Messina, September 30. N. S.

Vesterday arrived in this Port the Popes Galleys from the Levant, having left the Squadron of Malta near Cape Spartel two days ago, making the best of their way home; They parted from the Venetian Fleet near the Island Andrea, there being no prospect of further Action with the Enemies Fleet, which was retired to Scio.

Rome, Off. 19. The Cardinal de Bonillon having received an Express from the Court of France, desired an Audience the last week, and went to it with great Ceremony, to acquaint the Pope with the Conclusion of the Peace. The Emperor's Ambassador having communicated to this Court the happy News of the Defeat of the Turks in Hungary, here have been very great Rejoycings on this occasion. The Minister residing here from Milan has not yet been able to obtain a Letter from the Pope in answer to that he presented to him some time ago from the King his Master; and Cardinal Spada, the Popes Chief Minister, and Cardinal Barberino, Protector of the Affairs of Poland, observe the same precaution, being resolved not to engage themselves in the Dispute concerning that Crown, and therefore forbear writing to either side till it be determined. The Popes Galleys are returning home from the Levant.

Milan, Off. 24. The last Letters from Milan inform us, that the Marquis de Legarez, their Governor, had sent a Regiment of Foot to reinforce the Garrison of Fins; and that he was preparing to leave that Government, and return to Spain.

Leyborne, Off. 21. The Panther, Capt. William Mair, departed out of this Road the 10th Instant for England; and about the same time the Peace Ship sailed for Scanderoon. The 16th came in a French Frigat called the Neptune, who sailed again the next day with a Merchant Ship bound to Tunis. The Ame Galley, Capt. Cremer, will sail this Evening for Scanderoon. The Beske Galley is arrived at Porto-Fino.

Venice, Off. 26. The Forces that were detached from the Imperial Army in Hungary, to make an Incursion into the Country of Baffina, arrived at Brod the 10th of this month, and encamped along the Save; Prince Eugene of Savoy came there the same day, and took a Review of them; The 11th they began to pass the River, and on the 12th all the Troops were gone over with the Artillery; The 13th they marched into the Enemies Country, dividing themselves in 3 Bodies, yet keeping so near as that they might easily join together upon occasion; They intended to march directly to Bagnaluc, and to possess themselves of some places of Strength, which may

enable them to establish Winter Quarters in those parts, and to give protection to the Christians that shall be desirous to free themselves from the Turkish Government; We are now expecting an account of the Success of this Expedition, which seems to be very well tim'd, because of the great disorder the Turks are in all along their Frontiers, since their late defeat, which was so great, that they are every day more and more sensible of it; At the same time the Imperialists are fortifying several Posts on the side of the River Tisza, which will be of great use to secure that Frontier against the Enemies Incursions during the Winter. The Saxon Forces march to Poland with all possible diligence, as do likewise the 3 Regiments of Dragoons which the Emperor sends to the King of Poland's assistance, and so soon as they arrive there, 'tis believed the King will remove from Cracow to Warsaw.

Frankfort, Nov. 3. The Imperial Regiments of Horse, that have served on the Rhine, are all ordered to Bohemia, and will begin their march in few days, being to Winter in that Country, that they may be the nearer, to serve against the Turks the next Summer. The States of the Circle of Suabia assembled at Ulm the 22th of the last month, and Prince Lewis of Baden writ a Letter to them, wherein he represented the usefulness of maintaining the Lines, made for security of the Frontiers, and of keeping Troops to guard the several Posts, even in time of Peace; Which 'tis believed will be resolved on.

Cologne, Nov. 5. N. S. The Munster Forces which came from the Meuse, and lay quartered for several days in the Villages near this City, marched the last week to Keiferwaert, and passed the Rhine there in their return homeward; The Troops of Brandenburgh have likewise passed the Rhine at Wesel; 'Tis said part of these are to march to Prussia, to reinforce his Electoral Highnesses Troops in that Country, and to be at hand, to assist the King of Poland, if there be occasion.

