

# The London Gazette.

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Malaga, October 1. N. S.

**T**HE 28th of the last month arrived here the *King-William* Galley from *Cadiz*, the *Upton* Galley from the *Downes*, and the *Concord* from *Plimouth*, all bound to this place; The same day came in the *Bridget*, the *Hope*, the *Industry*, the *John*, and the *William* and *John* likewise from *Plimouth*; and the *Mary-Rose* Galley bound home from *Legborne*.

*Lisbonne*, October 15. The King of *Portugal* has appointed the Cortes or States of this Kingdom to meet here the next month. The Ship *Haniball*, which some of her Men run away with, being arrived here from *Brazille*, is restored to the Owners, by Order from this Court.

*Madrid*, October 16 The King and Queen of *Spain* went the last week in solemn manner to the Chapel of *Nuestra Senora de Atcha*, where *Te Deum* was Sung for the Conclusion of the Peace, and that night and the two following here were Illuminations, with Fireworks and other Rejoyceings; To morrow their Majesties intend to go to *Alcala*, the 18th to *Aranjuez*, and the 19th to *Toledo*, at which last place they will make a stay of 7 or 8 days, and be Entertained with a Bull Feast; The 27th their Majesties will return hither, and the 28th, being the Queen's Birth Day, there will be a Comedy at Court, and on the 29th a Royal Bull Feast in the *Placa-Mayor* of *Madrid*. The *Norton* Galley arrived at *Cadiz* the 29th past, in 3 weeks from *Newfoundland*.

*Corke*, October 19. Yesterday came in here a Merchant Ship called the *Charles* of *London* from *Virginia*, who left the Squadron commanded by Capt. *Dilkes* in the Latitude of 48.

*Dublin*, October 24. Yesterday being the Anniversary for our Deliverance from the Irish Rebellion in 1641, was observed here with the usual Solemnity; The Lords-

Justices went to *Christchurch* in the morning, attended by the Nobility, Privy-Councillors, and Chief Officers Civil and Military, who afterwards Dined at the Castle; The great Guns were discharged, and the Evening ended with Bonfires.

*Falmouth*, October 25. Yesterday arrived here the *Spanish-Expedition* in 6 days from *Corunna*. The same day went out two Dutch Privateers, bound home with two Prizes they took some time ago.

*Plimouth*, October 26. The *Mary* Galley, Capt. *Cleasby* Commander, and the *Lyme* and *Hunter* Fireship, came in here this day, being part of the *Newfoundland* Squadron, commanded by Capt. *Norris*, from whom they were separated the 13th Instant in the Lat. of 48, near the outward Bank of *Newfoundland*; These 3 Ships came in separately, not having seen one another since they parted in the Storm, till this day: The rest of the Squadron are hourly expected. The *Crown*, *Portland*, and *Bonadventure*, went from *Newfoundland* to the Coasts of *Spain* and *Portugal*.

*Cowes*, October 28. The *Deptsford*, and the rest of the Ships bound to *New-England*, continue in this Road, by reason of the contrary Winds.

*Portsmouth*, October 28. The 26th Instant arrived at *Spithead* from the *West-Indies*, but last from *Virginia*, His Majesty's Ships the *Cambridge*, *Blackwall*, *Warwick* and *Ruby*, having been separated from the rest of the Squadron under the Command of Capt. *Dilkes* in bad Weather. This day Vice-Admiral *Mitchell* came to an Anchor at *Spithead* with a Squadron of His Majesty's Ships under his Command, and 15 Dutch homeward-bound *East-India* Ships, whom he met the 17th Instant in his Cruise to the Westward; The said *East-India* Ships had lost most of their Cables and Anchors at the Cape of *Good-Hope*, and wanted Provisions, which occasioned their putting in here.

*Portsmouth*, October 30. His Majesty's Ship the *Guernsey* arrived yesterday at *St. Helens*, who came from *Newfoundland* with the Squadron commanded by Capt. *Norris*, on the 8th Instant, but 3 days after was separated from them in a Storm. They had finished the Fortifications at *St. John's* before they came away, and left there several Companies of Soldiers under the command of the Major of Colonel *Gibson's* Regiment.

*Deale*, October 29. Captain *Warren*, in His Majesty's Ship the *Windsor*, with the rest of the English Men of War and Merchant Ships from *Cadiz*, are come into the

*Downes*.

*Woodstock, Oct. 26.* This day the Peace was proclaimed here by the Mayor, Aldermen, and Common-Council, being accompanied by the Neighbouring Gentlemen; after the Ceremony was performed Mr. Mayor Entertained the Company and the Country that came in, and the Evening was spent with Bonfires, Illuminations, and other Demonstrations of the Corporation's Loyalty and good Affection to His Majesty and His Government.

*Canterbury, Oct. 23.* This day the Peace was proclaimed here; first at the Guildhall, the Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen, Sheriff, and Common-Council-men being present in their Formalities, together with the Officers of the Militia, and other Gentlemen of the City, attended by the Constables, Sergeants of the Mace, and other City Officers, and afterwards at the Market-Place, and other usual places of the City, with Sound of Trumpets, Drums, and several Volleys; After which the Company returned to the Guildhall, where they were entertained by the Corporation. The night concluded with Bonfires, Illuminations, Fireworks, Ringing of Bells, and other public Demonstrations of Joy.

*Hereford, October 26.* Yesterday the Peace was proclaimed in this City: The Ceremony begun about Two in the Afternoon; All the City Companies, with their Drums and Streamers, marched in the Front, followed by the Trumpets, and then the Mayor, with about 400 Gentlemen on Horseback: The Coroner of the City read the Proclamation at the High-Cross and two other places; and being returned to the Tolsey, the Mayor gave the Gentry an Entertainment, and afterwards went with them to a great Bonfire at the High-Cross; The Troops quartered here gave several Volleys of small-Shot, which were answered by the discharge of all the Cannon from the Castle; and the Night ended with Bonfires, Fireworks, Illuminations, and other Marks of Joy, and great Demonstrations of Zeal and Loyalty.

*Colchester, Oct. 28.* Yesterday the Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen, Assistants, and Common-Council in their Formalities, accompanied with several Deputy-Lieutenants of the County, and other Gentlemen, proclaimed the Peace before the Town-Hill and Dutch Bay Hall, being attended with Trumpets, Drums, and Town Musick, and were afterwards Entertained by the Mayor at the Town-Hall suitable to the Occasion, as were also several Hundreds of the Inhabitants at Publick-Houses: The day concluded with Bells Ringing, Bonfires, Fireworks, and Illuminations, with all other Demonstrations of Joy.

*Newport in the Isle of Wight, October 29.* Last night the Lord *Carr*, our Governor, arrived here, and this morning the Mayor and Aldermen were in their Formalities to Compliment him, and the Corporation of *Newtown* have chosen him their Mayor for the ensuing year.

*London, Oct. 29.* This day Sir *Humphry Edwin*, Elected Lord Mayor of this City for the year ensuing, went to *Westminster*, accompanied by the late Lord Mayor, Mr. Recorder, Aldermen, She-

riffs, and the several Companies in their Barges, and according to Custom was Sworn before the Barons of the Exchequer, and then returned in the usual manner to *Skimmers-Hall*, where a Noble Entertainment was provided, at which were the Lords of His Majesty's Privy-Council, the Judges, and other Persons of Quality.
