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Kensington, November 17.

THE Right Honourable the Lord Chamberlain presented to His Majesty the following Address, which His Majesty received very Graciously.

To the King's Most Excellent Majesty,

The Humble and Congratulatory Address of the Right Honourable John Earl of Bristol, Your Majesty's Custos Rotulorum for the County of Dorset, as also of the High Sheriff, and of Your Majesty's Justices of the Peace, Grand Jury, and other Gentlemen assembled at the General Quarter Sessions held for the said County, on Tuesday the Fifth day of October, in the Ninth Year of Your Majesty's Reign.

WE Your Majesties most Dutiful and Loyal Subjects, do humbly beg leave to congratulate Your Majesty upon the Occasion of this Honourable Peace, which Your Majesty at the great Hazard of Your Royal Person, and by the Glorious Success of Your Arms abroad, under the most Auspicious Conduct of Your Majesty, hath happily Established. When We consider Your Majesty as the great and only Instrument of our Deliverance from the Dangers of Popery and Arbitrary Power, to which we were lately exposed; And as a Prince who hath truly carried the Valor and Renown of the English Nation to an height beyond any of Your Majesties Predecessors, and at length Crowned all Your Victorious Actions in War with settling thereby our Happiness on the foundations of a solid Peace; We cannot but conclude, that as in former Ages God Almighty hath raised up Your Majesty's Ancestors for the Good and Relief of Mankind, so in this he hath sent Your Majesty as a more especial Blessing to these Nations; The Sense hereof hath caused this our humble Address to Your Majesty, to beg Your Majesties Gracious Acceptance of these our Congratulations and Acknowledgments, and to Assure Your Majesty, that as under God we shall be wholly obliged to Your Majesty for all those Blessings of Peace we shall enjoy, so the Enjoyment of them shall produce other Fruits in us, but such as shall increase always our Duty and Affection to Your Majesty, and our Prayers to Almighty God for the long and prosperous continuance of Your Majesties Reign with us.

Kensington, Nov. 18 The Dean and Prebendaries of the Cathedral Church of Canterbury attended His Majesty this day being introduced by his Grace the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, and presented the following Address, which His Majesty received very graciously.

To the King's Most Excellent Majesty,

The Humble Address of the Dean and Prebendaries of the Cathedral and Metropolitan Church of Canterbury.

May it please Your Majesty,

WE Your Majesties most Dutiful and most Loyal Subjects, the Dean and Prebendaries of Canterbury, who have had the Honour of being placed in the way, which Your Majesty has been often pleased to take, in so many toilsome and hazardous Voyages; have at last had the Effect of our constant Prayers, in seeing Your Majesty returned in Safety, and with as much Glory, as was ever brought back by Your Victorious Predecessors from any of their famed Expeditions: And have therefore humbly Presented to follow Your Majesty to Your Royal Palace, to offer up our Thanks and Congratulations there, where not only these Kingdoms, but all Europe, are preparing to pay the same Duty. The rest of the World, Great Sir, come gratefully to acknowledge the Restoration of their ancient Limits, and Stability of their future Peace, as the true Cause, to that Great Conjunction of Wisdom, Resolution, and Conduct, which shines not out in many Ages; and to which one of the greatest of Your Contemporaries has not thought it any disparagement to yield so much. To these Heroick Qualities, Acted by a singular Concern for the Interest of this Nation, Your Majesties Subjects were before Eternally indebted, for the Rescue of all their Rights, Sacred and Civil: But having now lived to see that great Deliverance perfectly consummated and gloriously Crowned, by this happy Conquest, they cannot easily restrain themselves from begging leave to be admitted into your Royal Presence, there with admiration and joy to profess, that they have now nothing more to desire for the Prosperity of their Country, than the long continuance of

Your Majesty's precious Life; and that they are bound by all Obligations of gratitude, and just acknowledgment of desert, as well as by Religious and Lawful Duty, ever to persist in that Loyal Obedience and Zealous Fidelity, of which they have so often and so solemnly assured Your Sacred Majesty. These, Sir, are the Thoughts and Prayers which are upon the hearts of all Your People; and in none more sensibly and sincerely than in, Dread Sir, Your Majesty's most Dutiful Subjects, and most Devoted Humble Servants.

Kensington, Nov. 19. This day his Grace the Duke of Somerset, Chancellor of the University of Cambridge, presented to His Majesty the following Address, being accompanied by his Grace the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Bishops of Ely, Norwich, Peterborough, Lincoln, and Chichester, together with the Vice-chancellor, several Heads of Houses, Proctors, and the Two Members of Parliament for the said University; Which His Majesty received very graciously, and was pleased to assure these of His Protection for the Welfare of the Church of England, and for the Encouragement of Learning.

