Our Royal Victorian Order, Grand Master and Principal Knight Grand Cross of Our Excellent Most Order of the British Empire, so soon as he shall be present within Our Realm; Our Most dear and entirely beloved Son and Most faithful Counsellor Albert Frederick Arthur George, Duke of York, Knight of Our Most Noble Order of the Garter, Knight of Our Most Ancient and Most Noble Order of the Thistle, Knight Grand Cross of Our Royal Victorian Order; The Most Reverend Father in God Our Right Trusty and Well Beloved Counsellor Cosmo Gordon, by Divine Providence Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, Primate of All England and Metropolitan; Our Right Trusty and Well Beloved Counsellor Douglas McGarel, Baron Hailsham, Our Chancellor of Great Britain; and Our Right Trusty and Well Beloved Counsellor Stanley Baldwin, Our Prime Minister and First Lord of Our Treasury; Of Our most especial grace certain knowledge and mere motion do nominate and appoint Our said Consort The Queen and Our said Counsellors The Prince of Wales, The Duke of York, Archbishop of Canterbury, Baron Hailsham and Stanley Baldwin, or any three of them, until the further signification of Our Royal Pleasure, to summon and hold on Our behalf Our Privy Council, and to thereat Our approval signify of any matter or thing, to which Our approval in Council is required, and to approve and Sign on Our behalf any document requiring Our signature, and further to do on Our behalf any matter or thing which appears to them necessary or expedient to do in Our behalf in the interests of the safety and good government of Our Realm; save only that they, Our said Consort and Our said Counsellors The Prince of Wales, The Duke of York, Archbishop of Canterbury, Baron Hailsham, and Stanley Baldwin, shall not dissolve Parliament, or in any manner grant any rank, title, or dignity of the Peerage, or act in any matter or thing on which it is signified by Us or appears to them that Our special approval should be previously obtained; and We further direct that, until the further signification of Our Royal Pleasure, these Presents shall take effect notwithstanding the death or incapacity of Our said Consort or of any of Our said Counsellors The Prince of Wales, The Duke of York, Archbishop of Canterbury, Baron Hailsham, and Stanley Baldwin, so long as three of those Counsellors remain capable of acting thereunder. Commanding all and Marquesses, singular Archbishops, Dukes, Earls, Viscounts, Bishops, Barons, Baronets, Knights, Citizens, and Burgesses and all other Our Officers, Ministers, and subjects that in everything appertaining to the matters aforesaid they be attendant, counselling and helping Our said Consort and Our said Counsellors The Prince of Wales, The Duke of York, Archbishop of Canterbury, Baron Hailsham, and Stanley Baldwin, as it behoves them.

The following Statute made by the Governing Body of the College of the Great Hall of the University, commonly called University College, Oxford, on the 28th day of November, 1928, has been submitted for the approval of His Majesty in Council, and notice of its having been so submitted is published in accordance with the provisions of "The Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1923."

Ex Parte the Master and Fellows of the College of the Great Hall of the University commonly called University College in the University of Oxford.

A STATUTE to amend Statute VII (Pensions) made by the University of Oxford Commissioners under the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1923 (13 & 14 Geo. 5. ch. 33), for the College of the Great Hall of the University commonly called University College in the University of Oxford, duly enacted at an Extraordinary General Meeting specially summoned for this purpose and holden on Wednesday, October 10th, 1928, and passed by the votes of not less than two-thirds of the number of persons present and voting, and ordered for sealing after notice given to the Hebdomadal Council of the University on October 22nd, 1928 (Oxford University Gazette, LIX, No. 1882, page 93) and now submitted for the approval of His Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Central Council of the Federated Superannuation System for Universities has introduced certain changes the objects whereof are to enable an Institution, with certain restrictions, to take over policies effected by members, prior to joining the Scheme, with Insurance Companies outside the panel and to facilitate the exchange or surrender of existing policies:

AND WHEREAS it is expedient to amend clause 2 of Statt. Tit. VII of the College Statutes (University College Statutes, 1926, page 54) so as to bring it into conformity with the changes aforementioned:

AND WHEREAS it is expedient to safeguard the right of the Master and Fellows to approve any policy so taken over, exchanged, or surrendered:

Now, therefore, WE, the Master and Fellows of the said College, in virtue of all and every the powers enabling us contained in Statute XIII. 1 of the College Statutes and section 7 (2) of the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1923 (13 & 14 Geo. 5. ch. 33), do alter and amend the Statutes of the College in so far as they relate to Pensions by the following omission and addition:

In Statute VII. 2 we strike out the words "The transference to the College of a policy effected under the aforesaid Scheme by some other institution upon the life of the Master or of any Fellow shall be deemed to be equivalent to the effecting of the policy by the College" and we substitute the words "The transference to the College of a policy upon the life of the Master or of any Fellow, being either a policy already effected under the aforesaid Scheme by some other institution or any other policy recognized for all the purposes of the Scheme by the Council of the
