Genoia, Sep. 22. N. S.

**T**HE Doge *Negroni* having finished the usual Term of his Government, which is 2 years, the Senate proceeded on Monday last to the Election of his Successor, and made choice by plurality of Voices of Signior *Francisco Sauli*, who the same day took possession of that Dignity. We have an account from *Milan* that there has been great Rejoycing for the late Victory in *Hungary*; And that the Marquis *de Leganez* will continue in that Government for this Winter at least; The 2 Regiments of Suiffers in the Service of the *Milaneze* are reduced to half the number they were during the War. By a Vessel which is come in here in 5 days from *Marseilles*, we are told, that the French have laid up all their Men of War and Gallies that were employed in the Siege of *Barcelona*

*Turin*, Sep. 22. The Duke of *Savoy* intends to visit the Garison of *Moutmelzin* and other places in the Duchy of *Savoy*, and has fixed his journey for the 24th of this Month; The City of *Geneva* upon notice of it, have appointed Deputies to Compliment his Royal Highness at his arrival at *Chamberi*. An Express arrived here 2 days ago, being dispatched by the Governor of *Milan*, to acquaint his Royal Highness with the Signal Victory the Imperial Forces have lately obtained over the Turks in *Hungary*, and particularly to compliment him, upon the great Honour which Prince *Eugene* of *Savoy* has gain'd in this occasion.

*Malaga*, Sep. 26. This week arrived here 2 Spanish Gallies from *Catalonia*, having on Board Don *Francisco de Velasco*, late Viceroy of that Country, who is going to his House not far from this place. The Moors continue the Siege of *Ceuta*, more out of obstinacy, then any prospect they have of making themselves Masters of the place, their number being so lessened by the losses they have sustained, that 'tis hard-

ly sufficient to guard their own Posts; much less to make any Attacks; The War still continues between the Emperor of *Morocco* and the Government of *Algiers*; but we do not hear that any thing considerable has passed in either Army this Summer.

*Venice*, Sep. 28. The new Captain-General *Cornaro* has received the usual Compliments upon his advancement to this Station; He intends to embark the next Week, by which time the great Convoy that is preparing here for the *Levant* may be ready; Several Persons of Quality have offered their Service to accompany him, his Experience and Reputation in former Employments, having procured him a general Esteem. By the last Letters from the *Morea*, which are dated the 9th of the last Month at *Andros*, the Venetian Fleet were still in that Port; The Captain General *Molino* had sent out several Vessels to get Intelligence of the Enemies motions, and the freshest he had received, was, that their Fleet under the Command of the Captain *Bassa Mezzomorto*, lay in the Harbor of *Scio*, repairing the Damages they had sustained in their last Engagement with the Venetians. The Venetian Forces posted near the Isthmus of *Corinth* having sent out the last Month some Parties, with orders to march into the Enemies Country, one of them, met with and defeated a party of about 100 Turks; and the Prisoners they took, gave an account, that the Enemies Army, which lay encamped near that Frontier, did not consist of above 8 or 10000 Men; and that all their best Troops were sent to *Hungary*.

*Vienna*, Oct. 2. An Express was dispatched from hence 2 days ago, to the Imperial Army in *Hungary*, with the Emperor's Orders, about settling their Winter Quarters, upon whose arrival, 'tis believed the Troops will make haste to separate, by reason of the Inconveniencies they suffer through the scarcity of Forage. The Bishop of *Passau* has given the Emperor a particular Relation of his late Embassy in *Poland*, which he has performed very much to the satisfaction of this Court. The Letters from *Cracow* of the 28th of the last Month, give an account, that the Dyer which is usually held immediately after the Coronation of the Kings of

*Poland*,

Poland, is now assembled there, and that so soon as 'twas ended, the King would repair to Warsaw, with such a number of Forces, as in all likelihood would soon disperse the Party that oppose him, who have of late had their principal meetings in that City.

**Cologne, Oct. 11** The last Advices from the Upper-Rhine say, the Duke of Lorraine had left the Imperial Army in their Camp near Creusnach: and was gone to Vienna, and that Prince Lewis of Baden would likewise be going thither in few days. The French Army is encamped at Alzey, under the Command of Mareschal Choiseul, and intend to continue there till the Germans remove; The latter have already sent away some Regiments of Horse, belonging to the Circle of Franconia, who have passed the Rhine at Mentz, in order to their return home.

**Hamburg, Oct. 11. N.S.** The Duke of Holstein Gottorp is returned to Rheinbecke from waiting on the King of England at Loo; His Troops which served in the Confederate Army on the Rhine this Summer, are coming back, and this revives the dispute concerning their Quarters, which the King of Denmark will not suffer them to take in the Country of Holstein; but it's believed this matter will be accommodated.

**Kinsale, Oct. 8.** On the 3d Instant sailed hence the Orford-Galley of London for Cadiz; And on the 5th His Majesty's Ship the Swan Capt. Bloyce, for Corke, having under his Convoy the Exchange of Bristol, and the Fredericksburg of Flushing. Yesterday arrived here His Majesty's Ship the Southampton, Cap. Kirby Commander from Jamaica, whence he departed on the 18th of August in company of the Flame Fireship and 5 Merchant-ships; the latter were separated from him in bad Weather; And the Flame Fireship foundered at Sea, but all the Men were saved; The Southampton has a considerable quantity of Gold and Silver on Board.

**Falmouth, Oct. 11.** His Majesty's Ship the Rupert Cap. Greenhill Commander arrived here this Afternoon, having been separated from the West-India Squadron Commanded (since the Death of Vice Admiral Nevill and Commadore Mees) by Cap. Dilkes, on the 12th of September, being 4 days after their departure from Virginia. Captain Greenhill believes the rest of the Squadron is not far off; They took in the West-Indies 7 or 8 French Privateers who were returning from Cartagena with the Plunder they got there; and afterwards landing 500 Men at Petit Guaves, they plundered and burnt that Town.

**Plymouth, Oct. 12.** Vice-Admiral Mitchell with the Squadron under his Command, consisting of 12 English and 6 Dutch Men of War passed by this Port yesterday to the Westward. The Nassau an East-India Ship with several other Merchant-men, went out under their Convoy.

**Yarmouth, Oct. 15.** Yesterday came in-

to our Road a Fleet of about 40 Laden Colliers bound for the River.

**Portsmouth, Oct. 15.** This Morning were Launched here a New Fifth and Sixth Rate for his Majesty's Service, the former called the Loo, and the latter the Seaford.

**Whitehall, Oct. 17 at Night.** Two Mails from Holland are just now arrived; And we have an account, That the Ratification of the Treaty of Peace under the Great Seal of England was on the 7th Instant our Stile Exchanged with that of the French in the presence of the Mediator; And on the 11th the Peace was Proclaimed at the Hague.