WE Your Majesties most Dutiful and Loyal Subjects, the Chancellor, Masters, and Scholars of Your University of Cambridge, do with all humility congratulate Your Majesties Return to Your Kingdoms in Safety, as that great and comprehensive Blessing, which compleats and confirms to us the happiness we owe to Your Majesty, in the Conclusion of a most Honourable Peace. For as we have a more than common Share in the Universal Satisfaction which all Europe expresses upon this Joyful Occasion; so we and all Your Majesties Subjects must esteem our selves to be peculiarly happy in the Enjoyment of Your Royal Presence, and in the Security it gives us, that Your Majesties most Sacred Person, on whose Safety that of this Kingdom so much depends, is no longer exposed to the Hazards of a Foreign Expedition.

The large Part we were to have had in those Miseries lately threatened the Liberties, Properties, and Established Religion of the Nation, instructs us to receive with a suitable Thankfulness this Glorious Accomplishment of the Deliverance God has given us by Your Majesty, under whose Protection our entire Confidence is, that we, and the whole Church of England shall still rejoice.

On this Occasion, Your Majesty will graciously allow us the Liberty, unanimously, and in the most solemn manner to profess, that we hold it our Duty and Interest, to pray for Your Majesties long and prosperous Reign over us; and will also to assure Your Majesty, that we will employ our Fortunes, Studies, and utmost Endeavours in the Defence of Your Majesties Sacred Person, and of Your Just and Rightful Title to our Allegiance, against all Your Majesties Enemies and Opposers whatsoever; and that we will use all possible Care and Diligence to instill those Principles of Loyalty, and firm Adherence to Your Majesty into all such Persons as are, or shall be educated among us, which may demonstrate to Your Majesty, and to the whole World, our undiminished Zeal, and entire Affection to Your Majesties Royal Person and Government.

The Lord Bishop of London, with the Clergy of London, attended His Majesty, and presented the following Address, which His Majesty received very graciously.

To the King's Most Excellent Majesty,

The Humble Address of the Bishop, the Dean, and Chapter of St. Paul's, and the Clergy of London.

May it please Your Majesty,

IN the midst of the Acclamations of Your People to cast a favourable Eye upon us Your most Loyal and Dutiful Subjects, who humbly beg leave to share in the publick Joy, to congratulate Your safe Return, the Glory of Your Arms, and the greater Glories of an Honourable Peace.

In our former Addresses, Your Majesties Courage, Your Care of Your People, and the Safety of Christendom exposed Your Royal Person to so many and great Dangers, that our Protection became our Fear: But now our Joys are without alloy; for which we bless the Author of all Good, and humbly beseech him long to continue Your Majesty a Blessing to this Church and Nation, that You may enjoy the Fruits of that Peace, which You have purchased with so many Hazards of Your Sacred Person.

May all Your Subjects, even those who have hitherto been misled, be united in these Wishes, and share in the Happiness and Ease

of a Peaceful Government under a Merciful and Indulgent Prince. May You never have Occasion to draw Your Sword, but against Irreligion, Pophyness, Dissoluteness, and those other unquiet and destructive Vices, which undermine all Governments, and are the Enemies to Publick Peace.

May the Honour of God, the Protection of His Church, and the Encouragement of true Piety and Virtue be Your Majesties chief Care; And may that God, who has hitherto been Your gracious Protector and Defender, daily bestow new Honours on You in this World, and Reward You with Eternal Glory in the next.

The Humble Address of the High Steward, Mayor, Aldermen and Citizens of the City of *Chichester* in Common Council Assembled, wherein they Express their Unfeigned Joy and Satisfaction for His Majesty's Safe Return, being with Him the Blessings of Peace, and assuring His Majesty that they will continue to love and assist His Majesty with their Lives and Fortunes, and with the utmost fidelity and Resolution; was presented to His Majesty by His Grace the Duke of *Somerset* their High Steward; and the Right Honourable the Earl of *Ranelagh*, one of the Representatives in Parliament for the said City.

An humble Address from the Aldermen and Burgesses of the Borough of *Malmesbury* in the County of *Wilts*, congratulating His Majesty upon His Safe Return, and upon the Conclusion of the Peace, and giving His Majesty repeated Assurances of their Affection and Loyalty, was presented to His Majesty by the Right Honourable the Lord *Wharton* their High Steward, and *Craven Howard* Esq; and *St. Thomas Skipwith* Bar. their Representatives in Parliament.

The Humble Address of the Mayor, Recorder, Capital Burgesses, and other Inhabitants of the Burrough of *Shafton* in the County of *Dorset*; wherein they declare that they adore the Divine Goodness in His Majesty's many Preservations, and often safe Returns from the great dangers of the War, especially at this time, when His Majesty brings with Him the Blessing of a Firm and Honourable Peace; and pray for His Majesty's long Life and prosperous Reign: Was Presented by *Edward Nicholas* Esq; one of their Representatives in Parliament, Which His Majesty Received very Graciously.

