"And whereas the said grant of the said yearly sum of £200 will, after the publication in the London Gazette of an Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme, be made and secured by an Instrument to be executed by us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, under our Common Seal, in accordance with the provisions of the Act of the 29th and 30th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 111:

"And whereas a plot of land situate within the said proposed separate District has been conveyed to us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, as the site for a permanent Church for such District and there has been contributed and paid to the credit of our account at the Bank of England a sum of £1,500 towards the cost of erecting such permanent

Church:

"And whereas the said plot of land has been conveyed and the said sum of £1,500 has been contributed as aforesaid upon the understanding and condition that (such arrangement appearing to us to be expedient) the whole right of Patronage of the said proposed District, and, when such District shall have become a New Parish, then of the said New Parish, and the nomination of the Minister or Incumbent thereof should be assigned in the manner which is hereinafter set forth:

"And whereas the contributors of the purchase money for the said plot of land and of the said sum of £1,500 have nominated to us the Bishop of Chelmsford for the time being as the person to whom they desire that the whole right of Patronage of the said proposed District or New Parish shall be assigned:

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Guy, now Bishop of Chelmsford (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this Scheme), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly recommend and propose that all those portions of the said New Parish of the Trinity, Barkingside, and of the said Parish of Great IIford, which are described in the Schedule hereunder written, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof are delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto annexed, shall, upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme, become and be constituted a separate District for spiritual purposes and that the same shall be named The District of Saint George, Barkingside.'

"And we further recommend and propose that the whole right of Patronage of the said District so recommended to be constituted and, when such District shall have become a New Parish as aforesaid, then of such New Parish and of the nomination of an Incumbent thereof shall without any assurance in the law other than this Scheme and any duly gazetted Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying the same and upon and from the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette as aforesaid, be assigned to and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said Guy, Bishop of Chelmsford, and his successors for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of any of them, or of any other Act of Parliament.

- "THE SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.
- "The District of Saint George, Barkingside, comprising:—

"I. All that portion of the New Parish (sometime District Chapelry) of the Trinity, Barkingside, in the County of Essex and in the Diocese of Chelmsford, which is bounded upon the south east by the Parish of Great Ilford, upon the south by the New Parish of Saint Andrew, Great Ilford, upon the west partly by the Parish of Wanstead and partly by the New Parish of the Holy Trinity, Hermon Hill, Wanstead, all in the said County and Diocese, upon the north west by the last named New Parish, and upon the remaining side, that is to say, upon the north east, by an imaginary line commencing at the point where the boundary which divides the said New Parish of the Holy Trinity, Hermon Hill, Wanstead, from the said New Parish of the Trinity, Barkingside, crosses the middle of Woodford Avenue, and extending thence south eastward along the middle of Woodford Avenue for a distance of 37 chains or thereabouts to its junction with Clayhall Lane, and extending thence north eastward along the middle of Clayhall Lane for a distance of 14 chains or thereabouts to a point opposite to the middle of the roadway leading past the south western side of the house and premises known as Clayhall, and extending thence south eastward to and along the middle of such roadway for a distance of 81 chains or thereabouts to its southern end, and continuing thence in precisely the same direction and in a straight line for a distance of 17½ chains or thereabouts to a point in the middle of the road leading to the house and premises known as Hedgemans, and extending thence north eastward along the middle of the last mentioned road for a distance of 10 chains or thereabouts to a point opposite to the middle of the footpath leading past the south western side of the last mentioned house and premises, and extending thence south eastward to and along the middle of the said footpath for a distance of 61 chains or thereabouts to the point where such footpath diverges north eastward, and extending thence south eastward and in a straight line for a distance of 211 chains or thereabouts to a point in the middle of the northern end of the passage running between the houses and premises known as Numbers 84 and 86, Gantshill Crescent, and extending thence southward along the middle of the said passage for a distance of 2 chains or thereabouts to a point on the northern side of Gantshill Crescent, and extending thence first southward to and then along the middle of Gantshill eastward Crescent for a distance of 1 chain or thereabouts to its junction with Waremead Road, and extending thence south eastward along the middle of Waremead Road for a distance of 13 chains or thereabouts to its junction with Cranbrook Road, and extending thence north eastward along the middle of Cranbrook Road for a distance of 31 chains or thereabouts to its junction with the road called Glenham Drive, and extending thence south eastward along the middle of Glenham Drive for a dis-
