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Whitehall, Octob. 19.

This Morning, according to a Warrant from their Excellencies the Lords Justices for Proclaiming the Peace, the Kings, Heralds, and other Officers at Arms, the Sergeants at Arms, the King's Serjeant Trumpeters, Trumpets and Kettle-Drums, and the Knight Marshalls, assembled before the Gate of the Royal Palace of Whitehall; And after the Trumpets had Sounded, *Chlorobian* King of Arms Read the Proclamation, and one of the Heralds Proclaimed it aloud; From thence they proceeded in this manner to *Temple-Bar*, *viz.* Marshalls Men, Kettle Drum, Trumpets and Serjeant-Trumpeter with his Mace; Then the Pursuivants, Heralds, and Kings of Arms, in their Coats of His Majesty's Arms, having the Serjeants at Arms on each side of them bearing their Maces on their Shoulders, a Troop of Guards leading the Proceeding, and another closing it. At *Temple-Bar* they were met by the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, Recorder, and Serjeants on Horseback, in their Scarlet Gowns and other Familialties, the City Sword and Mace being born before the Lord Mayor, and the City Officers and Attendants marching on Foot; At *Chancery-Lane-End* was made a second Proclamation; and the same was afterwards repeated at *Chisapside*, and at the *Old Exchange*. After the second Proclamation, the great Guns at the Tower were discharged, and others from the Ships in the River, as those in *James's Park* had been before, after the first Proclamation at *Whitehall*. The Lord Mayor invited the Aldermen, the Officers of Arms, and others to Dinner. At the Evening concluded with Bonfires, Illuminations, and other Demonstrations of Joy suitable to the Occasion.

PROCLAMATION

For Publishing the Peace between His Majesty and the French King.

At Court. J. Sommers C. Sunderland, Dorset, Romney, Orford.

Whereas a Peace hath been Treated and Concluded at His Majesty's Royal Palace at *Whitehall*, the Tenth Day of September last, between His Majesty and the French King, and Ratifications thereof have been since Exchanged, in conformity therunto We have thought fit hereby to Command, That the same be Published throughout all His Majesty's Dominions. And We do hereby Declare, That all Merchandizes, and other Moveable Goods whatsoever, which have been, or shall be Taken from the Subjects of the said King after the Two and twentieth of September last in the British and North Seas; After the Two and twentieth of the Instant October from the said British and North Seas as far as the Cape of *St. Vincent*; After the Ninth of November next ensuing beyond the said Cape Point on this side the *Equinoctial Line* or *Equator*, and in the Ocean and Mediterranean Sea, as elsewhere; and lastly, after the Tenth of March next ensuing beyond the said Line throughout the whole World, without any Condition or Distinction of Time or Place, and without any Manner of Process, shall immediately, and without Damage, be Restored to the Owner, according to the said Treaty. And we do hereby Command all His Majesty's Subjects are hereby Required to take Notice, and to Conform themselves therunto accordingly.

Given at the Court at Whitehall the Eighteenth Day of October, 1697. In the Ninth Year of His Majesty's Reign.

Nov. 6. N. S. On the 3d Instant the French Consul received an Express in 5 days from Paris, in which account of a Peace being concluded, between Eng-

land, Spain, Holland, and France; which by Order of the King his Master, he communicated the same day to the Senate, of whom he had Audience for that purpose.

Leghorne, Oct. 7. A Dutch Privateer called the *Queen Mary*, Capt. *Creas* Commander, came in here this week from cruising, with a French Prize, the *Mission della Grazie*, Capt. *Garaffa*, bound from *Marseilles* to *Tunis*. On the 3d Instant the *Neptune*, a French Man of War of 50 Guns, arrived in this Road; The day following the Dutch Privateer got under Sail, but understanding that the French Frigate intended to follow him, he returned into Port.

