

which are substantial having regard to the consumption of those articles for the time being in the United Kingdom and that there is no reasonable probability that those articles will within a reasonable period be made in His Majesty's Dominions in such substantial quantities:

Now therefore we, being two of the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury in pursuance of the powers conferred on us by the said Section 10 of the Finance Act, 1926, and of all other powers enabling us in that behalf hereby order as follows:

1. Such of the articles mentioned in the Schedule to this Order as are not entered under the Customs Acts before the 28th day of November, 1927, or which have not been removed from a bonded warehouse before that date, shall be exempt from the duty imposed by Section one of the Safeguarding of Industries Act, 1921, as amended by the Finance Act, 1926, for a period ending on the 31st day of December, 1928.

2. This Order may be cited as the Safeguarding of Industries (Exemption) No. 5 Order, 1927.

STURBRIDGE FAIR.

Whereas on the 4th October, 1927, a representation was made to the Secretary of State for the Home Department by the Cambridge Town Council to the effect that it would be for the convenience and advantage of the public that the Fair held annually at Sturbridge, Cambridge, in the county of Cambridge, which by Letters Patent dated the 15th August, 1589, is to commence on the Feast of St. Bartholomew (i.e. the 24th August) and last continuously until the 14th day next after the Feast to the Exaltation of the Holy Cross (i.e. the 14th September), should in future be restricted to the three days on which such Fair is now held, viz.:—the 25th, 26th and 27th days of September in each year:

And whereas notice of the said representation and of the time when the same would be taken into consideration has been duly published in pursuance of "The Fairs Act, 1873":

And whereas on such representation and consideration it appears to me that it would be for the convenience and advantage of the public that the said Fair should in future be held on the 25th, 26th and 27th days of September in each year:

Now therefore I, as Secretary of State for the Home Department, in exercise of the powers vested in me by "The Fairs Act, 1873," do hereby order that the Fair held annually at Sturbridge, Cambridge, in the county of Cambridge, which by Letters Patent dated the 15th August, 1589, is to commence on the Feast of St. Bartholomew (i.e. the 24th August) and last continuously until the 14th day next after the Feast to the Exaltation of the Holy Cross (i.e. the 14th September), shall in future be restricted to the three days on which such Fair is now held, viz.:—the 25th, 26th and 27th days of September in each year.
