Persons holding situations in the Civil Service must obtain the permission of the authorities of their Department to attend the examination before the commencement of the competition.

Persons upon whose training for the occupation of teacher public money has been spent cannot be appointed until the consent of the appropriate education authority has been notified to the Civil Service Commissioners.

Candidates must obtain such an aggregate number of marks in the examination as a whole as may indicate, in the judgment of the Civil Service Commissioners, a competent amount of general proficiency.

7. Application for permission to attend an examination must be made in the writing of the candidate, at such times and in such manner as may be fixed by the Commissioners.

8. A fee of £6 will be required from each candidate attending an examination.

The Commissioners further give notice that an Open Competitive Examination will be held in London under the foregoing Regulations, commencing on the 4th September, 1928.

Not fewer than 6 candidates will be appointed on the result of this Examination, if so many should be found to be duly qualified.

No person will be admitted to Examination from whom the Secretary of the Civil Service Commission has not received, on or before the 12th July, an application, in the Candidate's own handwriting, on a prescribed form, which may be obtained from the Secretary at once.

ORDER OF THE MINISTER OF AGRICULTURE AND FISHERIES.

FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE (INFECTED AREAS) ORDER OF 1928 (No. 52).

The Minister of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in him under the Diseases of Animals Acts,

1894 to 1927, and of every other power enabling him in this behalf, hereby orders as follows:—

Declaration of Foot-and-Mouth Disease Infected Area.

1. The Area described in the Schedule to this Order is hereby declared to be a Foot-and-Mouth Disease Infected Area for the purposes of the Foot-and-Mouth Disease (Infected Areas Restrictions) Order of 1925.

Short Title.

2. This Order may be cited as the FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE (INFECTED AREAS) ORDER OF 1928 (No. 52) and shall be read with the Order referred to in Article 1.

In witness whereof the Official Seal of the Minister of Agriculture and Fisheries is hereunto affixed this ninth day of May, nineteen hundred and twenty-eight.

SCHEDULE.

An Area comprising:—

In the county of Stafford.

The city and county borough of Stoke-on-Trent;

The county boroughs of Walsall and Wolverhampton;

The boroughs of Newcastle-under-Lyme, Stafford, and Lichfield;

The petty sessional divisions of Cheadle (including its detached part), Stone, Eccleshall, Stafford (including its detached part), Uttoxeter (including its detached part, but excluding the parishes of Stanton, Okesover and Mayfield), Burton upon Trent (except the parishes of Rolleston but not excluding its detached part, Stretton, Outwoods, and Brans-ton), Rugeley (including its detached part), Penkridge, Lichfield and Brownhills (except the parishes of Whittington, Fisherwick, Freeford, Swinfen and Packington, and Weeford), Rushall (except the parish of Great Barr) and Wolverhampton (except the parishes of Willenhall, Tettenhall, Wrottesley, but not excluding its detached part, Patshull, Pattingham, Lower Penn, Upper Penn, Wombourn, Trysull and Seisdon and Swindon); and the parishes of Ipstones, Cheddleton, Caverswall, Bagnall, Norton in the Moors, Wolstanton, Chesterton, Silverdale, Keele, Clayton, Trentham, Whitmore, Madeley, Chapel and Hill Chorlton (including its detached part), and Maer; such part of the parish of Muckleston as lies to the north and west of the following boundary, namely:— Commencing at a point where the River Tern leaves the county boundary near Bearstone Mill Dam, thence eastwards along that river to the point where it crosses the county boundary at Dorrington Bogs; and such part of the parish of Tyrley as lies to the west of the Shropshire Union Canal from the point where it crosses the county boundary at "The Butts" to the point where it crosses the county boundary near the Gravel Pit.
