Cracow, Nov. 8. The King of Poland has received an Account from the Crown General, That he marched from Lemberg the 28th of the last month with 40 Squadrons of Horf, and 1000 Root, and passed the River Visuals, at a place called March 20st, in order to join the Saxon Forces, which come from Hungary, and are arrived near the Frontiers of this Kingdom, and to continue their march rogether, as the Publick Service may require; The rest of the Army of Poland shewed the same willingness to march against the Kings Enemies, and declates, that they would not go into Winter Quarters until the Part, that appeared against his Majesty were quire suppress. This believed the King will remove the next week to Warsaw; and that upon his arrival there Circular Letters will be sent out, for the meeting of another General Dyet, to settle the Affairs of the Kingdom. Several of the Nobility who at first sided with the Primate, are come hither to make their submission to his Majesty, and others have done the like by Letters. The King has received new Affairances from the Cair of Moscowy, that his Forces, which lie near the Frontiers of this Kingdom, have Orders, to obey such Directions as they shall receive from his Majesty, in case he finds it necessary to employ them against shose that would disturb him Cracow, Nov. 8. Dantzick, Nov. 16. The Castle of Marienburg is at last surrendred to the King of Poland, and the Sieur Resici Caronni, who commanded there, has made his particular Peace, and been entertained by General Brandt who commands the Saxon Forces. and has Orders from the King, to act against the Polanders with all the Tenderness he can, and against the French according to the plage of War. 'Tis believed all the Gentlemen, that have hitherto opposed the King, will so soon as they hear of the Prince of Cours's departure, make their submission, as many have done already.