Edinburgh. Off. 27. An Express having arrived here with a Letter from His Majesty to the Privy Council, requiring them to publish the Peace made betwixt His Majesty and the French King, the Council did therupon meet yesterday, and signed a Proclamation for that end, which was this day proclaimed at the Mercat Cross by His Majesty's Heralds and Pursevants, the Provost and Magistrates attending in their Gowns and other Formalities upon a Theaster erected for that purpose; after which was Ringing of Bells, and Illuminations thorough the whole City and Suburbs, with other Demonstrations of Joy.

Lymington, Off. 23. This day the Mayor and Burgesses of this Corporation met together at the Town Hall, accompanied with divers Gentlemen,

of the adjacent parts, from whence they went to the Market-place, where was a great confluence of People of the Country round about, and there proclaimed the Peace; after which was an Entertainment in the Town Hall, with Bonfires, Colours flying, Drums Beating, Ringing of Bells, firing of several Pieces of Cannon, and extraordinary Illuminations over the whole Town.

Ripon, Oct. 29. Yesterday being Market-day, the Mayor and Corporation, with a great appearance of Gentlemen, went in their Formalities to Church, and after Prayers, walk'd in great Order to the Market Cross, where the Peace was proclaimed, the Company Dined with the Mayor, and the Evening was concluded with Bonfires, Illuminations, and other Demonstrations of Joy.

Durham, Oct. 30. This day the Peace was proclaimed here at the Market Cross and Toll-Booth by Mr. Mayor, Mr. Recorder, and the Aldermen, with their Officers in their Formalities, accompanied by the Justices of the Peace and Gentry in and about the City, and by the Wardens and Companies of Trades with their Banners, and the Bayliffs, with Trumpets and Drums, after which the Mayor Entertained the Company at the Toll-booth, and at night there were Bonfires, Illuminations, Ringing of Bells, and other Expressions of a general Satisfaction.

Coventry, Nov. 1. This day the Mayor and Mayor Ele^t, Aldermen, Sheriffs, and Council-House-Men in their Scarlet, the Masters and Members of the Twelve Companies in their Formalities, and the Gentlemen in and about this City, met at St. Mary's Hall, and from thence proceeded in Order (the several Streamers, Drums, Trumpets, and City Waytes going before them) to the Cross, where the Mayor proclaimed the Peace in the presence of a numerous concourse of People, who with loud and repeated Acclamations express'd great Zeal and Affection to His Majesty; and the Evening concluded with an Entertainment at the Mayor's, Bonfires, Illuminations, and other Demonstrations of Joy suitable to such an Occasion.

Deals, Nov. 4. Yesterday in the afternoon came into the Downs His Majesty's Ships the Woolwich, Experiment, and Seringes, with the Transport Ships from Ossend, having on board 4 Battalions of His Majesty's Guards; and this morning they sailed again for the River. Yesterday arrived likewise in the Downs Capt. Norris with the Squadron of His Majesty's Ships from Newfoundland, having left 300 Soldiers at St. John's, where the Fortifications were near finished when they came away.

Whitehall, Nov. 5. His Majesty's Birth-Day was celebrated the 4th Instant in the Cities of London and Westminster with such Zeal, as shewed the great Affection and Loyalty of the Inhabitants to His Majesty's Sacred Person and Government; and the Anniversary of the Gun-powder Plot was observed this day with the usual Solemnity.

The Four Battalions of His Majesty's Guards are arrived in the River.

The Mail from Holland of Tuesday last is not yet come in.

His Majesty having Ordered the Two Dutch Regiments of Horse here in England, viz. Col. Rheiterens and Comte de Scimbecks, to be forthwith sent to Holland, the Lords-Justices have directed, that publick notice be given thereto, that all Persons who have any Claim upon the said Regiments, or either of them, for any Debts in Quarters, or upon a Regimental Account, may forthwith bring in the Particulars thereof to Mr. Vanderlach, Pay-mister to the Dutch Forces, at his Office at the Cockpit in Whitehall,

that care may be taken in adjusting the Accoupts of the said Regiments for satisfying the same.
