*Venice*, Nov. 29. N. S. The Senate have begun to consider of the Preparations to be made against the next Campagne, being resolved to carry on the War against the Turks with all possible vigor, and being sensible they might have very much annoyed the Enemy in *Dalmatia* this last Summer, in case they had had a greater Force on that side, they intend to augment the number of their Troops, by sending thither a considerable Reinforcement against the next Spring; as well as by new Levies to be made in that Country. The Letters from *Turkey*, which are come this week by the way of *Ragusa*, say, the Grand Signior was returned to *Adrianople* from *Hungary*, and 'tis believed he will continue there the whole Winter.

*Cracow*, Nov. 27. A great Council was held here this week in the presence of the King of *Poland*, where it was considered, how the Winter Quarters for the Forces of this Kingdom should be distributed; Whether the Saxon Troops should remain in *Prussia* this Winter; And when the General Dyet should be called; But the King receiving an account from the Crown General, that he intends to be here in few days, his Majesty, that he may have his Advice likewise in these Matters, deferred taking any Resolutions thereupon, till his arrival. The Bojar *Szeremst* is arrived here from *Moscow*, and being one of the Chief Men of that Country, the King received him very kindly, and caused him to be very Nobly Entertained, his Majesty being willing to make use of this Occasion to Express the great Esteem he has for the Czar his Master, and how sensible he is of his Friendship, in having made him so many offers of Assistance, since his coming to the Crown; The said Bojar after a short stay here intends to go to *Venice*. The Great Treasurer of *Poland* is shortly expected here, having been very Instrumental in bringing Prince *Sapieha*, and other great Men of *Lithuania*, over to the Kings Interests.

*Warsaw*, Nov. 30. The Cardinal Primate continues at *Lowitz*, being much concerned at the Prince of *Conti's* departure from *Dantzicke*, and the ill success of his Affairs, which he has all along so zealously promoted. Most of the Great Men of his Party, have already left him, and submitted to the King; some few stand out still; but having no prospect of supporting their Designs, 'tis probable they will in a short time be willing to make their Peace likewise. The Queen Dowager of *Poland*, with her Sons the Princes *Alexander* and *Constantin*, are expected here to morrow from *Dantzicke*.

*Dantzicke*, Dec. 4. Things continue very quiet in these parts, and we are told that the King of *Poland* intends to be at *Warsaw* before *Christmas*, and in *Prussia* about the middle of the next month to receive the Homage of this City, *Elbing* and *Thorne*; and upon this Advice our Magistrates have already ordered Preparations to be made for his Majesties Reception.

*Stockholme*, Nov. 17. The States of this Kingdom assembled here on the 6th of this month; and having resolved humbly to desire the King (being now in the 16th year of his age) to take upon himself the Administration of the Government, which by the Will of the late King his Father was lodged in the Hands of the Regents till his Majesty came to the age of 18 years; They appointed Deputies to wait on His Majesty to present their said Request, who were admitted into his presence on the 8th; and the King was pleased to answer them, That although he well

know

knew the importance of their Demand, and how weighty a Burthen he was going to take upon him, yet he would not refuse their Request, but employ his utmost Endeavours for the Good and Welfare of his Dominions. The late Kings Funeral will be celebrated the 24th of this month, and some few days after his present Majesties Coronation.

**Vienna, Nov. 30.** The late Expeditions of the German and Croatian Forces into *Bosnia*, have, as all our Advices from those parts assure us, put that Country under a very great Consternation. The Excursion made by the Imperial Troops from *Transylvania* towards the *Danube*, and the taking of *Vipalanka*, does the like on that side; and 'tis very reasonable to believe, that these repeated Alarms, together with their other Misfortunes the last Campaign, will very much incline the Turks to a Peace. The Saxon Forces are to stay in *Hungary* this Winter, seeing the King of *Poland* has no occasion for them in that Kingdom, where in all likelihood the publick Affairs will in a short time be so quietly settled as to leave his Majesty at Liberty to employ his whole Force in the prosecution of the War against the Turks. The last Letters from *Sclavonia* say, the Imperialists have left a good Garrison in the Fortresses of *Dobay*, which gives them an Inter into the Country of *Bosnia*, and an opportunity to raise considerable Contributions on that Frontier.

**Francfort, Nov. 29.** The Deputies of the Circle of the Upper-Rhine, who met together here, separated the 27th of this month in order to return home, having appointed another meeting in this City about the middle of *January*; Four Imperial Regiments of Foot are at present quartered in *Swabia* and *Franconia*, being designed to Garrison the Places on the *Rhine* which are to be restored by the Peace.

**Hamburgh, Dec. 4.** The last Letters from *Copenhagen* say, the Prince of *Conti* had been forced into *Gottenburgh* by contrary Winds; That the *Dantzick* Ships taken by the *Sieur Du Barr*, continued still at *Copenhagen* with the French Seamen on board them; and that *Monsieur de Bonrepos* had sent away his Baggage by Sea, and was preparing to go himself by Land to the *Hague*, where he is to reside as Ambassador from *France*.

**Paris, Dec. 9.** On the 7th Instant the Duke of *Burgundy* was Married to the Princess of *Savoy* by the Cardinal de *Coislin* in the Chapel of *Verfailles*, the King, the Dauphin, and all the Princes and Princesses of the Blood being present; after which the King gave them a very Magnificent Entertainment. The Duke de *Vendosme*, who lately commanded the French Forces in *Catalonia*, having embarked at *Barcelona* on a Man of War of 50 Guns for *Marseilles*, was by bad Weather driven on the Coast of *Barbary*, and after having been in much danger, gained the Port of *Chalieuve*, where he landed; and is now on his Journey hither. They are in much pain at this Court for the Prince of *Conti*, having yet no news of his arrival at *Dunkirke*. Several new Taxes are raising in this Kingdom; and the Capitation is to be continued for six months longer.

**Brussels, Dec. 11.** On the 7th Instant the French evacuated *Cowray*, and the Count de *Mastain*, with several Regiments, took possession of the Town in the Name of the King of *Spain*; *Ath*, *Charleroy*, and *Mons*, will in like manner be delivered up in few days, and several Regiments will march hence to morrow, who with other Troops, are to go into Garrison in these Places. The Danish Auxiliary Troops who came from *Flanders*, passed through this City yesterday in their march homeward.

**Hague, Dec. 13.** N. S. On Wednesday last the Emperor's Ratifications of the Peace were brought hither by an Express, and the same day were exchanged with the French at *Ryswick*. The *Sieurs Newport* and *Rosmare* went hence some days ago for *France*, as Commissioners of this State, to Regulate Matters of Trade. His Excellency the Earl of *Pembroke* will go hence to morrow to *Rotterdam*, designing to Embark for *England* with the first fair Wind. The Count de *Bonde*, who was appointed by the

King of *Sweden* to be his Ambassador Extraordinary for the Mediation of the Peace, is now named to go with the same Character to *England*. We have Advice, that the Prince of *Conti* arrived on the 10th Instant at *Dunkirke*.
