And whereas by two Orders in Council both made the 22nd July, 1920, further provision was made with respect to the appointment, tenure of office, powers and duties of His Majesty's Civil Service Commissioners:

And whereas the said Sir Stanley Mordaunt Leathes, K.C.B., will retire from his office as such Commissioner as aforesaid on the 31st December, 1927:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, doth order, and it is hereby ordered, that, as from the 1st day of January, 1928, Roderick Sinclair Meiklejohn, Esquire, C.B., and the said David Beveridge Mair, Esquire, and Lawrence Cary Hampton Weekes, Esquire, shall, subject to the provisions of the said recited Orders, be His Majesty's Civil Service Commissioners for the purposes of and with the powers mentioned in the said Orders; the said Roderick Sinclair Meiklejohn, Esquire, C.B., being First Commissioner, and the said David Beveridge Mair, Esquire, and Lawrence Cary Hampton Weekes, Esquire, being Assistant Commissioners, holding also the offices, respectively, of Director of Examinations and Secretary to the Civil Service Commission.

WHEREAS His Majesty was pleased, in exercise of the powers in that behalf conferred on Him by the Medical Act, 1886, and the Medical Act (1886) Amendment Act, 1905, by Order in Council dated the 12th day of August, 1915, to order and declare that the Province of Ontario in the Dominion of Canada should be deemed, from the date of the said Order, a separate British Possession, and that the Second Part of the Medical Act, 1886, should be deemed, as from the date of the said Order, to apply to the said Province of Ontario:

And whereas the Province of Ontario will not afford after the 31st day of December, 1927, to Registered Medical Practitioners of

the United Kingdom such privileges of practising in the said Province as to His Majesty seem just:

Now, therefore, His Majesty doth hereby, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, order that the said Order in Council of the 12th day of August, 1915, be, and the same is hereby revoked, as from the 31st day of December next, without prejudice nevertheless to the right of any persons whose names have been already entered on the Register.

WHEREAS the Right Reverend Ernest, Lord Bishop of Worcester, has, under Section 26 of the Pluralities Act, 1838, made a Representation to the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Randall Thomas, Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, in the following terms:—

"We, Ernest, Lord Bishop of Worcester, in pursuance of the twenty-sixth section of the Pluralities Act, 1838, do hereby represent to Your Grace as follows:—

"There is in the County and Diocese of Worcester the Vicarage or Benefice of Broom the Parish whereof contains a population of three hundred and ten or thereabouts with accommodation in the Parish Church for one hundred persons.

"The net annual value of the said Benefice of Broom is Three hundred pounds or thereabouts.

"There is also in the same County and Diocese the Vicarage or Benefice of Clent the Parish whereof contains a population of one thousand two hundred and seventy four or thereabouts with accommodation in the Parish Church for three hundred and fifty persons.

"The net annual value of the said Benefice of Clent is Three hundred and eighty pounds or thereabouts.

"There is also in the same County and Diocese the Rectory or Benefice of Churchill with Blakedown the Parish whereof contains a population of seven hundred and sixty six or thereabouts with accommodation in the Church at Churchill for one hundred and fifty persons and in that of Blakedown for one hundred and twenty persons.

"The net annual value of the said Benefice of Churchill with Blakedown is Three hundred and eighty five pounds or thereabouts.

"That it appears to us and we do hereby represent to Your Grace that under the provisions of the said Pluralities Act, 1838, the several portions of the Parishes of Clent and Churchill with Blakedown may be advantageously separated therefrom and be annexed to the Parish of Broom to which they are all contiguous. The boundaries of such several portions are more particularly described in the hereinafter mentioned Scheme appended to this Representation and are thereon respectively verged green and blue on the plan
