Tarmouth, January 22.

Yesterday went out of this Road 12 sail of Merchant ships intended for Lynn and Boston. A Vessel newly arriving from Diepe, sent some of her men on shoat; but upon information given to the Magistrate, they were again commanded aboard: where they are to continue their Quarantine.

This Morning sailed out of this Road four ships more designed for Lynn Mart, and this Afternoon passed by several ships to the Northwards. Here is now at Anchor in this Road a Pink of this place bound for Antego, and may sail with the first fair wind.

Chester, Jan. 23. The John of London bound hence for Legorn, is still detained in this Port by contrary winds. The Resolution of Everpoole, a Vessel of 70 Tuns, was about a fortnight since lost on the Coast of Ireland, and only two of her men saved; the Margaret of Meston cast away at the Skerries 10 miles to the North of Dublin, the men saved; and at the same time a Bristol ship perished in the Bay of Dublin.

Deal, Jan. 23. This last Night began a storm, which still continues with much violence; and has brought into the Beach, and discovered several Goods to a considerable value: which are supposed to be the remainders of former wrecks upon the Goodwin.

Lisbonne, Jan. 8. The First instant arrived here a Courier from Savoye with advice from Rome that the Pope had at the last past over all difficulties which were brought to obstruct the Confirmation of the Prince Don Pedro's Marriage, so that all things are there ended to the satisfaction of this Court.

The Count d'Essee bound from Rochelle with 6 ships for the West Indies, after many hazards at sea, by reason of much ill weather was forced into this Port with three of his company only, and those somewhat endamaged; the 24th past, they put out again to sea, intending for the Maderas: the place appointed for their Rendezvous, where he hoped to hear news of the rest of his company, aboard him was Monsieur de Basse, designed to command the French forces in their American Plantations.

The 6th instant, the Princess was safely delivered of a Daughter, to the great joy of this Court, and Monsieur Verjus immediately dispatched with the news of it into England, and a Courier to Madrid, with a considerable return of Moneys to our Ambassador in that Court, to be expended in his publick demonstration of joy upon this occasion.

The Baron de Battaville, Ambassador from the Court of Spain, has not yet appeared publicly, nor has Monsieur de St. Romain yet fitted up his Equipage for his appearance under the same Character from His most Christian Majesty. The safe arrival of the Brasill Fleet has much encouraged the Trade of this City, four of the said Fleet, divided from the rest, were forced to put into the Algarvez, but a Convoy is sent to conduct them hither, the whole number of that Fleet being 63 ships, whereof three only English ships upon English accounts.

Danish, Jan. 12. From Warsaw we are told, that the Cossacks had sent thither two of their Deputies with Letters to the States of the Kingdom, expressing their Concernments in the affairs of Poland, and their desires to be admitted to give their Suffrages in the Election of a Successor; and wishal moving, that the Old King be again read-

mitted and new chosen; or the Moscovite to succeed in his room. There was also arrived an Envoye from Sultan Galla the Cham of Tartary, with as much zeal opposing the interest of the Moscovite; in his Audience from the Archbishop of Gnesne he seemed to boast much of the late success of his Master in Ukraina, where with an Army of an hundred thousand men, he had defeated the Moscovites, and killed about 20 thousand of them. There is also arrived a Chiaus from the Ottoman Port, but as yet he had not declared his Message; but intended after some few dayes stay to depart thence for Swedeland.

The Plague is said to be lately broken out about Cracovia, Bromberg, Grauduniz, and other places in Great Poland; which 'tis feared may put some stop to the Election.

Genova, Jan. 16. The 8th instant in the Afternoon arrived before this place Sir Thomas Allen with his Squadron of English Men of War from Legorne, and the 10th at Night sailed hence again for Algier.

On Thursday the 10th instant in the Evening arrived here the Prince and Princess of Monaco, with a Train of about 70 Persons their Attendants, upon a Gally belonging to this Republick, appointed to attend them at Ponte Reale; they landed and were there received and complemented by a great number of the Nobility and Ladies of this City: who thence attended them to their Lodgings prepared for their Reception in the Pallace of Signior Gio. Giacomo Grimadto, where they were complemented by four Gentlemen from the Senate. They intend to continue here till the end of the Carneval.

The Bristol a Man of War left here by Sir Thomas Allen, intends this day to put to Sea, the Montague is daily expected from Palermo, the Ruby is now entering from Legorn, and we shortly expect the return of the Leopard from Smirna.

From Milan we are told, that since the decease of the Marquis de Mortara, the Privy Council having not discovered the King of Spains intentions for the future disposal of the Government, have themselves undertaken it, till farther Orders from the Court of Spain; and are attended by the ordinary German Guard of Halberds. The deceased Governours Body being embalmed, was with much funeral Solemnity deposited in the Church of Santa Maria della Pace, till provision can be made for its transportation into Spain; where it is to be buried with his Ancestors in the Church of Merida in Andalusia.

He has left his Executors by his Will Don Vincenzo Gonzaga, the Count Galeazzo Torri Camp Master-General, the Governour of the Castle, the General of the Artillery, the Grand Chancellour, the 3 Presidents, Count Hercule Visconti, the Surveyor General Don Diego Paligano, the Count Rosales, and his Secretary of the War.

The Council since their entrance upon the Government, intended to ease the Countrey from some part of their burthen, by making a farther Reformation amongst the German forces; but have as yet suspended it, upon Consultation with the Camp Master-General.

The Cardinal Visconti is preparing for his Journey to Rome.

From Turin we are advised, that the Duke is providing a stock of Moneys for the maintenance of his forces: towards which the Contributions will arise to the sum of 400 thousand Livres. He intends suddenly with his whole Court to remove to Vercelles, where he may continue till the end of the next Lent; by his presence the more to encourage
