward to and then south westward along the middle of Morland Road for a distance in all of 21 chains or thereabouts to its junction with Beckford Road, and extending thence first north westward, then northward, and then again north westward along the middle of Beckford Road for a distance of 291 chains or thereabouts to its junction with Davidson Road, and continuing thence north westward in precisely the same direction as the last part of Beckford Road and in a straight line for a distance of 51 chains or thereabouts to a point in the railway sidings at Norwood Fork Junction upon the boundary which divides the said New Parish of Saint Luke, Woodside, Croydon, from the said New Parish of Saint Mark, South Norwood.'

And whereas the said Representation has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Canterbury.