An Humble Address of the Steward, Recorder, Burgesses, Assistants, and other Inhabitants of the City and Liberty of *Westminster*, congratulating His Majesty's safe Return, and the happy Conclusion of the Peace, was presented to His Majesty by Mr. Sergeant *Bonython*, and several of the said Burgesses; Which His Majesty received very graciously.

Cracow, Nov. 8. The King of *Poland* has received an Account from the Crown General, That he marched from *Lemberg* the 28th of the last month with 40 Squadrons of Horse and 1000 Foot, and passed the River *Vistula*, at a place called *Havickoff*, in order to join the *Saxon Forces*, which come from *Hungary*, and are arrived near the Frontiers of this Kingdom, and to continue their march together, as the Publick Service may require; The rest of the Army of *Poland* shewed the same willingness to march against the Kings Enemies, and declared, that they would not go into Winter Quarters until the Part, that appeared against his Majesty were quite suppressed. 'Tis believed the King will remove the next week to *Warsaw*; and that upon his arrival there, Circular Letters will be sent out, for the meeting of another General Dyer, to settle the Affairs of the Kingdom. Several of the Nobility who at first sided with the Primate, are come hither to make their submission to his Majesty, and others have done the like by Letters. The King has received new Assurances from the Czar of *Moscovy*, that his Forces, which lie near the Frontiers of this Kingdom, have Orders, to obey such Directions as they shall receive from his Majesty, in case he finds it necessary to employ them against those that would disturb him in the possession of the Crown of *Poland*.

Dantzick, Nov. 16. The Castle of *Marienburg* is at last surrendered to the King of *Poland*, and the *Sieur Kraici Caremni*, who commanded there, has made his particular Peace, and been entertained by General *Brandt* who commands the *Saxon Forces*, and has Orders from the King, to act against the *Polanders* with all the Tenderness he can, and against the *French* according to the usage of War. 'Tis believed all the Gentlemen, that have hitherto opposed the King, will so soon as they hear of the Prince of *Cox's* departure, make their submission, as many have done already.

Copenhagen, Nov. 19. The Prince of *Conti* arrived here the 17th from *Dantzicke*, having had very bad Weather, and the Ship he was in, with another of *Du Bars's* Squadron, run on a Sand at their coming into the *Sound*, but got off again; The Prince during his stay here, was privately at the French Ambassadors, but was kept out of Court, and about a quarter of an hour with the King of *Denmark*; and this morning he embarked again, and set sail with the Ships under command of the *Sieur Du Bart*, in order to continue their Voyage to *France*.

Paris, Nov. 22. On Monday last all the Sovereign Courts were at *Versailles* to Compliment the King upon the Conclusion of the Peace. The Preparations for the Duke of *Burgundy's* Marriage are very splendid, and the day for the Celebrating it continues fixed for the 10th of the next month. Here is a report, that the *Marquis de Bethune*, Sitter to the Queen Dowager of *Poland*, is in Diligence at Court, and that she is commanded to leave this City.

Brussels, Nov. 20. The French have carried away their Magazines from the places they are to restore, but have not yet set the time for evacuating them. The Baron de *Preyl* Mayor; the

Electer of *Bavaria's* Plenipotentiary at the Conference at *Rastwick*, arrived here this week from the *Hague*, and is since gone to wait on the Electer of *Cologne*.

Hague Novemb. 25. N. S. The Prince of *Vaudmont* is gone back to *Flanders*; and the Prince of *Nassau Saubuck* to his Government of *Baldac*. The Government of *Grave* is given to Major General *Fagel*, who yesterday took on this account the usual Oath, in the Assembly of the States-General. The *Sieurs Tysmutter*, *Nawport*, and *Rosmare* are named to go as Commissioners of the States to *France*, to adjust Matters of Trade. The Count d' *Auvergne* is arrived here from *France*, and will in a few days go to his Estate at *Bergenopzoom*. We hear that the Electer of *Hanover* is dangerously ill.

Dublin, Nov. 9. This Afternoon the Duke and Dutchess of *Ormond* came hither from *Kilkenny*, and were brought into Town by a great number of Nobility and Gentry in their Coaches, and on Horseback; His Grace went immediately to pay his Respects to the Lords Justices, and Their Excellencies were pleased to accompany him to his Lodgings, to Compliment the Dutchess, who was never here before; His Grace intends after few days stay here to return from hence for *England*.

Kerkington, Nov. 18. Yesterday the Sheriffs of *London* waited on His Majesty to know when His Majesty would please to be attended by the Lord Mayor and Court of Aldermen, and His Majesty was pleased to confer the Honour of Knighthood upon the said Sheriffs, *Bartholomew Gracedieu*, and *James Collet*, Esqs; and this morning the Lord Mayor and Aldermen attended His Majesty, and Mr. Recorder made a Speech to His Majesty, to congratulate his safe Return, and happy Conclusion of the Peace; after which His Majesty was pleased to confer the Honour of Knighthood upon *Robert Bedingfield* Esq; Alderman, and *Thomas Cuauden* Esq; Chamberlain of *London*.
