WHILE all Europe is Studying how to Express their Gratitude to God and You, for the great Blessings which through Your Means they enjoy, to accept of the small Tribute of Your Dutiful and Loyal Subjects in this Your Majesties Antient Corporation. The Joys of our former Deliverances were very imperfect, because of the Dangers Your Majesty daily expos'd Your self to, and that in-

vincible Courage which wrought our Deliverance, caus'd also our Fears.

But now that God hath Crown'd Your Majesties Actions, with the best and most desirable end of War, an Happy, Honourable, and firm Peace, we can do no less than (having already render'd our most unfeigned Thanks to God) to offer to Your Majesty our most humble Duty, so many ways merited by You.

Assuring You, that there is nothing in this World so dear to us, but what we shall be willing to hazard in Defence of Your Majesties Sacred Person and Government.

We further crave leave to add our most hearty Prayers to God, That he would long continue Your Majesty the Religious Defender of our Faith, and the Glorious Preserver of our Liberties, That he would so Bless all Your Endeavours, that You may be as happy in Peace, as You have been successful in War; That he would keep You as free from the Harms of secret Treachery, as he hath done from the Assaults of open Violence; That all Your Subjects may pay You an obedience as ready as hath been Your Care to make us happy; and as universal as their Obligations; That this Church and Nation may long Rejoyce under the Influence of Your Peaceful and Just Government; And that when You shall be Translated from this Your Earthly Crown, it may be to a more valuable one of Eternal Glory.