Venice, Oct. 11. The Report we had here the last week of another Engagement between the Venetian and Turkish Fleets, seems to be groundless; The Advices that are since come from several places in the *Levant* are as follow. From *Smyrna* of the 2d part; That the Turkish Fleet after having repaired at *Spalimandro* the damage they sustained in their last Sea Fight, sailed thence towards *St. Giorgio de Schiro*, but meeting with bad Weather, 7 or 8 of their biggest Ships run foul of one another, and received so much damage, that the Captain-Buff thought it necessary to return with the whole Fleet to *Foggia*. From *Napoli di Romania* of the 7th of September; That the Turkish Forces, being 9000 Foot and 2000 Horses, which were encamped near *Tobos*, had advanced towards the *Istamus of Corinth*, designing to make an Incurtion into the *Morea*, but the Venetians, under the Command of General *Scalpus*, had so well secured that Pass, that there was no likelihood that the Enemy would be able to effect their design. There had been some skirmishing between our Troops and the Turks, and about 20 Men were killed on both sides. From *Zant* of the 20th part; That a Vessel was arrived there, and reported, that the Venetian and Ottoman Fleets appeared in sight of each other in the beginning of the last month near *Andros*, but after firing 10 or 12 few Guns, the Turks retired; and afterwards a Venetian Man of War called the *St. Sebastian*, was burnt by accident in the Port of *Andros*. The new Captain-General *Cornaro* intends to depart for the *Levant* about the 20th of this month. The Popes and Maltese Gallies are returning home.

Cracow, Oct. 4. The King of Poland having received Advice of the Prince's arrival with *De Bar's* Squadron in the Road of *Dantzicke*, and that the Primate's Party are drawing together in several parts of the Kingdom, he caused the same to be communicated to the Dyer, assembled here, and at the same time let them know, that it would be necessary he should repair to *Warsaw*, and that the Dyer should for the present put an end to their Session, which it's believed they will do in a day or two, having already assured the King of their Fidelity and firm adherence to his Interests. The King dispatched two days ago an Envoy to the Emperor, who, among other things, is to desire, that the Saxon Forces now in *Hungary*, may forthwith march hither; and his Majesty has likewise sent for other Troops from his Territories in *Germany*; The Crown General has acquainted the King, that the Forces of Poland are ready to obey his Majesty's Orders; and the Ministers of *Moscow* and *Brandenburg* continue to assure his Majesty, that the Forces of the Princes their Masters will march, whenever he desires it, the first to *Lithuania*, and the last to *Prussia*.

Warsaw, Oct. 8. We have an account from *Cracow*, that the Dyer is ended there; but are to meet again here within 6 weeks; Before they separated they resolved that the King should call together the *Polopite*, that is, all the Gentry of the Kingdom, whenever he thinks the same necessary for the defence of himself and the Publick; The Saxon Forces that lay near *Cracow* are moving this way; but 'tis not yet certainly known, whether His Majesty will not first go to the Army which lies near *Lemberg*, before he comes hither. The Primate, with the Prince of *Lubomirski*, continue at *Lowitz*, having rejected the Offers made to them by the Kings Order, for a Meeting to accommodate Matters; They have with them at present about 1000 Men in Arms; and those of their Party are drawing

drawing together in Lithuania under the command of Prince of Conti, in Upper Silesia under the Sieur Princes, and in Poland under the Sieur de Saxe; and the latter, if they find themselves strong enough, will receive the Prince of Conti, and conduct him to Lublinburg.

Brussels, Oct. 15. The Squadron commanded by Du Bart's Squadron Road, the Prince of Conti comes frequently ashore, but always returns on board at night; and he is said to have written to the Cardinal of Poland, that he will go with him to the Monastery of Otrava, being a great number of them retired, some say they are retired of name, and others, that they are gone to join the Cardinal's Regiment of their Party, who are now drawing together to form to the Summs lately sent out by the Emperor, a few days more may let us know their strength, and according to that, the Prince of Conti will probably take either the Resolution, 'Twasdaying a War Rel belonging to the City, or living in our Road, the Sieur Du Bart required her to strike, which the Danzicker refused, and the French were therefore going to fire at her, but the Prince of Conti would not suffer it; However Du Bart demands Satisfaction of the Master of the said Vessel for this Affront. Our Magistrates continue to raise Men.

