Penice, Nov. 19. N.S. The Senate have begun to consider of the Preparations to be made against the next Campagne, being resolved to carry on the War against the Turks with all possible vigor, and being sensible they might have very much annoyed the Enemy in Dalmatia this last Summer, in case they had had a greater Force on that side, they intend to augment the number of their Troops, by sending thither a considerable Reinforcement against the next Spring, as well as by new Levies to be made in that Country. The Letters from Turkey, which are come this week by the way of Ragusa, say, the Grand Signior was returned to Advianople from Hungary, and 'cis believed he will continue there the whole Winter.

Cracow, Nov. 27. A great Council was held here this week in the presence of the King of Poland, where it was considered, how the Winter Quarters for the Forces of this Kingdom should be distributed; Whether the Saxon Troops should remain in Proffia this Winter; And when the General Dyet should be called; But the King receiving an account from the Crown General, that he intends to be here in few days, his Majesty, that he may have his Advice likewife in these Matters, deferred taking any Resolutions thereupon, till his arrival. The Bojar Szeremet is arrived here from Moscovy, and being one of the Chief Men of that Country, the King received him very kindly, and caused him to be very Nobly Enter-tained, his Majesty being willing to make use of this Occasion to Express the great Esteem he has for the Czar his Master, and how sensible he is of his Friendship, in having made him so many offers of Affistance, since his coming to the Crown; The faid Bojar after a short stay here intends to: go to Venice. The Great Treasurer of Poland is shortly expected here, having been very Instrumental in bringing Prince Sapieha, and other great Men of Lithuania, over to the Kings Interests.

Warfaw, Nov. 30 The Cardinal Primate continues at Lowitz, being much concerned at the Prince of Conti's departure from Dantzicke, and the ill success of his Affairs, which he has all along so zealously promoted. Most of the Great Men of his Parry, have already life the Men of his Party, have already left him, and fubmitted to the King; some few stand out still; but having no prospect of supporting their Defigns, 'tis probable they will in a short time be willing to make their Peace likewife. The Queen Dowager of Poland, with her Sons the Princes Alexander and Constantin, are expected here to morrow

from Dantzicke.