Vienna, Oct. 12. The Imperial Army in Hungary separated the 4th of this month; General Rabinus with several Regiments marched to Transylvania; The Saxons are ordered to Poland; and the rest of the Forces, the Queen's and English, except a Body of 4000 Horse, and 2500 Dragoons and Musketeers, who with 12 Pieces of Cannon and 2 Mortars, are to make an Incursion into the Country of Bohemia; They began their march on the 5th from the Imperial Camp at Santaua, and are to be joined by Detachments from our Gallions on the Save; Their Rendezvous is to be at Trod; and Prince Eugene with several of the General's Officers, intend to go thither to view the Troops, designed for this Expedition; At the same time General Rabinus is to attack the Enemy on the side of Temeswar, and considering the present contention the Turks are in, we cannot reasonably hope this design will have very good success. This is confirmed by the last Advices from the frontiers, that the Grand Signior is retired towards Adrianople.

Cologne, Oct. 22. The Armies on the Upper-Rhine are separated, and marched to Quarters; Two Bavarian Regiments of Horse, and two of Dragoons, with a Regiment of Carabines, who came from Flanders, are called by this place in their march towards Bavaria.

Breslaw, Oct. 22. The Hessian Troops which return from the Rhine, are to be Quartered in the Duchy of Brezlaw; and the Duke of Hesse-Gottorp. They write from Breslaw, that the Saxon Forces, quartered there, would on the 20th begin their march towards Poland.

Paris, Oct. 21. Preparations are making here for Proclaiming the Peace; and on this occasion there will be very fine Fireworks. Several of the General Officers are come from Flanders; and the Troops of the Household begin to arrive; The King has declared, that he will ease the People of several Taxes; His said Orders are given for Disbanding 20 Men out of each Company of Foot, and 10 out of each Troop of Horse. The Duke of Burgundy is recovered; His Marriage with the Princess of Savoy is intended to be celebrated on the 8th of December; They are much concerned here for the success of the Prince of Conti's Affairs, who according to the last Letters from him, was still on board of Du Bart's Squadron, expecting the Gentlemen of Poland, who the Primate had promised would come in a great Body to receive him; 'Tis said a further Supply of 2000 Millions of Livres has been lately remitted for his use. The Marquis de Nesmond, who arrived at Brussel on the 7th Instant with his Squadron, is expected here in few days; The Sieur de Mignon is likewise returned to Rochelle with the Ships under his command, having got nothing by their Voyage.

Brussels, Oct. 23. Yesterday morning arrived here an Express from Madrid, with the King of Spain's Ratification of the Peace, which was immediately sent forward to Holland; and to soon as 'tis exchanged, the French will begin to execute the Peace they are to give up by the Treaty. The Forces of Hanover, who have served in Flanders, passed the Canal at Ostend two days ago, in order to their march home. The English Forces march towards Flanders. The French have already disbanded 10 Men out of every Company, and intend a greater Reform.

Dresden, Oct. 24. The King came hither yesterday from Loo, and His Majesty intends to stay here 2 or 3 days. The Earl of Portland took his Leave of His Majesty in the morning, and returned to the Hague. The Prince of Anhalt is come hither to wait on His Majesty. The Elector of Brandenburg went from Loo the 22th, in his return to Brussels; but the Prince de Vaudemont attended His Majesty to this place.

Hague, Oct. 25. N. S. Yesterday the Spanish Ambassadors exchanged their Ratifications with the French. The Imperial and French Ambassadors have agreed the Article

about Lorraine, and all that remains to be Adjusted is the Point concerning the Pretensions of the Hungarians of Otrava. On the 22th the Ambassadors of the Pope returned to the English Ambassadors with great Expressions of Respect and Veneration for His Majesty, and came to continue the ancient Amity and good Correspondence that has been between the Two Crowns and their Subjects. The Earl of Sandwich went hence this morning early to wait on the King at Loo, and to proceed on his Embassy to Venice. Major General Earl, with some other English Officers, having hired a Vessel to carry them to England, were on the 12th Instant taken by a Danish Privateer, and having Reasoned themselves for 40000 returned to Helsingborg; The French Ambassadors upon notice of it, wrote to the Governor of Dunkirk, to treat the two Officers which were detained by the said Privateer as Hostages for payment of the said Sum, being taken after the expiration of the Term for ceasing Hostilities in these Seas. The States have appointed a General Thanksgiving for the Peace on the 6th of November, and Fireworks are preparing here. The Earl of Portland arrived this morning from Loo. His Majesty is expected here on Tuesday next.

Whitehall, Oct. 20. The Right Honourable the Earl of Portland arrived here last night from Hound.
